GOVERNOR VOTES 'FOR' AMENDMENT

Austin, August 19-Before absentee ballot in the election on the College Building Plan consitiutional amendment to be voted on Saturday. The Governor voted "FOR" the amendment.

He said: Adoption of this amendment will provide an orderly and proper way for meeting the pressing demands upon our higher educational institutions for increased facilities for veterans and other students. The plan has been carefully worked out, approved by all higher educational institutions, adopted by a two-thirds vote in both houses of the Texas Legislature, and is generally approved by all students of the problem. It can be carried out with no increase in taxes. In my opinion, every voter in Texas should favor the Amendment."

It comes from Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Stanley, and Lloyd Dean of San Angelo; Stewart's groduation from Bon J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. & M College

1. Cut old blossoms and seed pods from crepe myrtle and other plants. It will keep them blooming longer.

2. Make out bulbs to plant this fall. An early order gets the choice ones.

3. Order flower seeds to be planted this fall. Calendula, petunia, dianthus, pansy, stock, hardy poppies, cornflower, scabiosa and candytufts are recommended.

4. Chrysanthemums are heavy feeders; they need a monthly shot of commercial fertilizer and plenty of water. Stake plants. Pinch off some of the early buds.

5. If you have any thin spots in the lawn, mow the grass high, fertilize and water.

6. After perennial phlox and verbena have passed their glory, cut the tops back pretty severly, fertilize and water for lots of late blooms.

7. Trim back limbs and twigs from shrubs and shade trees that are growing out of proportion for the rest of the plant.

8. While your plants are still in bloom make a few notes on the changes you will want to make for next season.

Last year more than 3,500 American children under the age of 14 were killed by automobiles, 160,000 were injured. This State, in some degree, contributed to that toll.

With school days here again, child casualties will rise unless erry individual driver makes it his self-appointed responsibility to safeguard these young lives from harm.

When driving through school zones—and streets where children are at play-use extreme caution. Always be ready for split-second action, even though moving at moderate speed. Anticipate the unexpected.

There's no indemnity that can restore a human life. If, because of one careless act of yours, a child died or its young body were maimed-could you ever forget?
