In accordance with page 11 of "Get in the Scrap," the official school salvage plan book, each Humphries, Goldthwaite 2; J. A. school must send in a report on the total poundage of all scrap Simpson, 1; W. C. Mayes, Gold- materials to State Superintendent of Public Instruction L. A. Woods. In addition to this record, it is necesary in order to enter this project, that each school send in a report on the number of pounds of scrap per pupil collected, by Nov. 1.

Selection of Pupils

From the salvage records of the schools the Texas Committee will choose the three schools in the state that have collected the three largest amounts by weight respectively per pupil. The principal of each of these schools will then have the pupils select the boy or girl in the school who has been most helpful in the Scrap Campaign

These three children (one from each school) together with the principal of the winning school will be sent to christen the Liberty Ship. Alternates may be selected if the candidates chosen cannot make the trip.

The traveling expenses of the principal and three children from each state will be paid by the American Industries Sal-

Texas USDA War Board.

The first job of the new committee will be to assist farmers and truckers hauling farm products and supplies in filling out applications for Certificates of War Necessity during national Key. farm truck registration days, October 22-24, the chairman explained.

Under a recent program announced by the Office of Defense Transportation, all farm trucks. trailors, buses. taxicabs and similar commercial vehicles will require Certificates effective November 15. Purpose of the program is to conserve equipment for war purposes.

Local Farm Transportation Committees, composed of five members, are headed by county USDA War Board chairmen. Other members include two farmers, one truck driver and one farm supply dealer.

Operators subject to the new registration order will not be able to obtain gasoline, tires or parts without Certificates of War Necessity, Vance said in explaining the importance of filling out applications.

Application blanks for the Cer-tificates of War Necessity are being mailed by the Office of Deeach truck and commercial vehicle owner, making it unnecessary to write in for the blanks. As the mailings are completed in each ODT district, full annuoncement will be given, after which anyone who failed to receive a blank will be advised how to retain one.

Small Towns And The War


Richard Johnson, writing in the magazine "Domestic Commeree," says that the small towns of the Southwest are doing as well as the large cities under war conditions, if not better. As Mr. Johnson points out, it was said a few months ago that

the process of gearing the nation to war would be ruinous to the small towns. I seems that the pessimism was not justified.

No doubt, there are many towns whose residents will disagree with this optimistic report. Towns differ as much as cities in the conditions which determine their prosperity.

But the fact that the towns, most of them. are the own, shows how easy it is for prophets of doom to be wrong takes more courage to be a pessimist than an optimist. For this reason, no matter how fair prospects may be, there is always some one ready to point out that disaster is coming.

Undoubtedly, as the war requires more and more sacrifices, residents of the small towns will experience their full share of hardship but. it is safe to say, that when victroy comes, the small centers of culture and trade will flouirsh as usual. As a matter of fact, the process of urban decentralization, which was evident before the war, is likely to be more helpful to the towns in the future than it has been in the past.




