

New Mills County Agricultural Building



THE MILLS COUNTY AGRICULTURAL BUILDING pictured above is nearing completion. This building was constructed from two surplus buildings secured from Camp Bowie on a prioriety held by the Brown-Mills SCD. It is located on the old Fairman Gin lot donated by Earl Fairman. The Mills County Agricultural Buildings will be used cooperatively by the Mills County Livestock Association to hold their annual livestock show and the Brown-Mills District to store their equipment and for usejas office space. The building is 25 feet wide and 224 feet long with the office space occupying 50 feet of the length.



SALE OF TRANSMISSION LINE "A Good Deal" Says **Utility Manager Barnett**

As a result of good business for your local owned electric utility, it now becomes necessary that increased power supply be secured. If this power supply is to be transmitted from Lower Colorado River Authority's System, which is the only logical source at this time, it is necessary to increase the carrying capacity of the existing line from Lometa, Texas.

In order for the City of Goldthwaite to do this they must spend additional money. 1. Reinsulate and raise voltage of line. 2. Build their own substation at the City Limits of Goldthwaite to lower this voltage again before entering distribution system. These two items would cost the City approximately \$50,000.00. After taking these steps we would still have the maintenance and line loss costs to bear for some years to come.

We have negotiated a deal with the Lower Colorado River Authority whereby they assume all these costs, and furnish us with sufficient service at a point near town for thirty years at the same rate we are now paying for current at Lometa, Texas. We are asked to deed the line we now own to the Authority in return for their expenditure. The line as it now stands is and has been in excellent condition, we have had very little trouble with it, but, it is definitely a liability in the future and the only purpose it can ever serve is to bring current to our system.

Therefore we think this is a "Good Deal." We urge you as tax payer and voter to go to the polls next Monday and vote for this proposal. Whereby you will be giving your City Council the power to complete this transaction.





MILLS COUNTY

In the survey of inmates in years, 1937-1947, Mills County is listed in seventh place among the lowest prison population percentage to the whole population. Mills County had five convicts in Texas prisons during the ten years, with a percentage of .62 convicts to the 1,000 population. The lowest counties are Kenedy, Loving and McMullen, which had no convicts in prison during the period, while the highest percentage county in the state was Culberson, which had 16.93 convicts to each 1,000 population. The county with the largest number of convicts was Harris, with 3.087.

Hamilton County had 33 inmates, which figures 2.48 per thousand population. Comanche County had 56 prisoners, 2.90 per 1,00 ; San Saba County, 38 and 3.45; Lampasas County, 33 and 3.60; Llano County, 29 and 4.83; Brown County, 157 and 6.05.

> Three counties, Kenedy, Loving and McMullen have had no criminal convictions over the 11-year period.

Five counties have accounted for one-third of all criminals convicted in the eleven years. Harris, Dallas, Bexar, El Paso and Tarrant counties sent up 8,751 criminals.

The Koeninger study, in general, indicates a close correlation between crime and population density; in other words. there is more crime in big city areas than in rural districts.

Although all figures are for counties, cities can be assumed ample, the five top counties on the basis of criminal convictions are the counties in which Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, El Paso and Fort Worth are located.

Each of the five counties mentioned tops the average figure for convictions per county on a population basis. Tarrant county is the best of the five with its 4.84 convictions per 1,000 population and El Paso the





These opponents of a strong air force are wholly unimpressed by the fact that Russia is stronger in the air than we are and is, according to Secretary of Air Symington, building bombers and jet planes faster today than we are.

America is of course, stronger industrially, stronger in oil, stronger in transportation (Russian railroad mileage is but one-fourth of ours), and under our free enterprise system is far superior to the communist system when it comes to capacity for production.

But militarily Russia is said to be stronger at the moment. The appeasers who are afraid of offending the Soviets seem to overlook the fact that the Russian army hovers around 4,000,000 men, not counting the satellites. This compares with a current strength of less than 600,000 men in the United States Army ground forces.

Estimates of the Russian Air Forces range from 8,000 to 16, 000 first-line combat planes, with from 600,000 to 700,000 men in the Soviet Air Force. This compares with our 2,000 fighter planes and only around 500 bombers. The Air Forces report that the reserve planes are largely obsolescent. In our own air force we now have only 350,000 men.

Yet, in the face of these facts, we find all sorts of excuses being given for opposing a strong army, navy and air force in this country! Fortuna-It is generally agreed that this move for a strong air force will have the effect of stilling the hand of Stalin more than any other thing we could do.
