WASHINGTON .- It is no longer any secret that Jim Farley is definitely lined up with the anti-third termers. But not generally known is the fact that Jim actually plans a show-down with Roosevelt regarding the President's own plans, and this show-down will come before the

Democratic convention at Chicago. Jim made up his mind to do this about the same time he issued his Massachusetts bombshell labeled. "My name will be presented to the national convention."

Democratic insiders had known for some time that Farley was cold to the idea of the President running again, but he sidestepped a positive commitment. He always declared that he was confident the President had no intention to seek re-election.

In the past month, with Roosevelt slates being entered in various states under obvious White House guidance, Farley's aloofness has

It is believed in the motor industry that a single last minute change in arrangement and design cost the Ford company mfllions of dollars and months of time. When this great preparation work s done, increase in speed and reduction in cost are very great.

To put the American airplane in dustry on this kind of mass production basis would give us something that hasn't existed and, under conservative plans for our own equip-ment, might never have been completely attained. But a billion dollars worth of allies business coupled with our own requirements on basic designs identical with our own, will do exactly that. This result of giving the allies our most advanced designs is the most fortunate thing that could happen to us from the angle of our own defense.

Of all the sizzling silly propaganda, said Germany was always for peace stories that have so far been released, that German "white paper" which claims that the United States, through its ambassadors, promised assistance to Poland in case Germany attacked, takes the prize.

That anyone in America should seriously believe it is past comprehension. On its face the story was designed to injure the growing prestige of the United States in neutral European capitals.

Even if such aid had been promised by the ambassadors mentioned, not even the Poles could have seriously believed it.

In the first place, this government is a Democracy, not a dictatorship, consequently such a vital step as a declaration of war is not in the hands of one man or even a small group of men. Congress alone has that right, and Congress was not even in session at the time the promises are said to have been given.

Secondly, the United States is not prepared to fight a foreign war. It took from April 1917 till September 1918 for us to land our first effective blows against Germany in the World War, and we are little more, if any, prepared for war now than we were in 1917.

Thirdly, take a look at a map of Europe and try to figure out how Poland could be lelped or Germany hurt. Prime Minister Chamberlain would give a good many million pounds for a workable answer.







During my ministry I have had the privilege of contacting many noble, Christian women. Their lives are a benediction to everybody, especially to God's ministers. Fitting memorials have been erected to them in various forms and suitable places, but the great good that they have done toward humanity and to God's glory will be memorialized in the lives of their children, their children's children and their many friends. I have never found one that was as gripping and as unusual in so many respects as dear sister Harper.

What time I have known her she had to make the best of life without the encouragement, the assistance and the love of a husband. Mr. Harper preceded her in death many years. It made life much harder for her, but she found all she had lost and more in the companionship of Jesus Christ whom she had accepted many years before. She was saved when young and after God had blessed her with a family, she endeavored to live in such a way before her husband and children as would merit their confidence in her religion as a Christian. She established an altar of worship in her home and nothing ever interfered with this daily worship. She became a student of the Word of God. It could be said about her Bible what the song writer wrote when he said, "Blessed book, precious book. On thy dear old tearstained leaves I love to look. Thou art sweeter day by day, as I walk the narrow way, that leads at last to that bright home above." Her favorite scripture was the twenty third Psalm. The Bible was her daily companion. She maintained a room in her

home as her "preacher's room." This room was hallowed by memories of many preachers who occupied it across the years. She loved God's ministers.

Mrs. Harper's devotion to the dear Lord was well expressed in the choice of her favorite hymn, TRIGGER MT. BAPTIST "Amazing Grace." She never thought so much of self. but of

her family. God blessed the simplicity and the sincerity of her faith in Christ by giving her a family of "like precious faith." All who know the family will Bring Your Stock to


