ager of the Authority, said, is to describe the procedures to be used in developing the basin-wide water quality management plan for the Brazos Basin and adjacent Gulf Coast areas, present the stream standards and other factors on which the plan will be based, answer questions concerning the planning and offer an opportunity for public comment and suggestions.

The basin-wide plan is being developed by environmental engineers, water quality specialists and other staff members of the Authority under the direction of Carson Hoge, Director of Planning and Development for the Authority.

All or parts of 74 counties are included in the overall planning area, which comprises all of the Brazos River watershed and adjoining Gulf Coast areas. Public meetings are being held throughout this planning area to acquaint the general public with the plan and to assure that the final plan submitted to the Texas Water Quality Board meets the needs and desires of the people in the planning area.

The Governor's office, more than two years ago, designated the Brazos River Authority as the State agency to develop a plan for improving and protecting the quality of surface water in the 45,000 square miles of the planning area.

The State of Texas allocated \$300,000 for the planning effort. The Authority put up \$75,000 and received a \$75,000 grant from the Environmental Protection Agency to help pay part of the first year's cost.

"Meetings such as the one in Lubbock are necessary at this stage of the planning effort," Colonel Wells said, "to make sure the plans developed are responsive to the needs of the people throughout the planning area."

Hoge said man-made pollution

has not caused serious water quality problems in the Brazos watershed and "the plans being developed are aimed at controlling these problems before they occur, rather than waiting for the Brazos to become polluted and then trying to clean it up as has been the case with so many other streams."

As a part of the overall effort, preliminary plans are being developed for the above counties to meet effluent limitations and stream standards established by the Texas Water Quality Board under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972.

Colonel Wells said the planning effort is being carried out in close coordination with the Texas Water Quality Board and the Governor's Division of Planning Coordination, with a view and counsel from a Planning Advisory Committee consisting of representatives from federal, state and regional governmental units in the 74 county planning area. This committee provides overall policy direction in the planning and help assure that the plan being developed reflect the views of governmental units and the general public.

"However, the waste management facilities must be substantially completed by December 31 of this year to qualify for the assistance program," notes the Texas A&M University System specialist. "After that date, cost-sharing assistance will no longer be available for livestock and poultry waste management systems."

Custom feeding or "commercial" operations are not eligible. The engineer points out that the cost-sharing program is generally authorized for runoff control systems, aerobic and anaerobic lagoons, and liquid manure storage tanks.

"In addition to the waste management systems, numerous soil and water conservation and wildlife enhancement measures are also eligible for REAP assistance," notes Sweeten. "These include non-point

source pollution control practices such as terracing, tailwater recovery, reservoir construction and establishment of vegetative cover. The December 31, 1974 deadline does not apply to these operations."

The engineer points out that producers can apply for cost-sharing assistance at county ASCS offices. Technical assistance in system layout and design is available from the Soil Conservation Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture. All waste management systems must conform to regulations set up by the Texas Water Quality Board.

running about three months behind. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has assured Japanese textile leaders.

Faced with a record year in processing cotton, Texas cotton compresses have been unable to keep up with export demands.

Farmers Cooperative Compress, the largest single compress operation in the state, exports around 20 percent of its cotton to Japanese industry. Cooperative production this year jumped to a record 970,000 bales from a normal average of 600,000 bales annually.

White said the cooper-

ative's work has fallen 300,000 bales behind and smaller compresses throughout the state are facing similar delays.

A bumper 1973 crop is one reason for the problem. Texas produced 4.7 million bales in 1973, a 10 percent increase over 1972.

Backups in export shipment also have been complicated by a scarcity of vessels to carry cotton. Many ship owners have found it more profitable to haul general cargo.

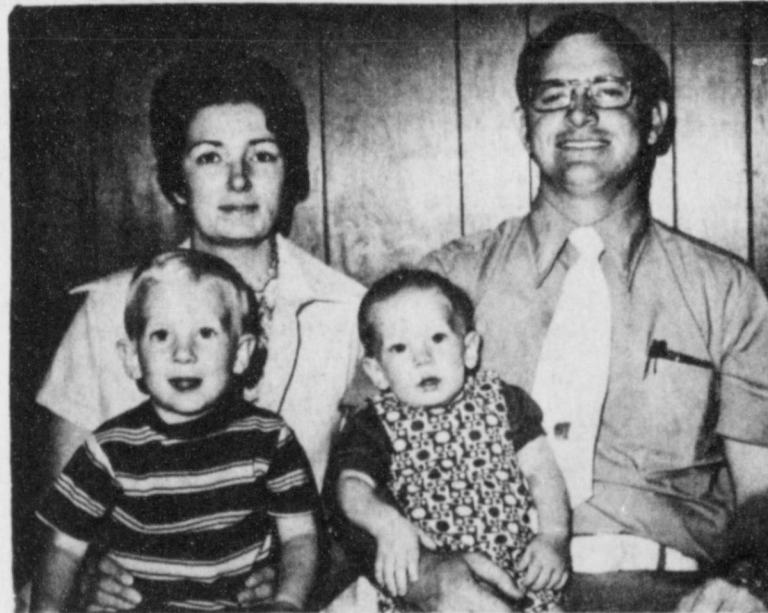

Ring bearer was the bride's nephew of Clovis, Michael Skaggs.

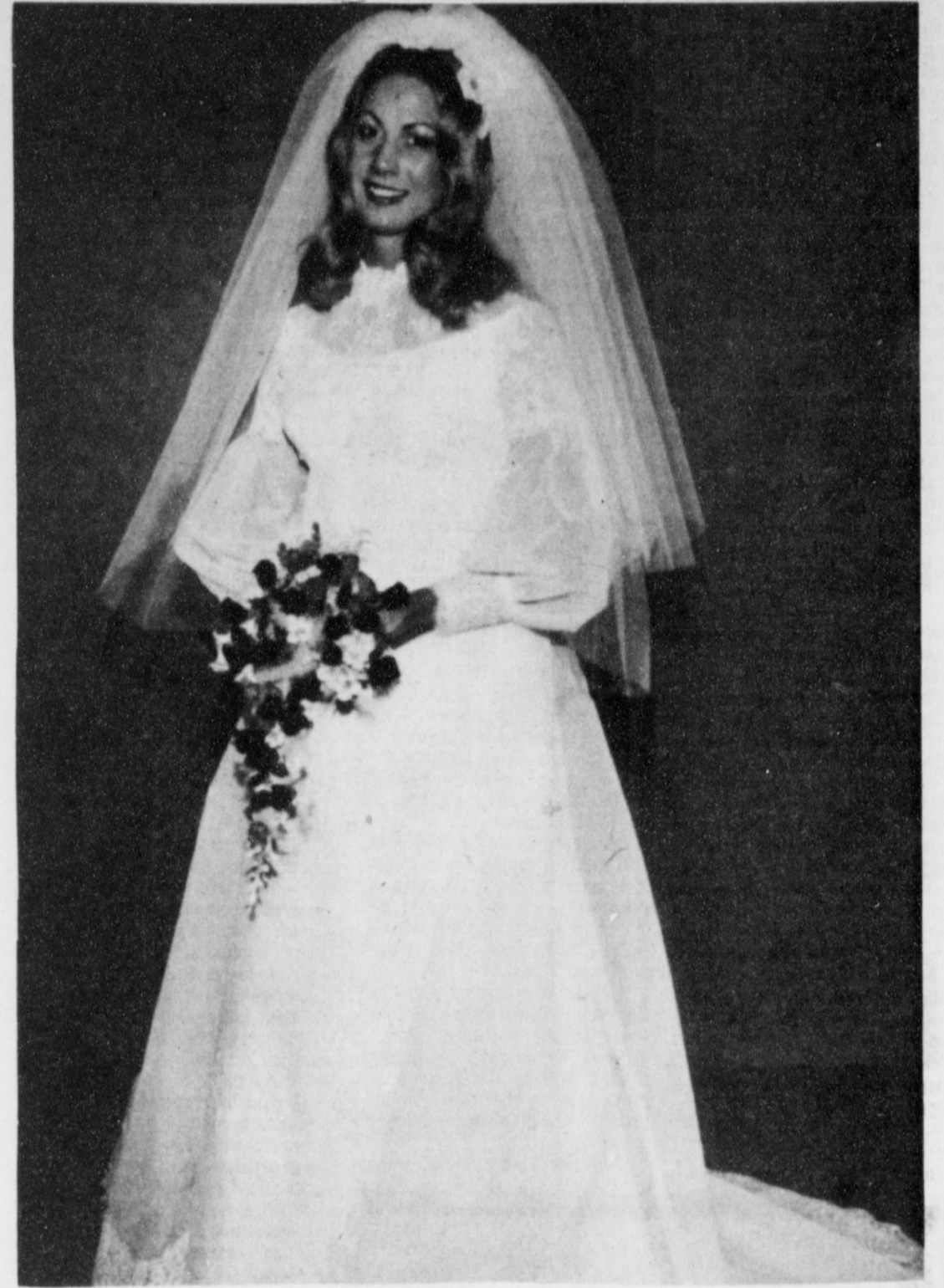
Rodney Turnbow, groom's brother served as best man and Val Stephens of Klondike and Ronald Scott of Muleshoe were groomsmen.

The bride is a graduate of Muleshoe High School and attended West Texas State University.

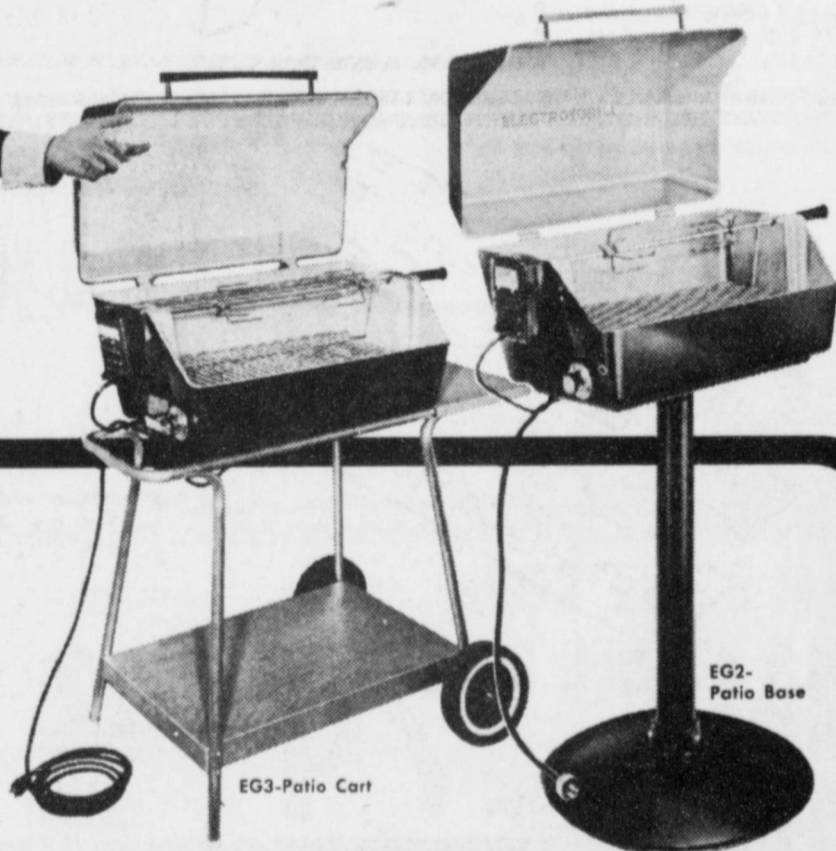

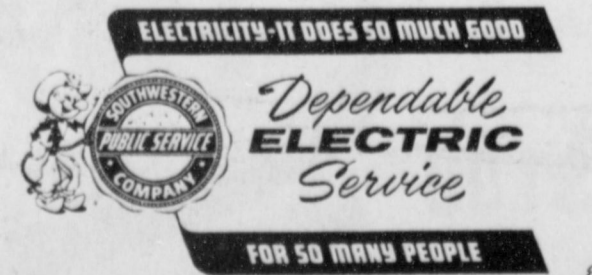

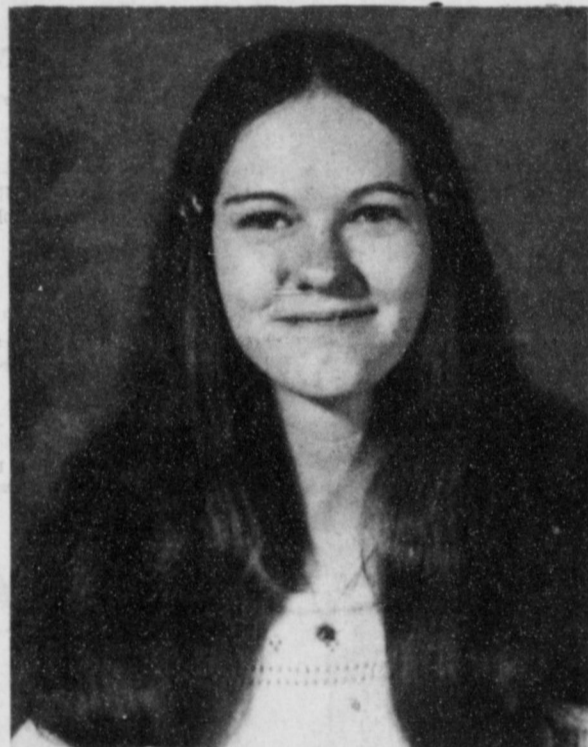

Infestation-Bank Grass Mites

Infestation by Banks grass mites in corn and sorghum seedlings in several counties on the High Plains has been noted by entomologists.

Highest infestation is noted in Deaf Smith, Castro, Farmer and Bailey Counties in Texas and in Curry County, New Mex.

Entomologists say the heaviest infestation is on corn and sorghum fields bordering wheat fields. The mites apparently are moving from wheat to corn and sorghum fields.

Chemicals labeled for use against mites on sorghum are Di-Syston, Thimet, and Cygon; and for corn Di-Syston and Thimet.

Jack King, research director for Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, said the situation is being studied and more information should be available soon.

Studies funded by TGSPB on the Banks grass mite are currently underway by scientists, Dr. Charles Ward of Texas Tech University and Dr. George Teetes of Texas A & M Univ.
