

## and a seed crop the following day, September 20. Served Coldthwaite For 40 Years



Wonder how many who are reading this have spent a year in every room in the above old rock Goldthwaite School Building, which served as the public schools here for 40 years? The front section of the old building, built in 1890, was the entire school until about 1910, when the back annex was added. The entire building was torn down in 1929 when the new Grammar School Building was built. The present high school building was built in 1913 to take care of the over-crowded conditions of the old rock buildings. In the picture above, the writer as well as many others in Mills County started in the first grade in the room just to the left of the entrance. Promoted to second grade, you started next year in the front room to the right., and so on until you finished 11 years in the top of the back annex to the left. The corner stone of the rock building pictured was laid by the Goldthwaite Chapter I. O. O. F. on August 22, 1890, and when the building was torn down it was placed in the east center of the new Grammar School building in 1929. This corner stone bears the date August 22, 1890, and the names of the Building Committee: P. H. Clements, D. H. Trent, John Cormack, J. L. Lewis, J. B. Ferguson, C. P. Beaty, and J. A. Austin. B. Lammer's name appears as builder. From 1885, when the town was founded, until 1890, the Goldthwaite Public Schools were located in a two-story plank building just down the hill south from the Eagle Office, and upon opening of the new rock school building the pupils marched from the old to the new.

The Eagle would like a list of persons now living who attended school in the old wood building and of those who attended the first year of the opening of the new rock building above. Will you please write a card or letter, or let the editor know? Pupils and students going to the Goldthwaite Schools today-citizens of tomorrow-can't realize how much the ones who started in the left front room of the picture above would give to turn back the calendar 57, 59, 40 or even 30 years-and be able to start to school again at the age of 7, 8, 9 or even 10.

## **BOAT RACES AT**

Brownwood. Sept. 18-West Texas' first major national sports event will be held at Lake Brownwood Saturday, Sunday, and Monday-the National Outboard Championship Races.

Racing drivers from every section of the United States have entened the Regatta, which will determine the 1947 U.S. champon in five classes and two run about boat classes.

The Brownwood Junior Chamber of Commerce, sponsors f the national races in cooperation with the American Power Boat Association, is offering \$4, 200 in cash prizes and trophies. In addition, a Governor's Cup will go to the driver winning the

most points in the races. Governor Beauford Jester is to make the presentation of the Governor's Cup in person Sunday afternoon.

There will be two days of racing-Saturday and Sundaywith one-mile speed trails set for Monday.

A new plan calls for championship races both Saturday and Sunday. Originally there would have been qualifying trials Saturday with the championship heats Sunday.

There will be 18 races Saturday. From 10 a. m. until noon there will be qualifying races for Class T and C hydroplane and for C-Service runabouts.

Sunday qualifying heats for Class B and F hydroplane and C racing runabout will be run from 10 a, m. until noon.

Sunday afternoon will see championship races for Class M. B, and F hydroplane and for Class C racing runabout.
