

At Dickson Normal College ents combined. young Miss Wyatt changed her first name to Hattie,, and after eight years of courtship she allowed her schoolmate Thaddeus Caraway to change her last name to his. The young couple moved to Jonesboro and while "Thad" became a competent young lawyer, Hattie became an equally competent young housewife.

Some weeks ago housewifely Hattie Caraway became the first woman in the history of the United States to serve any state as its senior senator. Her elevation to this position, after the death of senior Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas, was tallied in the Senate as Mrs. Caraway's fifth "first." first woman to be elected to the Senate by popular vote, she also was the first of her sex to be chairman of a Senate committee, to conduct a Senate hearing, and to preside over the Benate.

When her husband, who had been a Senator from Arkansas, died in 1931, Mrs. Caraway was chosen at a special election the next year to fill his seat. Her election was deemed nothing more than a gracious gesture on the part of Arkansas politicians who could not agree upon an





SEVEN YEARS OF DEBTS.

The Federal Government completed its fiscal year by spending \$1,305,000,000 in June. This represented the largest figure for any peace-time month on record with the exception of June last year, when expenditures were abnormally large as a result of the payment made on the soldiers' bonus, according to the Alexander Hamilton Institute. Although receipts in June were much larger than in the corresponding month in 1936, there was a deficit of \$434,000,000. This deficit occurred with the balance in the Treasury at a relatively low level. Consequently, the Government borrowed not only enough to meet this deficit, but enough to build up substantially its Treasury balance. Total borrowings in June amounted to \$1,212,000,000, raising the debt to a new high peak of \$36,425,000,000.

For the full fiscal year, total expenditures amounted to \$8,573,-000,000, or only \$706,000,000 less than the previous year when expenditures were swollen by the payment of a major portion of the soldiers' bonus. In 1935 and 1936, the cost of the bonus was \$1,673,0000.00, whereas last year the cost was only \$564;000;000. Expenditures for purposes other than the bonus were thus larger last year than in the previous year when they were at a record peace-time high. As a result of a sharp increase in receipts, however, the deficit was considerably smaller than in the pre_ vious year, although it was still substantial, amounting to \$2,_

Receipts during the past fiscal year were somewhat smaller than anticipated by the budget because of too much optimism H. Mayes, Austin. Texas in forecasting the repayment of loans made by the Government. Expenditures, however, were not as large as expected and the net result was a smaller deficit than the budget estimate. At the same time, the debt at the end of the year was more than a million dollars greater than the foreeasted one. This was due to the fart that the Government gave up the idea of starting the new year with a balanced budget. Consequently, in order to meet the prospective deficits, it was necessary for the Govern_ ment to build up its treasury balance, by borrowing to a much higher amount than it had originally planned to have on hand at the begining of the new fiscal year.

The Government has now had deficits for seven consecutive years. As a result, the debt rose during this period from \$16,_ 185,000,000 to \$36,425;000;000; an increase of more than twenty billion dollars.


