in a better canned product. Let me stress the importance of exhausting, especially in canning fruits as peaches, plums and tomatoes. Exhausting is a name given to



#### COME AND GET IT - MAYBE

If Director Little of the Old-Age Assistance Commission has guessed right, 85,000 aged Texans will qualify for pensions in addition to the 118,000 now getting monthly checks.

If the new pensioners are paid as much as the others are receiving this month - an average of \$14.15 from the state and the same from the federal government - this will mean an additional \$7,216,000 a year from the Texas treasury, or an aggregate for this one purpose of \$17,234,700.

This is more than the entire state government cost when Pat Neff became governor.

Approval will be given the application of a person who meets constitutional requirements with respect to age, citizenship, and residence provided: (1) He does not own real estate in excess of a residential homestead, as defined by the Constitution, which in the country may be as much as 200 acres of land and in the city lots worth up to \$5000, regardless in both country and city of the value of the house; (2) He does not own personal property worth more than \$1,500 if married or \$1.000 if unmarried; (3) He does not have more than \$360 in cash at the time he applies for assistance; (4) He does not carry more than \$1,000 life insurance.


