## STEVENSON—JOHNSON SENATE RACE CLOSEST IN HISTORY

Out of a total vote counted up to 7 p. m. Wednesday of the Texas Election Bureau of 998,302, only 362 votes separated Coke Stevenson and Lyndon Johnson in the August 28 runoff primary held last Saturday for Junior U. S. Senator from Texas.

It was the closest race in history of Texas politics, and the winner may not be decided until after Congress meets next January.

Coke Stevenson was ahead the 362 votes at the last count Wed. afternoon with 494,555 to Lyndon Johnson's 494,206.

## MILLS COUNTY RESULTS

Mills County voters numbering only 1,170 of the potential 2,600 voters went to the polls last Saturday in the runoff and gave Coke Stevenson a 132-vote lead over Lyndon Johnson, as shown by unofficial returns counted Monday. The total was: Stevenson 651; Johnson 519. Nineteen hundred and six voters cast their ballots in the first primary. The Senate race was the only one listed on Mills County ballots.

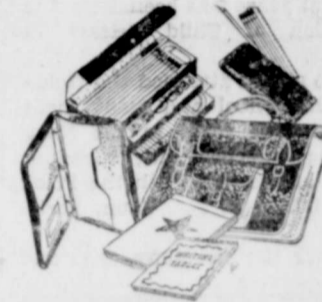

the farm to live in offering this  
general course leading to a de-  
gree of Bachelor of Science." Dr.  
R. E. Mendenhall, College Dean,  
pointed out.  
"Many of the young farm  
students today who left the farm  
to go to college and specialize  
in agriculture never return to  
the farm or ranch to live but go  
into more highly specialized  
forms of agriculture.  
"We do not propose to give a  
major in Agriculture," Dr. Men-  
denhall said. "Instead, those  
who take this course will usually  
major in Biology and possibly  
minor in chemistry with a liber-  
al number of courses in agri-  
culture."

The instructor in the agricul-  
ture course for the "practical  
farmers" is Bransford Eubank  
who holds the B.A. and M. A.  
degree for Texas A. and M. Col-  
lege. Mr. Eubank returned to  
this country from China just a  
few years ago where he was a  
missionary for a number of  
years.  
The course will be so arranged  
that a student can return to the  
farm after one or two years  
without feeling that his venture  
into the educational field has  
been a complete loss to him and  
his work. It will involve courses  
in Basic Science, Practical Agri-  
culture, Rural Sociology, and  
Economics that a farmer needs  
including selling and marketing  
of farm products.  
It will be primarily a course  
designed for practical agriculture  
instead of theoretical agricul-  
ture.

We hope that these students  
can return to the farm or ranch  
and make a real contribution to  
the rural schools, rural churches  
and their community life.

"The 60th session of Daniel  
Baker College will open on Mon-  
day, September 13 with fresh-  
men registration," college offi-  
cials said this week. In addition  
to the agriculture courses,  
courses of study with majors in  
eleven different fields are of-  
fered in Daniel Baker College.

The college faculty will be  
materially strengthened this fall  
with the addition of several new  
faculty members. New members  
will be added to the music facul-  
ty and the college will have its  
first band since before the war.

# Are These Sound Reasons for Changing REA Headquarters From Hamilton To Evant?

Laying aside the unfairness of trying to take the management and head office away from the membership who worked hard to get it started, now that it has become a success, let us analyze the reason why a group of Evant business men in their advertising claim it should be moved and see if they are justified.

1. They claim "Evant is the center of a 60 mile circle."

If the homes of the members of the Association were equally spaced with reference to each other on roads that radiate out of Evant like the spokes of a wagon wheel, it would be true. But this map of membership locations when correctly drawn looks more like a spinning top or a pear with Hamilton located in the center of the BIG end and having paved highways leading out from it in six directions and 4 paved Farm-to-Market roads making a web in between. Its nearness to the CENTER OF THE MEMBERSHIP, which, after all is what counts most, can be proven by the fact that more than one-third of all the members live in Hamilton County. When new lines now under construction are completed the membership will approximate 500 in San Saba, 600 in Mills, 700 in Coryell, 800 in Lampasas (Where a sub-station for current that does NOT pass through the wires of the "First Pole located NEAR Evant" and a Serviceman is now located.) and 1600 IN HAMILTON COUNTY.

2. The claim "Members would get quicker service if the office located in Evant."

Of course, a few members might, but what about the much larger number in the BIG END of the system who would be nearly twenty miles further away from headquarters. How could the change help them? And how would Lometa and the lower end of the system who have a service man of their own be benefited?

3. They claim "6,435.00 could be saved by operating in Evant instead of Hamilton."

This amazing saving would be accomplished by 1st., "saving \$675.00 a year because of no city tax in Evant. \$2400.00 a year less truck operating expense and \$3360.00 less time lost by employees, eliminating wear and tear on equipment, gasoline and time wasted by employees traveling from Hamilton to Evant and from Evant back to Hamilton every day."

As for City taxes. Not one thin dime has been paid to the City of Hamilton by the REA. This can be verified by the City Tax Collector. The property, with the exception of a few desks and other office equipment, is all located outside the City limits and not subject to City tax. Even when the new building is constructed it is doubtful if it will be subject to tax because it is a Federal project. And as for the mythical \$5,760.00 a year lost in time and truck expense between Hamilton and Evant, does anyone believe that ALL the EMPLOYEES and TRUCKS have to go to Evant every morning BEFORE THEY CAN START TO WORK? It is true that a move to Evant would make Lometa so close to the main office that the present service man now located there could be eliminated and his salary saved, but this would take two service men located somewhere in the Big North End of the System if most of the members got anything like their present prompt service. It looks like expenses would be increased instead of lessened.

**Mills County R. E. A. Board Member  
Explains Headquarters Election**

To the members of the R.E.A. who are located the furthest from Hamilton where headquarters are now located:

I have read a lot of literature sent out by both Hamilton and Evant. We are not concerned about the towns, neither does the Co-op owe either of them anything, but I am concerned in getting electricity to hundreds of our neighbors who have been asking for it so long, and to render better service to those already on the line.

We want to operate the business of the Association with the least cost and yet render the kind of service the members deserve.

I am glad the members are voting to change the Articles of Incorporation allowing the headquarters to be located at Evant, which would have been done later when the project expands to the south and west, which Washington expects us to serve. The cost of moving the office fixtures now will be very little compared to leaving a seventy-five thousand dollar building.

Another reason why headquarters should be more in the center of the project is, we are buying a two-way radio which will be installed in the office and the R.E.A. trucks and the central location will make it possible to reach over all the territory.

There is nothing that would be worth more to three-fourths of the people in the five counties than to move to this convenient location.

It is to be expected that Hamilton will oppose this move in every way possible. They will probably go on the radio again urging the people to vote against it.

I am thinking about a letter put out by an ex-county Agricultural Agent from Hamilton in which he stated they didn't know that any one but Hamilton County farmers were eligible for R.E.A. until a Washington official came along and told them differently. Being familiar with the way they play the game one would think that feeling still prevails more or less with some of the Hamilton County people today.

At the time Hamilton County was holding meetings, Mills County also had a County Agent who held meetings and committees were appointed that went from house to house securing applications.

This committee was able to extend a proposed line out of Evant up through Mills County beyond Goldthwaite. These applications with others from Hamilton and Priddy were approved by Washington and funds were allotted for the construction of the lines.

Some time ago a special meeting of the board was called to take up the subject of a headquarters building, as we were paying \$480.00 a year for rent, and figuring the interest of a \$75000 building at 2 per cent would be \$1500. I didn't see the need of the rush.

Then when Evant offered to

give us a lot and Hamilton offered to see us one at \$1500 the board voted to send two Hamilton County men to Washington by plane using R. E. A. funds to rush approval and get the money allotted. I still didn't see the need to rush and voted against it.

Operating expenses seem to go up and up in spite of all we can do. At present our operation cost runs well over \$4000 a month.

With headquarters at Evant we can save a tremendous cost now incurred in travel twice a day from Hamilton to Evant with high priced machinery and hands.

Another thing they may use some help from this area, a thing they have never done.

I want to impress on every member the importance of voting since we have so many people who are not on the line yet. It is different in Hamilton County, they seem to get them on faster.

**YOUNG CAR THEFT  
SUSPECT ARRESTED

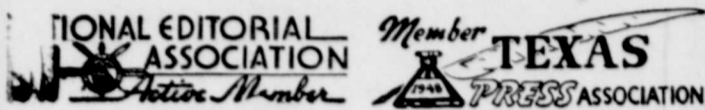

ABOUT COMMUNISM IN THE U. S. A.  
(Continued—By Committee of Un-American Activities, U. S. House of Representatives.)

52. What are some types of Communist activities within the law?

Working their way into key positions in the schools, the churches, the labor unions, and farm organizations. Inserting Communist propaganda into art, literature, and entertainments. Nominating or seeking control of candidates for public office. The immediate objective of the Communist Party is to confuse and divide the majority so that in a time of chaos they can seize control.

53. What are some types of Communist activities outside the law?

Spying, sabotage, passport fraud, perjury, counterfeiting, rioting, disloyalty in the Army, Navy and Air Force.

54. What are some official newspapers or magazines of the Communist Party.

Daily and Sunday Worker, 50 East Thirteenth Street, New York City; Morning Freiheit, 50 East City; Political Affairs, 832 Broadway, New York City; Daily Peoples World, 590 Folsom Street, San Francisco, Calif.; Masses and Mainstream, 832 Broadway, New York City. There are also numerous foreign language publications.

55. Does the Party also publish books and pamphlets?

Yes, thousands of them, through such official publishing houses as: International Publishers, 381 Fourth Street, New York City; Workers Library Publishers, 832 Broadway, New York City; New Century Publishers, 832 Broadway, New York City.

56. Does the Party have public speakers and press agents?

Hundreds of them, paid and unpaid, public and secret, hired and volunteered, intentional and unintentional. Publicity seeking is one of the Party's principal "legal" occupations, intended to confuse people on all important issues of the day.

57. How does the Party get the money for all this?

At first it received money from Moscow but now it raises millions of dollars here in the United States through dues, foundations, endowments, special drives and appeals.

58. Do only Communist carry out Communist work?

No. The Party uses what it calls "Fellow Travelers" and "Front Organizations" in some of its most effective work.

59. What is a fellow traveler?

One who sympathizes with the Party's aims and serves the Party's purposes in one or more respects without actually holding a Party card.

60. Is he important in the Communist movement?

Vital. The fellow traveler is the HOOK with which the Party reaches out for funds and respectability and the WEDGE that it drives between people who try to move against it.

61. What is a Communist front?

An organization created or captured by the Communists to do the Party's work in special fields. The front organization is Communism's greatest weapon in this country today and takes it places it could never go otherwise—among people who would never willingly act as party agents. 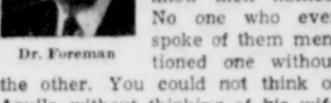

Lesson for September 5, 1948

HUSBAND AND WIFE: Team or tug-of-war? In times when more and more homes are splitting apart, it is refreshing to read the story of one home that stuck together.

We do not know whether these two ever had children; no doubt their home was happier if they had. But we do know their names.

No one who ever spoke of them mentioned one without the other. You could not think of Aquila without thinking of his wife Priscilla (or Prisca for short), or vice versa. They were displaced persons, but that did not keep them down.

Family Trade Union

LIKE ALL JEWS of that time, they had a specialty, a trade they had learned. In this case someone had taught Prisca the same trade (or did she learn it from her husband?), so the two of them formed a sort of trade union. They were tentmakers, working not only in heavy tent-cloth but in the tanned skins of which many tents in that time were made.

Their home was a workshop, their hands were bent by long use of hard tools, very likely they initiated their produce. P & A tents were good tents. Their business was good, for we know they always had room for another guest, for another hand at the workbench. That was one thing helping their marriage to stick.

How many husbands and wives today are working teams? One reason why divorcees are more common in cities than on farms is that the city man and his wife seldom have any work in common, while a farmer and his wife are a working team in which each needs the other to succeed. Find some work you two can share, even if it is washing the dishes, and you have something to help you hold together through the years.

More Than Meals  
ANOTHER bond that held these together was their hospitality. They had a long list of friends, some of them distinguished. We know about Paul and Apollos and we hear of many others. But when Apollos stayed at their house, he was getting more than meals.

If you don't do more for a guest than feed him, he might as well be at a restaurant. If you don't do more than amuse him, he might as well be at the movies. What those two did for Apollos was to give him ideas, bigger ideas, truer and better than he had ever had, about the Christian faith. No doubt Apollos enjoyed Priscilla's lamb chops, but when he left that home he was not merely a well-fed man but one whose soul had grown.

Here again is something for husband and wife today. What are you doing for the people who come in your door? If they come for dinner you wouldn't insult them with trash or poison. What do you give their minds, their souls? Poison, trash or food?

The Church in Their House

EVIDENTLY the P & A tents made enough money for Priscilla and Aquila to have a spacious home, for we find Paul in a letter mentioning "the church in their house."

This more than anything else kept these two together, a working team. You know in every church there are a few key people. They may not be conspicuous, but like the distributor under an automobile hood, if they are not there things do not run smoothly and maybe not at all.

Aquila and Priscilla were like that. Their church naturally revolved around them. This must have taken a good deal of their time, no doubt it cost them money, and it must have meant work. But if the church was in their house it was because they wanted it that way. It would be hard to believe that they asked for this so as to keep themselves from drifting apart; yet undoubtedly that was one effect of it.

The great majority of divorces are among people who have no connection with the church whatever. Many, of course, are of persons who are on church rolls somewhere. But how many broken marriages do you know among persons who are active in Christian work?



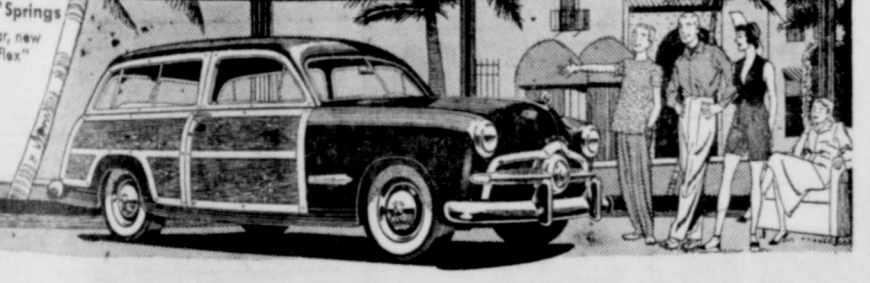

**OPEN SEASON — NORTH ZONE:** Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, both days inclusive. Shooting hours, one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

**SOUTH ZONE:** Oct. 20 to Dec. 3, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmit, LaSalle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy, and Willacy counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 17, 19, and 21, from 4 P.M. to sunset, and from Oct. 20 to Nov. 30, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.
