# Proclamation

## TO THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES

### Proclamation

RECOGNIZING THE FACT that in carrying the war into enemy territory, we shall need greater amounts of money than any nation has ever asked from its citizens in all history, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, do officially proclaim that on Thursday, the ninth of September, 1943, the Third War Loan shall be launched.


As Commander-in-Chief, I hereby invoke every citizen to give all possible aid and support to this Third War Loan drive, not only so that our financial goal may be reached, but to encourage and inspire those of our husbands and fathers and sons who are under fire on a dozen fronts all over the world. It is my earnest hope that every American will realize that in buying War Bonds in this Third War Loan he has an opportunity to express voluntarily and under the guidance of his conscience, the extent to which he will "back the attack."

The American people supported well the first and second War Loan drives and in fact did even more than was asked of them. Our need for money now is greater than ever, and will continue to grow until the very day that Victory is won; so we must ask far more sacrifice, far more cooperation than ever before.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DONE at the City of Washington, this twenty-sixth day of July, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and forty-three, and of the Independence of the [SEAL] United States of America the one hundred and sixty-eighth.

**IN MEMORIAM**  
**C. H. FORD DEAD**

Chas. H. Ford, one of the long-time residents of Goldthwaite, died early last Friday morning at his home here. He was 85 years old, and moved to Goldthwaite in December, 1899, living here until his death.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. B. A. Myers and Rev. D. A. Bryant at the home Friday, August 27, at 5 p. m. Interment followed in Odd Fellows Cemetery.

Chas. Henry Clay Ford was born at Dato, Illinois, on June 7, 1858. He was the son of Daniel Hazelton and Eliza Ann Ford, and was the last of four boys to pass away. His youngest brother preceded him in death only a few weeks. He has two sisters surviving him, Mrs. Ella Carpenter of Lisbon, Iowa, and Mrs. Josephine Russell of Grand Island, Neb.

While still a young man, he moved to Kansas with his mother, brothers and sisters, following the death of his father in 1880. He married Della Alice Clements on March 19, 1889, at Thayer, Kansas. Five children were born to this union, two boys and three girls, three of whom survive: Mrs. Ruth Dyes of Killeen, Mrs. Edith Harbour of Fort Worth, and Phil H. Ford of Abilene. There are also surviving 13 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

C. H. Ford was converted and joined the Baptist Church at Prairie Center, Ill., in 1878. Pallbearers at the funeral were his nephews: Otis Hutchings, Ira Hutchings, John Edlin, Phillip Nickols, James Nickols, and Duke Clements.
