

#### WAR ON THE POLITICAL FRONT

By GEORCE C. HESTER

The recent pronouncement of war aims by the United States and England may eventually prove to be one of the most important steps yet made by the Democratic powers. In a message to Congress in January, President Roosevelt summarized in the following language the four essential human freedoms which we are seeking to make secure for the world of the future

The first is freedom of speech and expression-everywhere in the world. The second is freedom of every person to worship God in his own way—everywhere in the world. The third is freedom from want which, translated into world terms, means economic understanding which will secure to every nation a healthy peacetime life for its inhabitants— everywhere in the world. Fourth is freedom from fear which, translated into world terms, means world-wide reduction of armaments to such a point and in such a thorough fashion that no nation will be in a position to commit an act of physical aggression against any neighbor—anywhere in the

On May 29, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden defined England's post-war objectives by endorsing the President's aims and adding: "That is no vision of a distant millenium. It is a definite basis for the kind of world attainable in our day and generation. "Let no one suppose," he said, "that we, for our part expect to return to the chaos of the old world. . . . A peaceful brotherhood of nations with due liberty to each to develop its own balanced economic life and its characteristic culture will be the common object of all of us."

"Our political and military terms for peace will be designed to prevent repetition of Germany's misdeeds. . . . The lasting settlement and internal peace of the continent as a whole is our only aim. The fact that at the bottom of his heart every combattant knows this, is the ultimate source of our strength.

The above utterances, coming from spokesmen of the two great democracies, are "straws in the wind" foreboding considerations of profound significance in the shape of things ahead. The statements reveal that the Democracies are just awakening to one of the most powerful instruments of modern war, which is political warfare.

For years the Nazi leaders have stressed the importance of war on the political front and to that and have perfected a farflung network of the most scientific system of propaganda, intrigue, and organized subversion known to the history of statecraft. Country after country was either neutralized or rendered helpless by its work. Long before the outbreak of the present struggle these international schemers operated upon the theory that most democracies can be defeated from behind the lines, by merely confusing the thinking of the peoples, by poisoning their ideals, and by destroying their faith and confidence in democratic institutions

Now there is but one effective counterplan to defeat such methods of warfare. It is a counter offensive on the political front to arouse and unite the freedom loving peoples of the earth into a common ideal and a common purpose.

Few people realize the power of ideals in human affairs. In every great crisis in history there have risen to the surface such slogan and battle cries as best express the basic things for which of God." Rejection brought eternal men are willing to struggle and die. In the throes of the French Revolution, it was "Liberty, Equality, Fraternity." We still recall the ringing commandments of Woodrow Wilson that shattered fai h in the Kaiser's dream of "Deutschland Uber Alles" in the old world war. These were things that touched the hearts of liberty loving peoples everywhere and game them the courage and will to carry on.

But the Democracies at the beginning of this war had forgotten. They had forgotten the importance of ideals and the necessity of continuously pounding upon these ideals in political the Lord filled their Holy Spirit-filled warfare. As a result they have been outflanked politically.

Moreover, we as a people have as yet faild to comprehend the real meaning of total warfare. We speak of it as if it applied only to industrial and military mobilization, overlooking the more powerful mainsprings of human action.

The dictators have put strength into their systems, but strength without the proper spiritual foundations will fail. What 3:26, 27). survives this struggle in the end will be something fundamental,

something true. In the words of Adolf Hitler, "Two worlds are in conflict, two philosophies of life. . . . One of these worlds must break asunder.'

There is, of course, but one alternative for Hitler's conceived world order. It is a counter offensive on the political front embracing a community of interest for all free peoples, and for those who want to be free. The battle slogan should be "freedom, independence, democracy." After all, some three-fourths of the human race, most of whom are beyond the domination of Nazi war lords, still cherish such ideals.

These are the only political ties that can weld together the vast and diverse peoples into a common purpose. A dynamic exploitation of these ideals throughout the world and by every method possible would constitute the most practical military strategy for the Democracies, and would strike at the most vulnerable spot in the totalitarian scheme of things.

The Democracies cannot continue in confusion. Retreat is impossible and hesitation means disaster. These are days of action-for an offensive for democracy upon the political fronts in every land. This alone can establish faith in a great historic cause such as that which won the first world war and which in the end will be the determining factor in this one

May someone learn the lesson of our text and turn away from that evil way-right now!



Whole wheat products mean a financial saving in food bills and they provide nutritional elements greatly needed in the American diet.

#### TREATMENT OF CANCER

The cure of cancer depends on the use of some agent which will destroy the cancer without destroying the healthy tissue around it.

No substance has been found which taken by mouth, injected under the skin or into the veins will do this.

From the earliest times the knife has been used (operation) to cut out cancer and the flesh around and beneath it. But if a single cancer cell was left (and cancer cells are smaller than the point of a pin) it came back and grew rapidly. Few surgeons operate skin cancer in this day and time and those who do usually send the patient o be X-rayed as soon as the wound has healed to be sure the cancer will not

In the past certain chemicals have been used in the form of pastes or salves which applied to skin cancer will destroy the cancer but they often also destroy large areas of healthy skin and muscle around the cancer sometimes leaving raw places on the face or neck as large or larger than the palm of the hand. Many such cases come for X-ray treatment and are harder to cure than if the cancer paste had not been used.

X-ray and rays from Radium will kill cancer without destroying healthy tissue. Practically every cancer on the surface of the body if treated early can be cured by X-ray or rays of ra-
