



LIVING THE GOOD LIFE

For several years a group of Southern scholars, centering in Vanderbilt university, have attracted national attention by their vation. If allowed to reach the advocacy of an uncommercialized farm life as the happiest of dormant state, weevils can live all modes of existance. Donald Davidson, one of the most famous of these "Southern Agrarians" in the Progressive Farmer summarizes their philosophy in the motto: "Farm not t omake money but to enjoy the good life." The following extracts from his article will interest many readers:

Historians now generally agree that the Civil War was a fight between two different ideas of civilization, or between two economies. The economy of the North, when all exceptions are allowgd for, was mostly a money economy, based upon manufacture, trade and banking. The economy of the South was on the whole an agrarian economy; that is, the Southerners based their life upon the land and upon the use of what the land actually produced, as much as upon what they could buy. Before the war, the South led in general a fairly happy life without a great deal of money. One might say-with some injustice, but not too muchthat the basic belief of the North was that everything could be bought-education, art, security, the good life, as well as clothes and food; while the South believed that some things could be bought, but not everything. Before the war, Southerners did not estimate a man by asking "how much he was worth" in terms of money. They talked about how much land he owned, how much stock he owned, how much cotton or corn his fields produced. Even then, his personal integrity and perhaps his family standing counted very heavily. If they did not respect him as a person, they would not invite him to dinner or encourage him to marry their daughters. The Southern idea was an idea of life, not money.

The money economy, though it never has fully possessed the agrarian South, became the ruling idea in national affairs. That was a mistake!

The old-fashioned farmer, such as we used to have and still do have in the South, of course needed some money, got some money, used some money. But the farm was more to him than a means of getting money. On the farm he built a fairly complete and satisfying way of life; he was father and family man, neighbor, huntgr. fisher, merry-maker, craftsman, worshipper of God, and homemaker, as well as a money-maker.

The meaning of "agrarianism," which has come to be the name of the cause I advocate, lies in the notion that an agrarian life is first of all a good life. Even in poverty and hardship, it is still true, I think that the people of the living fields have kept a better sense of what life is and how it may be enjoyed than the people of the | 000. gities. BRANDING DANGEROUS CARS

In a European country, the cars of motorists convicted of flagpant violation of traffic laws are painted with an emblem, as a warning to other drivers. It is said that this practice, newly started, has caused an appreciable decline in dangerous driving, as motorists naturally want to avoid the embarrassment and putlicity the emblem gives them.

A great many thousand American motorists should have their ears so branded.

The worst class of offenders consist of those who push the shrottle to the floor-board as soon as they get out of sight of a traffic officer. Excessive speeds-and there are times when 15 miles per hour is excessive-is responsible for more deaths than any other driving violation.

Passing on hills and curves and "meandering" through traffic are also potent causes of death, injury and destruction. On a myriad tragic occasions, a driver has tried to save a needless minute-at the cost of a life.

Driving on the wrong side of the road, jumping traffic lights, passing at intersections-are practices dear to the heart of the Dark Angel. They help keep our morgues and hospitals full to

Yes, it might be a good idea to adopt the branding practice in this country. A suitable emblem would be a skull and cross bones.

Cotton boll weevils feed only on green cotton and develop only in green cotton squares or bolls. frosts, practically all weevils will starve before going into winter Moisten with

a short period during the active season, that is previous to killing frosts, will cause death from star several months without food. and it is these over-wintering weevils that breed and supply the next season's hordes.

A total destruction of the plant substance is not necessary nor desirable. All our soils need this organic material returned for continued profitable production. It is enough in the matter of weevil control that the plant merely be killed.

Often a plow set shallow to lip the tap roots just below the life. surface of the soil is a successful practice. Merely chopping or clipping the stalks will not answer. because the stumps will throw out new growth ideal for weevil food.



POWER COMPANY HAS ANNOUNCED ANOTHER RATE REDUCTION HERE

Good news for local users of announcement by the Community Public Service company that increased consumption of electricity had enabled it to offer a substantial voluntary reduction in domestic and commercial lighting rates. A new Household Economy rate replaces all demestic rates heretofore in effect and a new commercial lighting rate replaces the former rate for commercial lighting.

Joe Long, local manager of the ompany, made the following tatement in regard to the announcement: "The new rates offer savings to all domestic and commercial lighting customers. The new schedule has been approved by city authorities and was made retroactive to include the past billing period. The savings will show on your electric ervice statements which are beng distributed in the next few

The new Household Economy rate, which replaces the general service, lighting and range rates heretofore in effect, provides for the billing of the first KWH at 10c, the next 25 at 6c, the next 50 at 4c and all in excess at 2c, with a minimum charge of \$1.00. The service charge of 70c per month previously charged has een eliminated under this rate, and the minimum billing has been reduced from \$1.50 to \$1.00.
