



Congressman O. C. Fisher of the 21st Texas District, in a letter this week to the Eagle, says he has introduced in the House a bill-H. R. No. 1578-which would provide for taxation by the states and their political subdivisions of real property acquired for military purposes.

Mr. Fisher says: "As public officials and others of Mills County had advised me of the need for a compensation for the land taken from the tax rolls, I felt your readers would be interested. A similar measure has been introduced in the Senate. and I am hopeful of seeing the proper action being taken by the Congress in the near future."

The bill provides that all real property in the United States which, since January, 1940, has been or shall be acquired by purchase, condemnation or otherwise by the U.S. for military purposes together with improvements, shall remain subject to taxation by the state and political subdivisions in which such property is located.

in any proportion agreed upon. If separate returns are filed one may not report income which belongs to the other, but must report only the income which belongs to him (or her)

No person is exempt from filling a return if his gross income is equal to or greater than the amount specified above for his classification. Neither the President of the United States, nor the Vice President, nor Fedral Judges, nor Members of Congress, are exempt from filling returns. Moreover, all income from whatever sourse, unless specifically excluded by statute, must be reported in the return. The

types of income specifically exempt are listed in instructions accompanying the return form

A person whose gross income does not exceed \$3000, and consists wholly of salary, wages, divdends, interests, or annuities, may make a Simplified Return as he testified. First he called the on Form 1040A, in which the tax
