TRAITORS AT WORK

On the Pacific coast a former sailor has been convicted of treason. It was proved that he had sold naval secrets to the Japanese. From Benedict Arnold to the present day, the word traitor is the most detested in our language. No tongue can give utterance to the loathing that arises in the mind at the thought of a man betraying his native land. In wartime, the crime is punished with death. In peacetime the punishment is less, not because the crime is not as detestable, but because its consequences are less likely to be severe.

Unfortunately the traitor in California is not the only one at work in the army and navy. Others have been detected and a few punished, but obviously there are still others not yet recognized. Evidently two conditions are responsible. First the love of country is not being instilled in our boys and girls. Patriotism, too often, means nothing at all. Too much loose talk about the brotherhood of all peoples is undermining respect for our own. The second condition shows the exaggerated emphasis that is being placed on money. Traitors from Judas on have demanded money for their villainy. Their pieces of silver have outweighed all other considerations. Men whose warped consciences admit such conduct did not become that way overnight. Gradually the love of money corroded their better natures until they were willing, perhaps eager, to barter self-respect for money. Whether such a man is in position to betray military secrets or not, he is always a menace to his country. Traitors must be weeded out, but ever more important, they must not be allowed to grow

TOM BLANTON WILL FIGHT

Those who are predicting that Congressman Tom Blanton is facing an uphill fight should not forget that this is the kind the doughty Texan likes best to wage. Siding with the unthinking majority has never appealed to him. Leading lost causes, that often turn out winners, is his specialty. And he is never so bril-Hant and never so strong as when he is fighting with the odds seemingly against him.

Numerically he may be on the short end of the coming contest with Judge Carrett of Eastland, who led him in the first primary. But the cagy fellows who bet real money on the elections are not offering any odds.
