





RICH MAN'S FOLLY

The illustrated magazines have been full of pictures and stories about the recent yacht races in which a British millionaire en_ deavored to outrace an American millionaire off the Rhode Island

The yachts themselves have cost around three-quarters of a million dollars and the other expenses are so heavy that it is probable the total cost of the race will reach one million dollars. The prize is a bulgy silver cup worth about \$60.

This was the sixteenth time the cup has been raced for and most of the previous races have enced with hard feelings on both sides. The rule has been that the English yachtmen have shown better sportsmanship while the American racers have been out to win regardless.

This year, though the American yacht won four straight races, the English defender admitted his boat was outclassed.

Of course it is none of our business if it suits the challenger and the defender of this year's race to slough off their money in chunks like this. But there can be no doubt that it is just such reckless extravagance that is responsible for the bitterness with which many owners of vast wealth are regarded, both in America and in England.

Some millionaires use their money for building libraries, schools and hospitals. Some endow researches that point the way to longer; happier lives. Others build and race yachts.

In keeping with giving the execu-

tive power to the President, our Constitution provides that he shall appoint ambassadors, judges and other officers "by and with the advice and consent of the Senate."

The concurrence of the Senate was designed to reject unfit nominees and to prevent the filling of offices with accomplices and tools of an executive inclined to be auto

The Senate, as a matter of course usually confirms diplomatic and cab inet appointments submitted by the President, but often differs with the President regarding appointments of judges of the Supreme Court and other federal officers.


In theory the President also appoints federal officers in the states such as district judges, postmasters. revenue collectors and others. However, as a matter of practical politics. the men for such positions are selected or at least recommended by the Senators in each state. The Senators, because they know local conditions and because they want to


