DAIRY CHECK-UP

COLLEGE STATION, June 4-Five check points that are important to Texas dairy farmers right now are listed by the Extension dairy husbandmen of Texas A. and M. College.

The dairy husbandmen beieve a check-up on the following items will help boost production:

1. Water supply-Cows need more water this time of year, They will drink more if the water is clean, cool and conveniently located.

2. Sour milk-Always a problem in the late spring and summer months. Souring can be stopped by producing clean milk and cooling it to 55 degrees Fahrenheit within two hours after milking.

3. Horn flys-pests that occupy a cow's time when she should be producing milk. Horn flys can be controlled by spraying back, sides, legs and bellies with one pound of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder in 25 gallons of water.

4. Good, green grass—a cheap feed that always brings a rise in milk production and cuts many herd health problems. Dairymen can make green feed last longer by mowing weeds and alternating grazing.

5. Kind treatment—a necess ity in the management of dairy cows, now and throughout the year. Rough treatment and high production are seldom found together on a dairy farm.



Health Notes

"It is an unfortunate fact that some people are willing to risk their health-possibly even their lives-by prescribing for themselves and taking a drug that they have read about somewhere and which has been termed a 'miracle drug'," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Although such drugs as penecillin, streptomycin, thiouracil and sulfa drugs have been of great value in combating diseases that have heretofore been very difficult to control. nevertheless, they can be very dangerous products in untrained hands. They were never intended to be used promiscuously for self-medication," the State Health Officer asserted.

If a pharmacist refuses to sell a particular drug and explains Progress on the postwar build- that it cannot be supplied without a physicion's prescription the would-be purchaser should not become provoked. That pharmacist is giving sound public health advice and is also complying with the law. The State Health Officer declared that self-medication is never advisable, and even "miracle drugs" should be taken only when a doctor prescribes them.





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

MAKING REFORMS SUCCEED

LESSON TEXT-II Kings 22:10, 11; 23:1-5, 21. MEMORY SELECTION-Give me u derstanding, a Psalm 119:34

God can bring blessing out of the most unpromising of circumstances Yes, and men can make chaos out

of God's greatest gifts. The good Josiah became king at eight years of age, and was surrounded by godly counselors who helped him become an outstanding ruler for God. When he was sixteen ne had a real religious experience (II Chron. 34:3), and at twenty he began to purge Judah and Jerusalem of idols and wickedness.

I. A Book Found and Read (22:10,

11; 23:1, 2). The Word of God had been neglected for about sixty years. How sad! Yes and how sad that in our homes the Bible is so often neglected—on a book shelf, or in a trunk, or gathering dust on a living room table. A lost Bible, and a people living in sin! How much we need to push aside the rubbish in our lives and bring out our "lost"

Observe that they not only found the book. but they read it. That was true of the ones who found it as well as of those to whom they passed it on. What a good thought we have there: read the Bible, yes,

In Josiah's day it was thus first

1. By the King.

The ruler or rulers of the people need to return to God's Word in our day. It is all too often neglected in the council chambers of the nations.

Josiah was moved by what he read to real repentance. He realized that the judgment of God must come. Inquiry at Jerusalem brought word from Huldah the prophetess that it would come, but not in Josiah's day.

The king was not content to keep this word to himself, and insisted that it be read

2. By the religious leaders The priests and the prophets who doubly guilty in neglecting it were now brought face to face with

God's revelation. Who will say that the great need in America is not just this, that its preachers and denominational leadteaching of God's Word. Book reviews, lectures in economics and politics, discussions of one worldalmost anything but the Bible. Such is the fare of many of our preachers. No wonder that they and their people are spiritually starved.

Josiah knew what was needed and the Word was now read

Applying that to our day, it is true that the Bible is our best seller, that it is available to every home, and that most decent households are they being read? The answer is obviously no. Let's correct that dreadful situation. Read your Bible!

II. A Book Believed and Practiced (23:3-5, 21). Josiah saw that it was not enough to read and rejoice over the Word of God. Something must be done

1. The king made a covenant with Standing in a prominent place be fore his people, he humbly and solemnly renewed his consecration to the Lord, and promised to abide by his Word with all his heart and soul (v. 3). Such a leader could not but inspire his people to do the

What a blessing it is to us when we hear of some man prominent in the affairs of the nation or state who loves the Lord, and keeps his commandments. He is not only an inspiring example, but a real witness for God.

2. The priests cast out the idols The king required this of them, and they proceeded thus to cleanse the places of worship and prepare

the way for a true devotion to God. Here again we say that when re-ligious leaders get back to their first devotion to God and put away the empty philosophies of this world, we shall see a revival. What did the people do? Josiah

saw that they needed some positive expression of their faith. It was not enough to tear down the idols; they must re-establish the true worship of God. So we find that 3. The people kept the Passover.

This was the great feast of the Jews which spoke of redemption from bondage. It pointed forward to Christ the Redeemer from sin. He is our Passover (I Cor. 5:7). In these dark and bewildering

days people are looking to Christian leaders to prepare a feast of re-membrance of the death of Christ and of his glorious redemption. Let the people gather round him and, cleansed by his precious blood, keep the feast with joy and purity of heart (I Cor. 5:8).



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
