1.- Each cup of honey contains about 1-4 cup liquid; therefore reduce 1-4 cup liquid per cup honey used when substituting honey for sugar. In baking products such as cakes or quick breads you may prefer this rule worked out by the Bureau of Home Economics: If you substitute medium thick honey for all the sugar in a cake or quick bread, reduce the liquid in the medium thick honey for half the sugar in a cake or quick bread reduce the liquid one-fourth.

PRICE FIXING IS NOT ENOUGH

By GEORGE C. HESTER

The price control recommendations of President Roosevelt came none too soon. America already is well along into the foothills of inflation. Whether or not the President's program will be effective in warding off undue rises in the price structure remains to be seen.

Suffice to say, there are many who entertain grave doubts about the effectiveness of such a program. They contend that the program contains certain vital defects, which in the course of time, will disrupt the whole system of price control unless other far-reaching policies and provisions are included in the general plan.

In the first place, it is doubtful that mere price fixing can prevent inflation. Moreover, it is dangerous to teach people that most citizens of the eastern porinflation can be avoided by the device of merely fixing prices. Price fixing is to inflation as a dam is to a stream. By building a dam, the flow of the stream may be checked, or even stopped temporarily. Sooner or later, however, it will overflow if the stream's volume is too great.

Let us remember that inflation is caused by a combination of two sets of circumstances. One of these is the supply of goods available for purchase. If the supply is low, prices will tend to rise. The other curcumstance is the monetary and credit policies. To control inflation one must control both prices and the supply

Few people realize the extent to which the virus of inflation has already been injected in our monetary policies during the past several years. The gold purchase policy, for example, has laid the basis for a tremendous expansion in the volume of money and credit. During that period, the government has bought over 20 billions in gold. It still stands ready to purchase every ounce in the universe that will be delivered to it

But the government used no money with which to purchase this gold. It merely deposited gold certificates equivalent to the gold purchased with the Federal Reserve Banks. Thus it autoally created the credit with which the gold was purchased. These certificates in turn can be used as a basis of expanding the currency to the unprecedented volume of two and one-half times se value of the certificates. > In the space usually reserved for postage stamps should be written, "Prisoner of war mail, postage free," Davis explained.

Similar procedure should be followed in addressing letters to interned civilians, but postage must be placed on such letters. No provisions for sending packages or money to prisoners held by the Japanese have been made as yet, he said

Twenty-five-word messages to residents of enemy or enemyoccupied territory may also be sent through the International Red Cross, on standard Red Cross forms, it was pointed out. Forms on which such messages must be sent, and regulations covering them have been distributed among the 3,700 Red Cross chapters throughout the nation. Applications by persons desiring to send a message to a resident in an enemy or enemyoccupied nation must be made to the local Red Cross Chapter.

Regulations for these messages do not apply to mail sent to American prisoners and interned civilians, it was explained.

UNITS TO CARIBBEAN

WASHINGTON, May 14.-To strengthen its chapters in the Caribbean and Canal Zone areas. the American Red Cross is shipping 12 complete 50-bed emergency medical station units. These units, similar to those sent last summer to Hawaii and the Philippine Islands, include all equipment, supplies and medicaments necessary to care for 50 casualties each requiring temporary hospital care.

Puerto Rico will receive six units, the Virgin Islands three and the Canal Zone three. Each is complete with cots, blankets linen, drugs, dressings, surgical instruments and supplies, hospital appliances, buckets, broom and lanterns for emergency


