### 4-H CLUB LIVESTOCK JUDGING CONTEST

College Station, Aug. 5—The State Boys' 4-H Club Livestock Judging Contest will be held August 16, in the animal husbandry pavilion on the campus of Texas A. and M. College, according to J. D. Prewitt, acting director of the Extension Service.

This contest will be held in cooperation with the Texas A. and M. College animal husbandry department, said Prewitt, and will be the first 4-H livestock judging contest held since the end of the war.

Two teams from each extension district will compete in the contest, making a state total of 28 teams to enter. Each team will be made up of four boys, and will judge twelve classes of livestock, including quarter-horses, beef cattle, fat barrows and sheep.

The three highest teams at the 4-H livestock judging contest here will compete against the three winning FFA teams at the Dallas State Fair in October.

The two high teams coming out on top at that contest will go to the International Junior Livestock Contest held in connection with the International Livestock Show at Chicago.

The animal husbandry department will have charge of the overall management of the livestock judging contest to be held here August 16, said Prewitt.

### EXTRA SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS SPELL FUTURE GRIEF

Two heads are better than one, says the proverb, but the Social Security Administration points out that two social security numbers, like too many cooks, may spoil the broth.

"When you multiply your social security account numbers, you stand a good chance of dividing your future benefits," David S. Pruitt, manager of the Austin social security office said today.

Only wages posted to the account of the worker are considered when a claim is filed. Unless the applicant can furnish a record of all account numbers he has used, some wages on which he has paid social security taxes won't be counted.

Pruitt said that every effort is made to combine all the worker's accounts. Even so, in many cases, the amount of benefit is smaller because wages have been posted to accounts which the applicant has used and on which he doesn't have a record of the number. In rare instances, so much of the worker's wages are credited to these "unknown" account numbers that the total work credits shown on the "unknown" account numbers are not enough to make any payment possible.

"Future social benefits can best be protected," Pruitt said, "by asking for a 'duplicate' to replace the card which has been lost or worn out. Remember that one card may not last a lifetime, but one account number will."

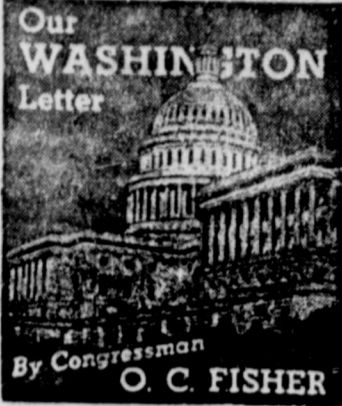

As was expected, the called session of the Congress is moving slowly, and will probably end in another week. Over in the Senate, the President's request for the passing of a Federal anti-poll tax bill was brought out and ran into an expected filibuster.

The Southerners don't want it because of the invasion by the Federal Government of rights reserved to the individual states to handle. Those who believe in states' rights contend that it is up to Texas, for example, to decide whether Texas is to require the payment of a poll tax as a qualification for voting.

Moreover, even if a Federal law outlawing the poll tax is passed, and even if such a law should be held constitutional (which is doubtful), it would apply only to voting for Federal officials and not to state and local officials.

Other measurers which are included in the President's so-called "civil rights" program, have little or no chance of passage at this session. These include an F.E.P.C., anti-lynching law, and another against segregation. The F.E.P.C. Bill, which would establish a bureau to require farmers and merchants to hire colored workers under certain conditions, is pending before a Committee of which I am a member. I am in a position to know it will not be taken up or reported by the Committee at this session. The F.E.P.C. is a "dead duck" so far as the 80th Congress is concerned.

The best and indeed the only real solution of the race problem is through education and gradual progress. That must be done on a local, community level. It can't be solved by passing laws in Washington and trying to force people to change their thinking. Such attempts only aggravate the problem and set the clock of progress back instead of moving it forward.

A few months ago General Eisenhower testified before a Senate committee and defended segregation in the armed forces. In touching on the attempts to solve racial problems by law, he commented: "But I do believe that if we attempt merely by passing a lot of laws to force someone to like someone else, we are just going to get into trouble."

On the housing front, which is one of the problems featured in President Truman's message to the Congress, the President submitted a report made by the Council of Economic Advisers. It was there pointed out that the "residential construction is expected to increase the total supply of dwelling units by more than a million during 1948". It is further stated in the report that this is about all the building that available material and labor will permit and that the building boom is inflationary because it is serving to drive costs of construction, including labor, higher. Already the costs of new houses are prohibitive and many believe that to subsidize such construction at present would run costs up beyond that they may otherwise be—which are already entirely too much.

### JOHNSON TO OPEN RUNOFF CAMPAIGN AT CENTER TODAY

Washington, D. C., Aug. 2—Congressman Lyndon Johnson this week called upon Democrats and Republicans to "cut out the politics and do something besides talk about high prices."

Johnson, a second primary candidate for United States Senator, laid aside personal politics to return to his post as Tenth District representative when Congress was called into special session to consider the high cost of living and housing problems.

He repeated his longstanding opposition to President Truman's civil rights legislation, pointing out the Congress had more important matters to solve without quarrelling over such "purely political legislation."

As Democrats and Republicans in Washington blamed each other for rising prices, Johnson took the floor to tell his colleagues that both parties should work together to solve this problem, just as they are doing on foreign policy.

The young Congressman proposed that a "breadbasket committee" be formed, composed of men not involved in politics such as Bernard Baruch, Cordell Hull, or Dwight Eisenhower.

Let these men find the answer to the inflationary spiral of high prices, he suggested. Johnson said he doubted whether the "long-dead corpse" of OPA could or should be revived.

"This breadbasket committee," Johnson said, "would not try to fix blame on Republicans or Democrats. It would not try to elect or defeat any candidate."

As his fellow Congressmen listened attentively, Johnson declared: "Let's not say we're whipped. Americans have never yet found a problem too big for them."

Johnson, who conducted the busiest campaign of any candidate in recent Texas history during the first primary, will open another fast-moving bid for votes on August 6 at Center, in deep East Texas.

The young Congressman was invited to open his second primary campaign in that community by 29 Shelby County officials and prominent citizens who supported Candidate Geo. Peddy in the first primary.

Johnson said he was "greatly pleased" at results of the first primary which showed he was the leading candidate in most of the rural areas of Texas, while his run-off opponent piled up his lead in the big cities.

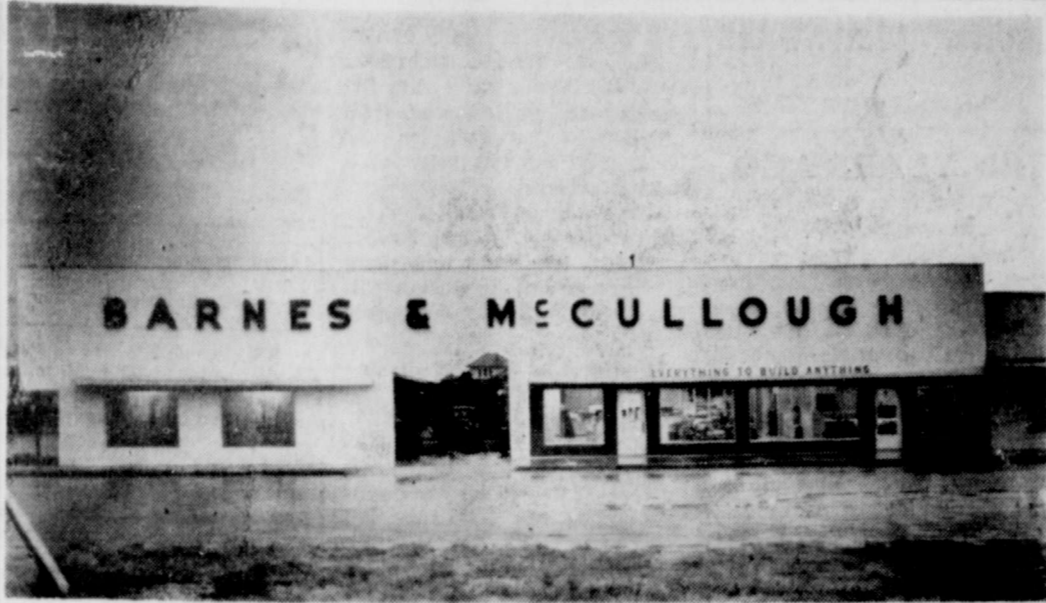

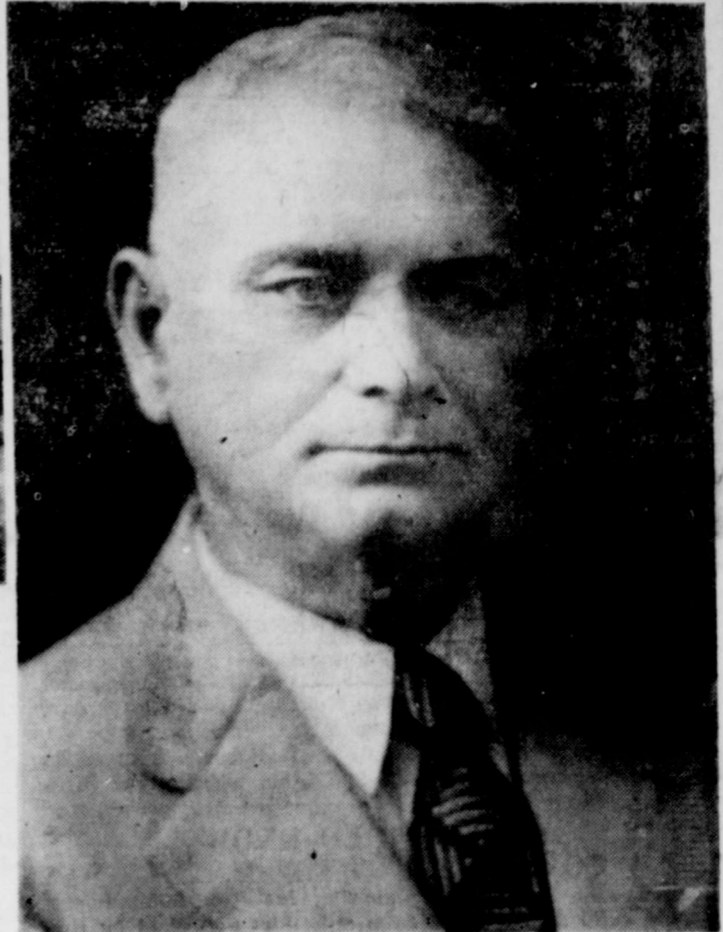

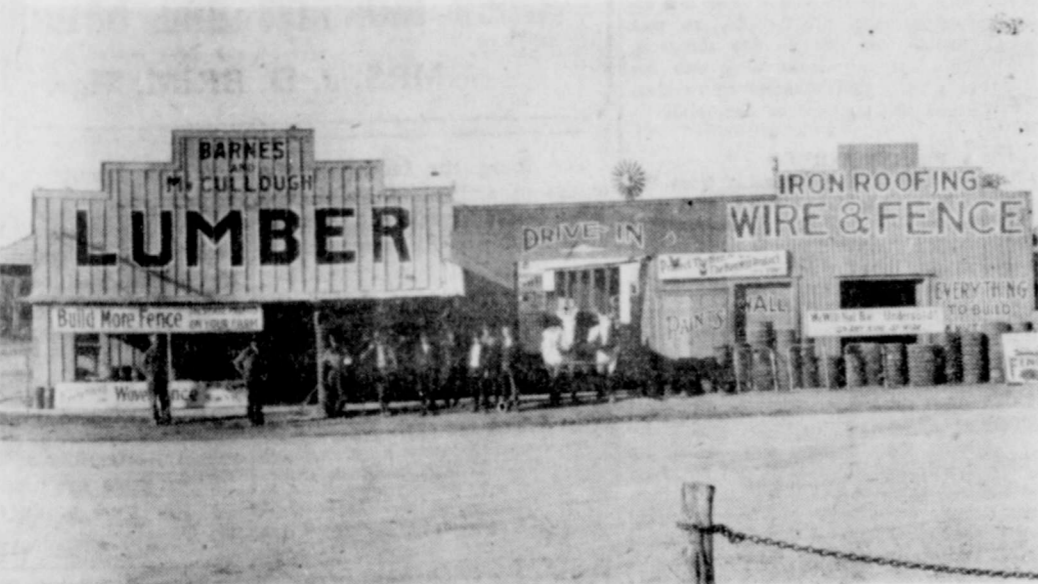
