Wheat Insurance Deadline Nears

With only ten days remaining pefore the August 31 wheat crop nsurance deadline, 25 producers Mills county have insured their 1941 crops against all unavoidable hazards.

The 1941 sign-up probably will exceed the 1940 coverage, J. H. Burnett, chairman of the county AAA committee, said. The 25 Gwen R. Indemnity payments on the 1940 crop have been (practically) completed in the county, the chairman said. Loss claims have been made on 16 policies for indemnities totaling 572 bushels. Most losses resulted from drouth.

The chairman reminded producers that application for crop insurance must be made before the farmer seeds his wheat or by August 31, whichever is earlier and that no applications would be accepted after that date.

that generally the cost of a home should not exceed two and one-half times the annual income of the purchaser. For the typical family, the property valuation of the new home purchased with an FHA-insured loan in 1939 was slightly more than twice the family's annual income. On this basis of rea-soning the home illustrated here would fall easily within

the means of the family whose annual earnings are around \$2,000. Valued at \$4,250, this property was financed with an FHA-insured mortgage of \$3,400. Monthly payments on a mortgage of this amount, excluding taxes and hazard insurance, amount to about \$20.

CONFESSION AND FORGIVENES LESSON TEXT—II Samuel 12:13, 14; Psalm 51:1-3, 9-13; 32:5. GOLDEN TEXT—Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed.—James 5:16.

If the Bible told us only of perfect people, we would recognize it as being not true to life and assuredly of no help to us who know our own sinful natures. The Bible, however, tells us in all truthfulness of the bad as well as the good, the weak as well as the strong, the humble as well as the mighty.

It honestly portrays the sins of its greatest characters, revealing the heart of man as "deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked' It tells us of a gra clous God (when man repents and forsakes his sin) who invites the sinner to come and be delivered from his sin.

The lesson centers around David, the humble shepherd boy who be came king; and in the height of his glory, being tempted of his own evil desires, fell into the lowest of sin, which he then sought to cover by a well-planned murder. He finds no peace until he repents and returns to God. Three words sum

I. Sin (II Sam. 12:13, 14). That little three lettered word seems to have the hiss of the serpent in it-sin-the cause of all man's woes and the heartache of a loving God.

David had tried to hide his sin and he said, "My bones waxed old through my roaring all the day long. For day and night thy hand was heavy upon me" (Ps. 32: 3, 4). "Be sure your sin will find you out" (Num. 32:23) is just as true today as it was in David's time.

The nature of sin is described in a bit, we note that it is described by three words: "transgression," meaning a rebellious "stepping over" God's boundaries; "iniquity," "unequal," meaning crookedness of means missing the mark, a life going the wrong way.

Try This With Your Electric Beater

But the seater has brought many changes. The best one is that, with an it beater, results can be the same every time if a few simple ions are followed.

Our own Institute cake recipes give directions for mixing both with a spoon and electric beater. The electric-beater method for cakes made with shortening is very simple. Usually the shortening, sugar, and eggs are creamed together at a relatively high speed; dry ingredients are added alternately with the milk, as rapidly as possible, at lowest speed. For light batters, first mix the eggs, milk, and melted shortening in the bowl at medium speed; then add the sifted dry ingredients at low speed. Remember, always pull the plug to disconnect your electric beater before you put on or off beater blades or other attachments.

Here are the recipes and electric-beater methods for making a mouth-watering Lady-Baltimore Cake and Frosting.



Lady-Baltimore Cake

(Tested by Good Housekcebing Institute)

Use Institute-approved measuring cups and spoons. Measure level. 1/3 c. shortening 1/3 c. granulated sugar 2 c. sifted cake flour 2 /4 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tep. salt
1 tep. vanilla extract
2/3 c. milk
5 egg whitee

Since Lady-Baltimore Cake is a white cake and therefore the egg yolks re not used, we like to beat the egg whites in the small beater bowl first, that the mixer blades do not need to be washed before the shortening creamed. Butter and margarine are more easily creamed if allowed to fitten for a while. Cream the shortening in the large mixer bowl at a latively high speed. When it is the consistency of mayonnaise, add sugar, little at a time. Cream well after each addition, until the mixture is light off fulfy. This is when an electric beater really comes into its own. You will not that the creamed shortening and sugar acquire a whipped appearance at is rarely achieved with hand-mixing. You are now ready to add the dry igredients, which have been previously sifted together. Turn the beater to west speed—and watch out for overbeating. Quickly add the dry ingredients and the combined milk and flavoring extract, alternately. Stop the beater as moment the last bit has been mixed in. Then, with a spoon or wire whip, only fold in the beaten egg whites. Pour better into three greased S' yer-cake pans, and bake at 375°F. for 25 to 30 min. After removing cake nom oven, set it on cake racks about 5 min. Then loosen edges, invert on cks, remove pans, and turn cake layers right side up.

And now for the frosting, which, after all, is the crowning glory of the ke. It's a real chore to make frostings like this by hand, but as simple as in be with an electric mixer.





Store That Crop In Trench Silos

Fort Worth.-Now that Texas primary elections are over, bankers, merchants and civic leaders can do no more effective politieal work, according to M. E. Mc-Murray of the Texas Dairy Products Association, than to join the county agents and other agricultural workers in their campaign to see that farmers, dairymen and ranchers place as much of the bumper feed crop now growing into trench silos as pos-

To do this will insure a supply of highly nutritious feeds which, due to climatic conditions, may not be available next year. Tests have proven conclusively that feeds placed in trench silos may be kept indefinitely without deterioration and is automatically insured against fire and rain losses, as well as rodent damage. Other arguments which may be advanced to dairymen and others

1. Feed put into trench silos will go two to three times as far as dry feed.

2. As a substitute for green pasture it has vitamins not found in dry feed.

3. It is especially suitable when pasture is not available because of its water content.

4. It requires no investment; any farmer with his tools and team can build a trench silo suited to his needs-one ton or a thousand ton capacity.


5. It has equal value as a maintenance feed or a fattening
