



THE WAR IS DOING THINGS TO US By J. S. BOWLES

DOSSIBLY THERE IS no better authority on the delinquencies of our people than J. Edgar Hoover. He has a right to know because it is his business to know. The figures which he gives are appalling: they may be found in any of our papers.

One of the things that confronts our people, both young and old, when they go to our cities is a sense of disillusionment. They have gone seeking a wider field of social life, a broader field of social activity. They are disappointed; things are not what they had expected. They are sadly disappointed. They spend a few days seeking companionship, with indifferent success, and life takes on a gloomy picture. They had expected a large circle of friends and acquaintances, but they are as much alone as if they were upon an unhabited island. Unfortunately they sometimes seek companionship, but seek it in the wrong way, and the wrong place. They find companionship, but it is to their own undoing

There is not a city in the land where there are not tragedies from wrong associations that are heartbreaking. We find them everywhere

This is not true of all who go to the cities. There is not a church or a lodge, or a club in any great city the main force of which is not constituted of people from our rural districts. These are they who sought association among the best to be found. But, alas, all who go to the cities are not actuated by the spirit that brings about such happy results.

Some time ago I asked a lady of intelligence and culture where she attended church. She admitted that neither she nor any member of her family attended any church. Then, with a tone of sadness, she said that when she came to the city she lost her church identity, and lost the religious life of her family. She had been a faithful and useful member of a small church in the country, where she taught in the little Sunday School, and was happy in her work. She had joined a large church in the city where she had no interest, had nothing to do, and as a result she drifted with her large family out into the world of forgotten people. Had she gone into one of the smaller churches where she was in demand, her story would have been quite different.

Yes, the very best type of citizenship of any great city are the recruits from the country. These are they, however, who seek the best. Some of the most hopelessly lost to be found are also from the country. They simply drifted with the tide, always downward, and found their level in ruin.

More Canned Food For Civilians Civilians will gain 30 million cases of canned fruits and vegetables as a result of reduced government requirements. The reductions are mainly for corn, peas, spinach, tomatoes, snap beans, fruit cocktail, sweet cherries, peaches, pineapple, and pineapple juice. Since the 1943 production is not known, current point values for these items will not be immediately affected.
