Since the City of Goldthwaite purchases its electrical requirements from the Authority at the election to the office of Mills Lometa Substation and transmits over the City's 12.5 kv. line, a distance of approximately nineteen miles, for utilization in its distribution system, increases in future loads will eventually overload the present Lometa-Goldthwaite 12.5 kv. line. Under the present arrangement it would be necessary that the City increase the size of the conductor, which would require an expenditure of approximately \$15,000

During our discussion, you indicated that the City of Goldthwaite would be interested in obtaining a point of delivery near Goldthwaite in lieu of the Lometa point of delivery, even to the extent of transferring to the Authority the ownership of the 12.5 kv. line between Lometa and Goldthwaite, provided that such arrangement would be advantageous to the City of Goldth-






CASE REPORT

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
