

As you have, no doubt, already learned through the papers and over the radio, our government is soon launching a nation-wide registratoin of civilian individuals for the purpose of rationing sugar.


The dates set for this registration and issuing the sugar booklets are May 4, 5, 6, and 7.







their service but with the resumption of such status at the time they leave the armed forces. Another would extend the coverage of the old-age and survivors insurance system to armed forces. The latter method it was suggested, would seem to be the more satisfactory, provided that "coordination could be effected with programs set up for persons in the regular armed forces and with the special programs for veterans' benefits."

"The coverage of employees of the federal government is particularly urgent," the report says, 'because large numbers of persons are entering navy yards. arsenals. or other government service. Many of these persons have left covered jobs in commerce and industry and will eventually return to such jobs. Unless their services with the government are covered, they will impair or lose their insured status under the old-age and survivors insurance program.

The social security board believes that expansion of the security program to compensate workers for wage losses resulting from permanent or temporary disability is now feasible In this connection, the report points out that a wage earner who is out of work because he is sick is not entitled to an unemployment benefit although his past work and earnings would have qualified him for benefits if he were well and available for a job. THE PLAIN CITIZEN IN TIME OF WAR By GEORGE C. HESTER

The plain, ordinary citizen in time of war often finds himself in a dilemma. On the one hand he is berated as being complacent and unaware to the realities of a war-time world. He is accused, for example, of going ahead with business as usual at a time when the world is engulfed in a conflagation and his own nation is in a grave emergency.

On the other hand, he is expected to bear his tax burden and be ready to assume additional burdens in the near future. He is also told that he must make any additional sacrifices in living habits, comforts, and the like, that may be deemed essential to the war effort.

Much of such advice, of course, appears somewhat contradictory to the average citizen. In the first place, he feels a sense of frustration when he sees the buzzing around and the intense activity of many phases of the war effort. He naturally feels that his part is so little and insiginificant.

He continues his daily routine in his profession or business. He can see little connection between what he is doing and the direct defense program. A feeling of inadequacy comes over him. He even wonders what he might do as a more direct and tangible contribution to his country in this hour of trial.

Such a citizen needs to acquire a broader conception of the war effort. A moment's reflection should convince anyone that there is much about a country that must proceed normally even in time of war. For example, business must go on. How else could it pay the taxes which are demanded. The millions of people who are not engaged in war industries must live. The business man who struggles against all sorts of disrupting adversities to keep his business going is making a definite contribution to this country's war effort. He is keeping people at work who otherwise might be unemployed. By this means, they too are enabled to pay taxes or purchase bonds.

But there are many other implications in this role of the average citizen. After all, the strength and stability of a country rests in the final analysis upon the soundness of its economic and social life. Here in the daily routine of the plain citizen is to be found the real essence and meaning of the American way of life. This way of life must go on, modified and adopted, of course, to Christians because father or mother belonged to the church, or because fit the needs of the emergency. Otherwise the very foundations of social stability would vanish.

Beyond this there are many other things which the average citizen can do as an aid to the war effort. He can keep himself informed. He can devote himself to clear thinking and unprejudiced judgment.

Moreover, by power and example he can inspire others. He can reflect a spirit of devotion and helpfulness. He can refuse to listen to the rantings of the demagogue. In his heart and mind he can be prepared to vote and act intelligently on the crucial issues ahead. Unless he keeps himself closely informed today, he will find himself in an intellectual vacuum when the hour for decision comes.




