## GAME COMMISSION ABANDONS CAMP BOWIE GAME PRESERVE

Monday morning the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission meeting in Austin decided to abandon its plan to purchase 55,000 acres out of the Camp Bowie Maneuver area for the purpose of establishing the first "game demonstration area" in Texas. The Commission decided not to exercise its priority on the land after organizations in Brown and Mills Counties had protested strongly that the land should be offered for sale to the original owners, part of the maneuver area lies in Mills County.

A delegation from Brownwood was in Austin Monday morning but was not heard. They carried resolutions from many Brownwood organizations and from the Goldthwaite Lions Club protesting against the es-

At a meeting held in the Fire Hall here last Thursday night, the Goldthwaite Volunteer Fire Department was reorganized, many new members added, and a good practice session was held after the business meeting.

In order to hold the city's fire insurance rate, the State Fire Insurance Commission demands that two practice meetings be held each month. The dates for practice as set for the Goldthwaite Volunteers are the second and fourth Tuesday nights in each month, and Fire Chief Jack Reid stressed the importance of every member who possibly could showing up at every meeting. The meetings will be held at the Fire Station.

The local telephone company has asked that people discontinue calling in to find out where fires are, after an alarm has been called in. All operators are busy notifying volunteer firemen the location of a fire, and any unnecessary calls to the switchboard delay them just that much.

Attention is called to the City Ordinances against parking automobiles or other vehicles in front of fire plugs, and against following fire trucks to fires. Both these ordinances are now being violated in the city.

## Veterans To Meet Here Sunday Afternoon To Organize Reburial Squads For World War II Dead

At the regular second Tuesday night meeting of Mills County Post Veterans of Foreign Wars Plans were made to form burial teams for reburial of Mills County's World War II dead which are expected to begin arriving here early in November. Also discussion was had on the part Mills County veterans are to have in the dedication of the Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery on Sunday, November 9, two days before Armistice Day.

Post Commander Jesse Moreland and Post Adjutant Jesse J. Saegert presided at the meeting. A motion to endorse the Lions Club resolution asking Goldthwaite stores to close 30 minutes

before until 30 minutes after each funeral of the returned war dead was adopted.

A call joint meeting of the VFW and the American Legion is to be held in Legion Hall next Sunday afternoon at three o'clock to organize burial teams and practice, to which any war veteran in Mills County, regardless of whether he belongs to either organization, is invited to attend if he is willing to help out in the reburial program.

Three complete teams are to be organized and practice started if enough volunteers are present. Veterans having American Legion rifles or any bolt-action rifle is requested to bring it in for practice.

The local Goldthwaite High School Eagles, holding a good record this year, will enter their fourth game of the season tonight against the Lutheran Concordia College of Austin, with advantages pointing toward an edge for the Eagles. The game will start at 8 o'clock at the Eagle Field.

Another break for the Eagles will be their home territory, carrying considerable weight in the outcome of a football game.

The visitors range in size from 207 pound J. Preece playing right tackle on the starting lineup to B. Gruetzner, 90 pounds traveling with the reserves in a backfield position. They will be on Eagle Field at eight o'clock tonight sporting orange jerseys and black numerals to fight it out with Kirby's Eagles.

Aside from the score, the game played here last Friday night between the Goldthwaite Eagles and the San Marcos Cubs had more spectator appeal than any game in several seasons. 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## Navy Medals Ready For Issue At Brownwood Navy Recruiting Station

B. L. Owens, CFC, USN, Recruiter in charge of the Brownwood Navy Recruiting Station now has a supply of American Defense Medals with Clasps and World War II Victory Medals ready for issue to eligible Navy Veterans. To be eligible for the above medals, veterans must have been separated from the Navy under Honorable Conditions. Enlisted personnel must present their original discharge certificates and officer personnel must present a certified copy of orders releasing them to inactive duty under honorable conditions. Any exception to the above will be explained by the recruiter.

The American Defense Medal will be awarded to all persons who served in the naval service on active duty between September 8, 1939 and December 7, 1941, both dates inclusive. The World War II Victory Medal will be awarded to persons serving on active duty in the naval services at any time between December 7, 1941 and December 31, 1946, both dates inclusive. The Navy Recruiting Station is located on the second floor of the Southern Building and will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Monday through Friday and on Saturdays 8:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m. ### CAPT. LYLE CRUME UP FOR COMMISSION IN AIR FORCE

Fort Sam Houston, Texas, Oct. 16.—Capt. Lyle L. Crume, Goldthwaite, Texas, has been nominated for a recess appointment as a commissioned officer in the Regular Air Force, with a permanent rank of 1st Lt., subject to confirmation by the Senate when it reconvenes, General Thomas T. Handy, Fourth Army Commander announced today.

General Handy pointed out that Capt. Crume was among approximately 5,900 chosen from 85,000 officers and former officers of the National Guard, Officers Reserve Corps and Army of the United States who applied for commissions under the Second Regular Army Integration Program.

Except for a group of medical department officers and a small group whose applications were not completely processed this will be the last increment of officers taken into the Regular Army under provisions of Public Law 281 which expires on December 31, 1947, General Handy stated.

This latest list brings to almost 28,000 the number of officers nominated for the Regular Army or Regular Air Force under the two Integration Programs. Including officers already in the Regular establishment prior to the integration program, there will be approximately 40,000

Regulars after this increment is confirmed by the Senate. Army Air Forces appointments as well as those for the Army Ground Forces in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Louisiana and Arkansas are being announced by General Handy for the Department of the Army.

**Health Notes**

Seasonal health hazards for young children are to be guarded against in the wintertime just as carefully as they are in the summertime in the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.  
 "Every mother is familiar with so-called summer complaints which affect small children but certain winter diseases can be just as harmful and are just as likely to make their appearance unless proper precautions are used during the approaching season," Dr. Cox said.  
 In the group of winter diseases Dr. Cox included influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, asthma, and even diphtheria when a child has not had diphtheria immunization. Any such disease affecting a child's respiratory or breathing system is apt to be very serious and all too often fatal. Pneumonia often develops from a neglected cold or may follow a severe case of measles or whooping cough. Bronchitis conditions may also prove to be an after effect of such diseases and these respiratory ailments are much more difficult to combat successfully than the digestive ailments which are prevalent in the summertime, and known as summer complaints.

"These winter diseases are especially dangerous to babies and very young children," Dr. Cox stated. "Nearly all of them are spread from the secretions of the nose and mouth. Children not in vigorous health are naturally more susceptible to these complaints and the first line of defence against them is to build up the child's general health, as a power of resistance against disease," Dr. Cox advised. "The second step is to keep them under medical supervision and the third is to make sure that they avoid contact with those who have coughs, colds, or fevers."

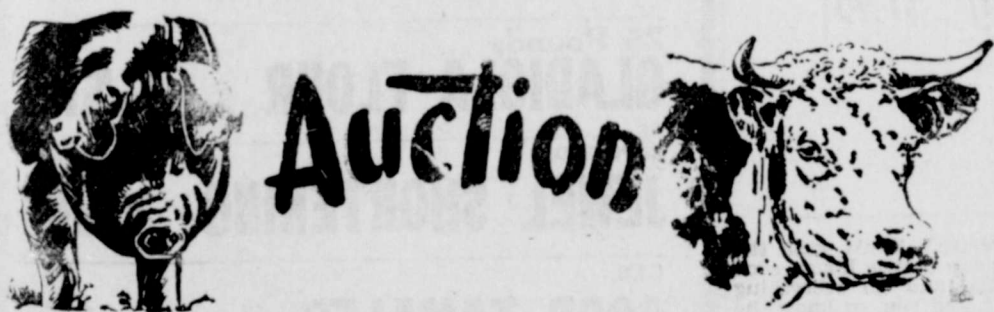

The name of the paper, the publisher and the place published is not known, but one editorial printed in type so small it could hardly be read was headed "A quiet Sunday" and summarized the happenings of the first Sunday after Mayor Conrad's election. It seems the new Mayor had closed all the saloons on Sundays.

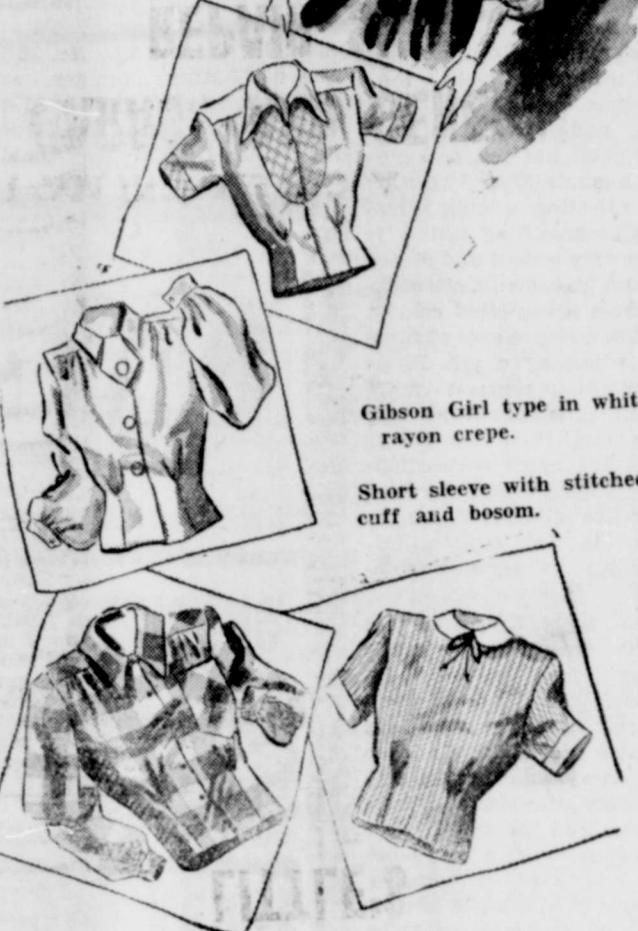
