WHEREAS, each year preventable fires claim the lives of thousands of our citizens, both young and old, and cause permanent disability or painful injury to countless others; and WHEREAS, the destruction by fire of our natural and created resources has almost doubled during the past decade, and cost this nation more than five hundred and sixty million dollars in the year 1946; and WHEREAS, this ravage, if unabated, threatens an even

more calamitous loss of life and waste of material wealth; and WHEREAS, the program premulgated at the President's Conference on Fire Prevention held at Washington in May, 1947, is designed to assist in stemming the tide of death and destruction from fires:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, HARRY S. TRUMAN, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate the week beginning October 5, 1947, as Fire Prevention Week.

I earnestly request every citizen to eliminate all possible causes of destructive fire in his home and in his place of business, and I urge that vigilance against fire be extended beyond Fire Prevention Week and zealously continued throughout the year. I invite State and local governments, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, the National Fire Waste Council, the American National Red Cross, business and labor organizations, churches and schools, civic groups, and agencies of the press, the radio, and the motion-picture industry to cooperate fully in the observance of Fire Prevention Week with the objective of iniating a fire prevention campaign continuing throughout the year. I also direct the appropriate agencies of the Federal Government to assist in every feasable way in arousing the public to the seriousness of the fire prob-

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed. DONE at the City of Washington this fourteenth day of August in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fortyseven, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and seventy-second.



Sometimes the animals appeared to stretch to the horizon, packed so closely together that the track could not be cleared. In 1873, the Santa Fe shipped more than 250,000 hides. The bones were collected for fertilizer. 



OCTOBER 5 - 11 FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Do you want to add more digits to your bank book? Do you need a new house—or want a new car—do you want to live longer?

Then you should be interested in the thing that is keeping many persons in the United States from realizing these same desires--fire.

In the face of this country's worst housing shortage, last year fire burned up enough timber and lumber to build 200,000 five-room houses. That would mean one new home for every man, woman and child in the cities of Austin, Galveston and Texas City.

Fire destroyed 600,000 buildings and homes in the United States last year with a property damage alone of \$561,000,000. If the State had this amount to distribute, every Texan would receive over \$93 each.

Last year when this nation stood aghast at the tremendous loss of man days of work because of strikes and industrial disputes, fire caused a loss of more than one-quarter as many man days of work, or approximately 25,000,000 man days which would be enough working time to make nearly 1,000,000 badly needed automobiles. This would supply everyone in Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth with one new automobile.

Approximately 11,000 persons were burned to death and more than 20,000 persons were injured in fires last year. Totaled these figures would equal the entire populations of Denton and Corsicana.

The careless disposal of lighted cigarettes and home folks. matches is the principal cause of all fires, says State Fire Insurance Commissioner Marvin Hall. He estimates that about 120,000 fires last year were from this cause alone.

Hall urges that every Texan accept as his indivilual responsibility adoption of fire prevention at home and at work, not only during Fire Prevention Week, October 5 through 11, but throughout this year. Only then, he says, can we realize some of our dreams through saving from unnecessary and preventable G. W. Absher and Mrs. Mary T.

NEW FIFTH COLUMN

A carefully prepared speech bristling with pernent statistics was delivered by Cong. Ed Gossett of Texas, July 2nd, in the House, entitled "New Fifth lace of Mullin were visitors to Column or the Refugee Racket." Copies for general Goldthwaite Monday. distribution contain the statement "Not Printed at Government Expense."

Congressman Gossett points out that we have reason to be 'proud of the strong immigrant blood that went into the building of this country," but adds that "the blood now offered means weakness and pollution." Today, he says, there are no jobs to fill, adding that not only have times and conditions changed, "but family so have the immigrants." Of the immigrants that came here last year, not over 1 per cent went to farms and at least 95 per cent settled in overcrowded cities.

Following World War 1 Congress passed carefully throught-out immigration laws which aimed to protect place Sunday night. American institutions and American standards of living and these laws were liberal. These laws, he holds, should be strengthened rather than weakened. From Europe generally, these quotas permit the entry of about 154,000 persons a year. These laws impose no quotas whatsoever on countries of the Western Hemisphere. Even from quota countries, many persons above and beyond the 154,000 a year are admitted, such as wives and minor children of American citizens clergymen, professors and certain classes of merchant seamen. In addition, we allowed to come in some 100, 000 war brides and naturalized 110,000 aliens serving in the armed Forces of the U.S. A. Besides the foregoing considerations, inequities in the laws were removed.

In 1920, one out of every five persons of voting age in this country was a foreigner. In a number of cities in the Northeast the ration of foreign-born to native-born is about 1 to 3. Says Congressman Gossett: "No other nation in the world has so large a percentage of foreign-born folks."



And the result is that British industrial recovery has been disrupted.

Socialism saps the vitality of people. It exalts mediocrity. It turns nations into poor-houses. That, in essence, is the terrible tragedy that has befallen Eng-


