Applicants and recip- call at one of the following ients of aid reside predominantly in the larger cities.

When the death, continued illness, or absence of one or both parents leaves the family without any means of support or parental care, the Aid to Dependent Children program provides monthly cash payments to the mother or other close relative with whom the children may live for the maintenance of the home. The 47th Legislature appropriated money to finance the program, with the federal government matching funds dollar for dollar.

The law sets certain requirements for the receipt of assistance by dependent children. It must be proved that CHAIRMAN IS NAME First: needs exists. A family is considered to be in need if it lacks sufficient resources to maintain in the state for at least a year beforehand, or, if it is an infant less than a year old, the mother must have lived in the state a year before it was born. Although the federal social security act provides for matching funds in giving aid to children up to 16 years of age, or 18 if the child is still attending school, the Texas constitutions excludes benefits to children who have already attained the age of 14 or over.

Applications for aid to dependent children may be made at the local office of the State Department of Public Welfare. The same workers who administer Aid to the Needy Blind and Old Age Assistance also administer the children's program. Ap-



Applications Now **Being Received At** Local AAA Office

Loans for the production of 1942 crops are now available to farmers in Mills County and applications for these loans are now being received at the AAA Office in Goldthwaite, according to Harry F. Chesnut, Field Supervisor for the Emergency Crop Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration.

A recent announcement by E. Farwell, Regional Manager of the Dallas Emergency Cror Loan Office, which administers these loans, states that the loans are being made available somewhat earlier this season to meet the emergency caused by short crops in certain areas and to permit early preparation of the land.

These loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers whose cash requirements are small and who cannot obtain loans from other sources. As in former years, the money loane will be limited to the applicant necessary cash needs in prepar ing the land, planting and cu tivating his 1942 crops. Bo rowers are required to give asl

-Commonly known as "seed loans," these loans have been made in this county for the past ten years and the Emergency Crop Loan Office at Dallas thoroughly appreciates the fine attitude of the farmers here toward their obligations, Mr. Farwell's announcement states.







THE PARABLES BY THE SEA LESSON TEXT-Mark 4:26-32; Mat-GOLDEN TEXT-Never man spake like this man.-John 7:46.

Parables as a means of conveying truth reached perfection in the hands of the Master Teacher, Jesus. Taking short stories of well-known events or facts from daily life, He presented profound truth in the most simple and attractive form. Except for the parable of the four kinds of seed which He interpreted (Matt. 13:18-23), He left it to His listeners to make their own ap-plication. This has led to some difference of opinion, but in general the parables are received as excellent and helpful portions of God's Word.

In the two passages of Scripture assigned for our lesson, we have five parables, each with a distinctive message, yet together pointing out that there is a time of growth leadinstructors in the First Aid ing to harvest and judgment, and Course under the supervision of that our gracious God has at great cost provided a way of redemi

I. Normal Growth Is Blessed (Mark 4:26-29).

God is patient. He awaits the normal, healthy, steady growth the seed. Man is so impatient he must have forced growth, artificial stimulation, and even artificial ripening of the fruit.

The same attitude enters into his care of his children. They must get ahead in school beyond their years. They must get out and make a liv ing long years before they have learned to make a life. Why not let them mature in the orderly, Godgiven way?

The same is true in the work of the church. There must be imme diate "tangible" results or he will not give his support. Anyone with judgment knows that spiritual life takes time to develop, and that spiritual results cannot be judged by physical or tangible standards. Seedtime, growing time, normal ripening, then harvest - that is God's order and it is a good one.

II. Abnormal Growth Is Dangerous (Mark 4:30-32).

Normally the mustard tree is a small plant, and when it grew into great tree something abnormal had taken place. Birds (which always denote something unclean in Scripture) came to lodge in its branches.

Just so, Christianity was never intended to be made up of a nominally Christian world empire in which ungodly men (the dark birds of the evil one, Matt. 13:19) should find comfortable lodgment. 

SIMPLE RULES FOR HOME TREATMENTS OF COLDS (From Osteophathic Health) Tabulated below are some sim-

ple rules for home treatment of colds which have proved successful in thousands of cases. Followed faithfully, they do a great deal toward reducing the

severity of the cold. 1. Go to bed at once and stay there. To be up and about consumes energy which might be employed in fighting the cold.

A day or two in bed at the beginning of a cold may be a sound insurance policy against two weeks or more of inefficiency later.

2. Don't eat. The "feed a cold" addicts have no scientific grounds upon which to base this rule. The process of digestion

takes energy which should be saved for fighting the infection. 3. Drink a glass of hot water, flavored with a little salt or lemon juice, every two hours. This will be absorbed readily and will serve to dilute the toxins and promote elimination through the skin and kidneys. 4. If there is a sluggish elimination, an enema may be utiliz-

ed to advantage. This also helps to get rid of toxins. Don't allow anyone in the

sick room except the person who is attending the sick one. This is for the visitor's sake as well as for the patient's sake. 6. Don't get out of bed too soon. Wait until the temperature has been normal for 48 hours, or if no fever has been present, wait until the body has me stronger.
