




Married men can now be accepted for enlistment, provided they will sign a statement that their dependents are not de-





The wholesome way in which the American people are reacting to our participation in the war is indeed encouraging. In the past our thinking has been confused by the many illusions under which we lived. We are all familiar with such illusions. Here

That oceans are barriers which make an attack upon America der to the nearest field office impossible. That America had no interest in the European war of the priorities division. In Texand that the struggle was no concern of ours.

This was the illusion of isolation The attack of Japan upon Hawaii, which is further from ton and El Paso. Japan than America is from Germany, has desolved that illusion in a welter of blood and destruction.

That the Nazi doctrines are of no concern of America. This, of enforcement of the tire order. course, was one of the most fatal of all illusions. Fortunatey, only a minority of Americans indulged in it. More and more, as we proceed into this struggle, we will see it as a war for self-preservation. Eventually, it may be termed, "Our Second War of Independence." By independence of course, we mean primarily the preservation the war in the Pacific which W. We close our ears to the muted rumbling of coming events, the impact from which will not only test all of us, but which may change the course of our entire history.

Dec.-Mayors of Texas cities have received telegrams requesting their assistance in the enforcement of the order prohibiting the sale of new tires and tubes except! on priority ratings of A-3 or better, J. B. Crockett, district manager of the Dallas field office, division of priorities, said today. The telegram was from Leon Henederson, U. S. director of civilian supply. Mr. Henderson also sent telegrams to all state governors and to 42 state leagues of the American Municipal Association. Telegrams also were sent to state and municipal police departments and sheriffs.

Mr. Henderson asks cooperaion of public officials in notifying tire dealers of the temporary prohibition on sale of new tires and tubes between Dec. 11 and Dec. 22. Lesson for December 28

THE CHRISTIAN'S HOPE

LESSON TEXT-John 14:1-6; Revela dion 22:1-5.

GOLDEN TEXT—In my Father's house many mansions.—John 14:2.

Hope is something this world des erately needs, and which it has all but abandoned. Little wonder wher one recalls that the usual meaning of hope is hardly more than "wishful thinking" without any real confi dence-and that such hope as men have, has been only in their fellow men, who have so often grievously failed them.

The Christian's hope-ah, that is something quite different. To him hope is certain expectation resting on the assured Word of God. Such a light only shines brighter as the darkness deepens. As the lights of men's promises and purposes flicker and die out, the hope of God's people shines like a beacon in

dark and stormy night.

How appropriate that we should use the last Sunday of this year to remind one another of that hope, to trim the lamp, as it were, for even peams out into the unknown year There are three great and helpful things in this lesson.

I. A Sure Promise of Heaven

We are not forgetting that for us who love the Lord there is the blessed hope of His return. He is coming again (v. 3). But whether we have the joy of being caught up to be with Him, or go by way of death, we have a sure promise of the eternal dwelling place which He has prepared for us.

He is not just an example, or the masterteacher, or a martyr to a holy cause. He is "the way, the truth, and the

Note, too, that no man comes to the Father but by Christ. Dr. Wilbur M. Smith points out that "the apostle Paul in his epistles constantly emphasizes the truth that we have access to the Father only through the Lord Jesus Christ (Rom. 5:2; Eph. 2:13, 18; 3:15; Heb. 7:25; 10: 19-21). Jesus is not one way to God, He is the only way to God. Men cannot come to God through anyone, but only through Christ."

Someone may say, "That's very true, and wonderful. I am a Christian, and I have Christ who is the way. But what is heaven like?

III. A Symbolic Picture of Heaven (Rev. 22:1-5). First of all there is "life"-the river of life, the water of life. In heaven there is no death, but only eternal life, blessing, peace, and joy. In this world man lives under the constant shadow of death as the enemy which hurts, destroys, and reminds him of sin. But in heaven

all is life through eternity.

"When we've been there ten thousand years Bright shining as the sun, We've no less days to sing God's praise. Than when we first begun."

Then we have what Dr. A. C.; Gaebelein calls "the seven glories of the redeemed" (vv. 3-5). Let us enumerate them. (1) "No curse"—
perfect singlessness. (2) "The throne. perfect sinlessness. (2) "The throne of God and of the Lamb shall be therein"—giving perfect and bless-ed government forever. (3) "His servants shall serve him"-in perfect, unhindered, untiring service. Heaven will not be idleness (perish the thought!), but blessed and happy service for God. (4) "They shall see his face"—an eternal, undimmed vision of God. (5) "His name shall be on their foreheads"-speaking of eternal ownership and possession.
(6) "There shall be night no more" -God is the light throughout eter-nity. No more darkness to fear. (7) They shall reign forever and ever." Few of us would care to reign in this world, for that brings only sorand trouble, but to reign with that indeed will be eternal


