WE DON'T PRINT CIRCULARS

As the United States Government has asked for many weeks for the conservation of all kinds of paper and has now put circular and dodger paper on the restricted list, the Eagle will not hereafter, for the duration, print circulars for anyone, except in cases where an ad in the paper will not suffice on account of time.

The Eagle has, before and since the war started, given free hundreds of columns of reading matter to the various civilian defense workers of Mills County to acquaint the people with what is going on in their county and as to what to do in case of local emergencies. We have been glad to do this, and will continue to do so-regardless.

However, we now need more advertising support from the merchants of Goldthwaite in order to keep the paper up to its present standard, and we think the few merchants who are having circulars printed outside of Mills County and bringing them into Goldthwaite should discontinue this practice—at least during the war—in order to comply with the government classification of all kinds of paper. Circular and dodger paper has been placed in Class IV—a non-essential civilian waste.

Under terms of House Bill No 222, Acts Regular Session, 47th Texas Legislature, all candidates for public office in the State of Texas, must file an affidavit with the Secretary of State that the candidate will uphold the Constitution of the United States and of the State of Texas. Mills County candidates can secure from County Clerk Earl Summy a copy of the wording of the affidavit, which the candidate should have prepared and sent

LESSON TEXT—Luke 9:28-43a.

GOLDEN TEXT—And they were amazed at the mighty power of Got Luke 9:43.

Glory and grace go together. Spirituality finds meaning in serv-ice. Holiness is faith in action. lated into conduct.

This is the message of our lesson as it presents the transfigured Christ and the disciples, moved beyond intelligent words by His transcendent glory, going forth into the valley to meet the need of demon-ridden hu manity.

I. Amazing Glory (vv. 28-36). To three of the disciples came the privilege of seeing in the mount the outshining of the deity of Christ through the humanity of His flesh in such amazing glory that Peter uld think of nothing more wonderful than to prolong the experience

One could wish that it were possible in presenting this lesson to get read or hear, a proper conception of the glory of our Christ, but words the light of heavenly glory shining forth in a dazzling whiteness" (literally, like lightning)

If men would only look upon Him, who took upon Himself the limita-

II. Amazing Grace (vv. 37-43a) Like Peter, there are many folk who think that the thing to do is to remain on the mountaintop, just enjoying the vision of glory and the delightful fellowship of Christ and the redeemed. They do not learn such things from Christ or from the Word of God. The next day (v. 37) He and the disciples met the cry of an anguished father whose boy was possessed of a demon and who had found no help (v. 40). Look glory has just been revealed in the mount, who has just had the approval of God the Father (v. 35). who now in amazing grace meets the need of this humble child! There is the grace of God, manifest in the One whom we as Christians profess power of God to bear upon the need of men.

It seems to the writer of these notes that God is waiting to do a new thing in the midst of human of all to know Him ourselves, as our own Saviour and Lord. Then we need a vision of His glory, flooding our souls and transforming our lives (Rom. 12:1, 2). Then, we must put that glory and that power to work through our lives. The one who follows Christ cannot be satisfied to rejoice in his own salvation and not reach out to win others. He cannot rest in the peace of soul which Brownwood shopping. Close the petcock and when the gauge reads 5 pounds pressure, hold at the temperature for 5 minutes. Remove at once from the heat. Let the gauge return to zero and open the petcock slowly. Open the cooker carefully. The thermometer reading should be 228 degrees F. Repeat for 10 and 15 pounds pressure.

If the gauge is inaccurate, new gauge may be purchased. The gear gauges have been found to ive more satisfactory service than the spring gauges.

If the safety valve lets steam exhaust all the time, liquid is being drawn out of the jars in the cooker, and the product will not be satisfactory. Perhaps a new spring is needed for the valve. 





In the far north, in little native villages along the Alaska coastline, hundreds of Eskimo women and children are doing their part to win the war.

Soldiers on duty in that region must be furnished with warm clothing, and the War Department, through the Quartermaster Corps, has just arranged to buy an additional 5,000 pairs of mukluks, (skin boots), as well as parkas (fur outer garments), and fur pants, caps and mittens.

The American people today are dissatisfied with many phases of the war effort. In fact, many are growing bitter. The fact is that the average citizen little realizes the extent to which we are governed by well-organized blocks. The organized blocks exert their pressure on legislative bodies and other officials. They wield the balance of power for the simple reason that they can wield great blocks of votes.

The blocks keep highly-paid lobbyists in the capital. These lobbyists are there to get results. The fact is, the majordoes not rule. Our laws and legislative policies are determined largely by the organized minorities, who know what they want and how to get it.

Some of these blocks make enormous campaign contributions. Organized labor, for example, contributed the enormous sum of \$770,000 to the Democratic campaign in 1936. In 1940 the CI.O. assessed its members a total of \$800,000 to be used in the

The question with us then will be: Will Big Business or Big Labor run Big Govern-Or will the rest of us demand that Big Government run both? Is this to be the so-called "wave of the future"? Is liberty a burnt balloon? The great society of unorganized "duds" refuse to think so. Upon this stand of the great American majority and its refusal to be perpetually exploited by organized pressure blocks, will rest the future fate of the American democ-
