"A lifetime immunity may Lappe of Goldthwaite. be established in 90 per cent of the children receiving the diphtheria toxoid," the health officer said. "If all parents of children over six months of age would have their children inoculated, the incidence rate of the disease would be rapidly reduced."

The administration of toxoid causes little or no discomfort in the child, Dr. Cox added, and a positive immunity can be determined by a Schick test conducted four or six months after the final dose of the toxoid has been given the child.
