

## **New Remedy For** Screw Worm Here

An effective remedy for screwworm, the most destructive insect pest to livestock known, is announced.

Cameron Siddall extension entomologist, says the remedy is relatively inexpensive and consists of a correct compounding of the two principal materials-diphenylamine and benzel -at present advocated by the Department of Agriculture for the treatment and prevention of screwworm cases.

When applied to infested wounds, the compound is efficient in rapidly killing all screwworms in a wound. At the same time the remedy gives as good protection, or better, to all wounds against subsequent attack as materials heretofore recemmended for this purpose, Siddall says.

Full particulars for preparing and applying the remedy have been placed with county agricultural agents. It was developed through research by the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine during 1940 and 1941. The smear is best applied with

a one-inch paint brush.

The remedy kills screwworms quickly, and after its application large numbers of them soon drop out of the wound carrying along a considerable amount of the protective chemical. For this reason, Siddall says, it will be good practice to apply a second treatment 24 to 48 hours after the first one in order to insure a proper coating of the wound surface. Thereafter, under average conditions, regular treatments twice weekly should be given until th wound heals. It is especially recommended that infested animals be kept in a hospital pasture when this schedule of treatment is used. When flies are unusually active and abundant more frequent treatments may be necessary.

In tresting an infested animal, the material is swabbed into the wound. Care should be taken to push it well into pockets made by the maggots and painted around the wound where blood and wound exuduate have made the surrounding tissues attractive to flies and susceptible to infestation or to fly blows.

# WHEAT MARKETING

With only 26 eligible voters in Mills County in the Wheat Referendum Election, May 31, 19 votes were cast and all 19 were for the wheat marketing quota. The vote over the United States was approximately 80 per cent in favor of the quota. Only 66 and two-thirds per cent majority was required to put the wheat marketing quota in effect for 1941. Wheat growers who are not overplanted for 1941 are now eligible to receive government loans of 98 cents per bushel on all wheat produced in 1941.

No wheat grower who has planted within his allotment is subject to any penalty on the sale of his wheat but he must secure a Marketing Card from the local AAA office before any buyer will purchase his wheat. Any wheat grower having 15 acres or less of wheat, or whose normal production on the planted acreage is 200 bushels or less is exempt from any penalty but he must secure Marketing Card before the sale of wheat.

Any person having excess wheat may store the excess wheat under bond and be eligible for a loan at 60 per cent of the regular loan rate on excess wheat and receive his Marketing Card on the remainder of the wheat. If he does not care to store the wheat under a bond he may pay penalty on the excess wheat at the rate of 49 cents per bushel and then be eligible to receive his Marketing Card which will enable him to sell the remainder of his wheat penalty

## Many Mattresses Are Processed By **County Families**

Fourteen hundred forty-five 50-pound cotton mattresses have been processed by rural families in Mills County during 1940 and 1941. These mattresses will live a long time if they are made a long time if they are made right and if they are given good STAMPS ASKED NOW

1. These mattresses should be sunned and beaten every day for two weeks before anyone ever sleeps on them.

2. After that these mattresses should be sunned once a week.

3. These mattresses should be turned from end to end and side to side three times a week so that the cotton will not get lumpy and the mattress will not sag in spots.

4. And of course these mattresses should be kept free of

First get an ounce of corrosive sublimate from your druggist. This costs 25 cents. Mix this with one pint of warm water. Then apply it with a feather or a hand syringe to the cracks and seams of the mattress where bed bugs would likely hide. Do this

#### Corpus Christi Gets Natl. Defense Money

AUSTIN, June 3 .- National deense contracts and expenditures in Texas through May 15 have reached \$240,169,976, it was announced this week by B. Frank White, acting state director for the Office of Government Re-

Contracts and expenditures during the first two weeks of May totaled \$2,354,141, the largest single item of this amount being a \$1,117,039 contract to the Atlantic Gulf and Pacific Company of New York for dredging of the Port Aransas - Corpus Christi waterway.

Also included in the May contracts was an additional \$193,740 award to Brown and Root, W. S. Bellows and Columbia Construction Company of Corpus Christi for installation on Demit Island of air-type catapults and access. together with service facilities for quarters, etc., at the Naval Air Station




