Harry S. Truman of Missouri was nominated by the convention on the first ballot, receiving 947 and 1-2 vootes against Senator Robert Russell, of Georgia, who was put up by the Southern delegates in protest against a strong civil rights platform adopted by the coonvention. Senator Russell got 263 delegate votes, and McNutt got

a half vote. Alabama and Mississippi delegates walked out of the convention. The bolters are expected to hold a convention for southern states at Birmingham, Ala., tomorrow and possibly organize a new political party.





The Hopis, one of the tribes at the exhibit, have their homes in the high mesas of Arizona. Known as the "peaceful ones" they are skilled farmers and Hopi women excel in potterymaking and basketweaving.

Visitors will see the Hopis at work making moccasins and pottery, weaving baskets and belts, and making their famed Katchina dolls.

The Katchinas are ancestorgods, culture heroes, human and animal demigods and are represented by masked dancers, properly costumed. The Hopi men carve small wood figures and paint them to resemble the dancers. The Katchina dolls are given to the little girls, especially at the Pawamu ceremony in February which celebrates the return of the Katchinas to earth, and small goys are given bows and arrows. The children believe the dolls are made by the Katchinas.

In addition to the crafts mentioned, the Hopis will perform their beauttiful and well-known butterfly and basket dances.



#### **ELWAIN DOGGETT'S BODY ARRIVED IN** UNITED STATES SUN

by The Eagle the first of the week, the name of S-Sgt. Elwain E. Doggett, Army, next of kin Walter Doggett, Goldthbeing returned to the United States for reburial on the U.S. Army Transport Oglethorpe Victory, which was due to arrive at an East Coast harbor last

Also among the list is the name of 1st Lt. Murry L. Sunimers, Army, next of kin, Edith Summers, Indian Gap, Texas.

The Oglethorpe brought back 161 bodies to Texas points for reburial. Armed forces dead originally interred in temporary Military cemeteries in France and Belgium are among those brought back to this country.

Also due to arrive last week port Carroll Victory, bringing bodies from military cemetaries at Netunno and other parts in Italy home for reburial. This ship carried 4,842 bodies, 234 of which will come to Texas. No names from this immediate vicinity are listed.

The army stated that each next of kin was notified in advance of the arrival of the vessels, and would be notified again after arrival of the remains at the regional Distribution Centers of the American Graves Registration Service.

Under the program for final burial of World War II dead, next of kin may elect to have remains returned to the United States for burial in a private or national cemetery, or may request interment in a permanent American military overseas or a private cemetery in a foreign country which is the homeland of the deceased or of the next kin.
