BRITISH FLEET FOR U.S. LOANS L. W. ("Chip") Robert, secretary of the Democratic national committee, has a plan for refunding war debts, also for selling more supplies to the allies and at the same time ensuring Western hemisphere defense. Briefly put, it is to take a mortgage on the British fleet in lieu of

war debts. In other words, the British would make a small token payment, then promise to turn their fleet over to the United States on the war debt in case of default. In return, the Johnson act would become inoperative, and the United States would extend immediate war credits.

Behind this, of course, is not so much the matter of war debts, but the very real fear that the United States may lose its greatest bulwark of protection-the British fleet.

How important the British fleet is to American defense is only just percolating to the general public. Real fact, however, is that the United States is not now prepared to defend both the Pacific and At- ing to the preliminary 1940 figlantic coasts, and will not be prepared for four more years. It would 1930. take at least that long to build a second fleet.

Note-Another plan receiving informal consideration by some of the insiders is to repeal the Johnson act and give immediate credits to the allies, in return for a mortgage on the French and British possessions in the Western hemisphere.

. . . GREENLAND AIR BASE

You can write it down as certain that should Hitler send an air expeditiant to Greenland or occupy it otherwise, Roosevelt would oppose that occupation, if necessary with the armed forces of the United States.

However, should Hitler get to Greenland first, the United States would have no adequate airplane force or naval strength in the Atlantic to dislodge him.

If Hitler took Greenland or Iceland, the United States would have about as hard a time getting him out. out as the allies had in rooting the Nazis out of Norway.





Voters Ponder If **A Gross Receipts** Levy Is Sales Tax

By BOYCE HOUSE

Austin .- Fifty million dollars of additional revenue through a gross receipts tax is the plan of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson for meeting old age pensions and other social security obligations. In her opening speech recently at Waco, she described her proposal as: "A levy of 1-2 of 1 per cent on gross receipts from sales and business, with reasonable exemptions within the Constitutional provisions that taxes shall be equal and uniform, which I suggest to be \$5,000, and wwich my best information estimates to yield \$50,000,000." If this tax lacks a little of raising the revenue, then Mrs

Ferguson "will be in favor of a reasonable additional tax on natural resources but I will not favor a heavy tax on natural resources," she declared.

The gross receipts tax "will be levied against the seller and not the consumer and, therefore, would not oppress the poor, because they do not sell anything," Mrs. Ferguson continued.

Critics declare however that the plan of Mrs. Ferguson and former Governor James E. Ferguson, her husband, would mean \$50,-000,000 in new taxes to be collected from Texas citizens and at the same time assurance is given that oil, gas and sulphurwhich are not now paying anything for pensions-will, at the most, have to pay only a small amount for such purpose.

Comment also by those disapproving the gross receipts plan is to the effect that Ferguson long advocated a sales tax and it is contended that a gross receipts tax is a sales tax under a different name and in a somewhat different guise because it would be added by the merchant to the cost of doing businessjust as rent, insurance, wages and all other taxes now areand the selling price would be increased enough to meet this new tax and so it would be passed on to the customer.

For instance, four years ago Brazil asked the United States to permit the leasing or sale to South American neighbors of decrepit destroyers rusting in Philadelphia and San Francisco harbors since the World war. But congress threw up its hands in horror of rearmament and said No

Then in March, 1939, a bill was introduced in congress permitting Latin American nations to build ships in U. S. navy yards and buy certain equipment from the U.S. army and navy which would not conflict with our own national defenseall paid for in cash.

The bill passed the house of representatives but hung up in the senate. And there it still hangs. In fact, it has been stymied for a year tered. Let's begin today to curb by Senator Vandenberg.




