#### MORE ABOUT YAMS

Southern families who take sweet potatoes for granted in their daily meals are .'one up" on folks in the North who use this vegetable only as an occasional variation. Because of their yellow color sweet potatoes are rich in Vitamin A. They also furnish some Vitamins B-1, C and G.

Hazel Phipps, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, explains that the sweet potato family is divided into two main groups. On one side there is the moist sweet potate with deep orange-colored flesh. It is often called a "yam." Then three is the dry sweet potato with mealy pulp of a lighter yel-

THE GREATEST economic casualty of the war is the small business men. They have folded up by tens of thousands. And the end is not yet. Reports from Washington tell of still greater squeezes that are being planned.

While to some extent, such business concerns are logical victims of the wa reconomy, they are, to an even larger extent, the victims of unwise governmental policies and the gross official indifference to what is happening.

We are today pulling down many of the vital principles of democratic government. Among these are such fundamental and Mrs. Chas. Rudd and fam-American institutions as state rights, local self-government, the lily. freedom of contract, and many personal liberties. We are giving up these things now in order to win the war. We fervently hope they will be restored later.

But the destruction of small business is something that reaches far beyond the war economy. Every war, as someone ter. remarked, "is decided only after the war." The great issues at stake in the struggle for democracy will be settled finally in the domestic battle beyond the war.

Few things could have a more far-reaching effect upon the American economy, both in war and peace, than the short sighted policy of destroying small enterprise. Nothing could do more F. S. While war conditions in the United States do not at present should be given to the fact that tuberculosis deaths in England and Wales increased 12 per cent between 1939 and 1941.

Dr. Cox outlined the symptoms of tuberculosis as rodinarily being fatigue, poor appetite, digestive disturbances, loss of weight, afternoon or night fever, orrhage, night sweats, and anetion given to determine whether or not tuberculosis is present. If this disease is diagnosed at its earliest stages, Dr. Cox declared that a great percentage of the cases can be cured.

THE MEANING OF CHURCH

LESSON TEXT—Colossians 3:1-17.
GOLDEN TEXT—Now ye are the bot
Christ, and members in particularrinthians 12:27.

Church membership means a great deal; a fact which has been bscured by the prevalent idea that joining the church is just like joining any other organization. We need to be reminded again and again that the local or denominational organiof true believers who, by the new birth, have become part of the living and true church, which is the body of which Christ is the Head.

It is likewise essential that be lievers know what their membership in the church means, so that they may fully appreciate it and properly

I. A New Life (vv. 1-3). The church member is (or should be) a Christian, that is, one who has passed from death to life through the regenerating work of God in Christ (John 3:6, 7). Thus he has become "a new creature; old things have passed away; behold all things are become new" (II Cor. 5:17).

This new spiritual being has en-tirely changed interests and desires. The things of the world which he used to love have now become distasteful to him. The things of the Spirit which used to seem strange and not understandable to him (I Cor. 2:14) now become the center of his life. Being risen with Christ newness of life he seeks those things which are above.

II. A Changed Life (vv. 4-13). Setting one's heart upon things above means that the life will be changed. There will be a putting off of the things of earth and a putting on of the new man, in practice as well as in creed.

Although the Christian is a new creature in Christ, he bears with him until he dies (or Jesus comes) the old nature, which tries to hold him down, to draw him back to the worldly and fleshly things from which he was saved.

But the Christian is to "make no provision for the flesh, to fulfill the lusts thereof" (Rom. 13:14). He is rather to "reckon" himself "to bedead indeed unto sin, but alive into God through Jesus Christ our Lord."

This portion of Scripture merits a closer examination. Note first that Christian graces into a whole which is harmonious and well-balanced.

Naturally, the peace of Christ will be the ruling factor in such a life, controlling the heart, the seat of man's emotions and affections.

Such a life is cultivated and de-

veloped by the indwelling of God's Word and (note it) "richly." The weakness of many a church is found right here—there is so little teaching and receiving of the Word into the heart.

Christian faith expresses itself in song. "Thou hast put gladness in my heart" (Ps. 4:7), and that means song. How true it is that hymns and songs teach and admonish us. Dear Mom; I havn't had much time to write much. How is Grand Dad? I have some news that I believe will be of interest to him.

We flew across the channel for the third time yesterday, and this time the hop was a long one instead of just over to the channel ports. We went deep into the heart of the industrial Germany and bombed targets there with great success.

It was a special trip for me because I made it for you and Grand Dad.

We passed down the strip just east of the Meuse River on the way out.

As we passed over the Luxemburg, I looked down to the west, and toward Steany, and the Argonne. In my mind I could see a U.S. National Cemetary down there, with those white crosses. I picked out one in partcular-the place where dad sleeps. I saluted him, and I said, "Dad, here comes Jimmy. That Armistice you told us about in your letter didn't last much longer than 20 years, and I've come to whip a dirty paperhanger, just like you came to whip the Kaiser."

And I said, 'I'm the bombardier in this crate tonight, and on this night I'm going to be the best bombardier in the world. These babies are going for the targets-all for you.

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
