**YEARS AGO—**

September marking the  
anniversary of the cap-  
ture of Mexico City by Ameri-  
cans, the little known  
of the San Patricio Bat-  
talion of deserters is told by  
Mahoney in the current  
of Southwest Review pub-  
lished by the University Press.  
A traffic unit fighting un-  
der the Mexican flag was com-  
posed of Americans who had  
been with General Zachary  
Taylor at the Rio Grande in  
1847 and only to be victimized by  
propaganda of General  
Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna,  
then commander of the Mexican troops  
at Tampico.  
and two at a time they  
were led from the hardships of  
starvation and enforced dis-  
cipline. At least 260 slipped  
across the Rio Grande. There  
they organized as an artillery  
unit and ably demonstrated  
fighting ability against  
former comrades at Buena  
Vista and Churubusco before  
being captured.  
Military punishment was  
meted out in the 1840's and two  
court-martials decided the  
fate of the captives. Four

were pardoned, 50 were ordered  
hanged, and 11 were sentenced  
to 50 lashes each and branding  
by a red-hot iron with the letter  
"D" on their cheeks.

According to Mr. Mahoney,  
the only known tribute to the  
San Patricio Battalion was a  
curious cross standing for years  
in a little Mexican churchyard—  
inscribed with a gamecock, a  
pair of dice, and a skull and  
crossbones. It was erected by a  
sentimental visitor who later  
pondered how the deserters had  
gambled with fate, fought bravely,  
and died.
