Rainfall From One And A Half To Three Inches General Over County

Rainfall, which started in some places in the county Wednesday afternoon, continued through Wednesday night, with cloudy and misty weather Thursday, totaled from one and one-half to nearly three and possibly more in some spots.
The rain was general all over the county, and in many places over the state, and broke a bad drought in this section.
The government gauge kept here by Harry Allen totaled 2.82 inches up to early Thursday morning. It was the first fall to be registered here since Aug. 15, '24 of an inch, and Aug. 1 and 2, when .48 was registered, to make the August total .72 of an inch. On July 31, .60 of an inch was registered. However, some places in the county reported up to five inches on August 1 and 2. A. A. Downey's gauge, about six miles northeast of Mullin, recorded two and a half inches of moisture in August, and two inches Wednesday night of this week.
The 2.82 inches here in town Wednesday night brought the total for the year up to 16.72 inches.
Reports from over the county yesterday morning showed the rain a little lighter to the east and heavier to the west. However, in all places it was enough to green up grass and weeds again and put new life into the livestock industry.
Priddy reported a good rain Wednesday afternoon and another Wednesday night, with cloudy sprinkling weather Thursday morning. The Cary Owens Ranch four miles south of Star reported about a half inch, Wilson Garage at Mullin, 1.34, and Wilkey Shady Oak Ranch, 7 miles southeast, .49. Reports from the west showed about two inches on the river.
Highest report was from the J. H. Priddy place west of Priddy, where over six inches of rainfall was recorded.

Ed was 17 years old and graduated from Goldthwaite High School at the end of the term in May. He was president of the 1948 Senior Class, and was sports reporter for the school. He had been voted as the "youth most likely to succeed" by the class.
He intended to leave Sunday for Waco to enter Baylor University.
Funeral services were held Thursday morning at ten o'clock at the First Baptist Church here, where he was a member.

The Rev. Joseph L. Emery, the pastor, conducted the services, assisted by Rev. Dick Lowry, pastor of the First Methodist Church.

Showing the esteem in which this popular young man was held here, stores and professional houses were closed during the funeral, and the Goldthwaite High Schools were closed also. One of the largest crowds ever to attend a funeral here paid last respects to his memory at the church and the graveside at Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery.

There are nine teachers in High School and thirteen in Grammar School. Enrollment in the high school was held last Friday with 170 being listed, while there are 360 enrolled in Grammar School.

We enjoy reading your publication, and particularly your "Old Bird" column which makes very interesting reading.

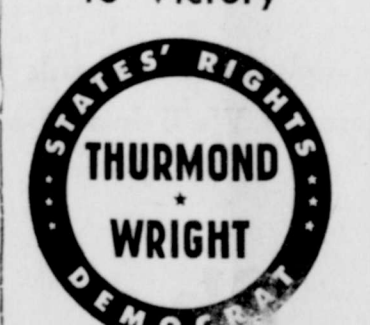

REBURIAL SERVICES HELD FOR M. SGT. ELWAIN E. DOGGETT



Elwain Evans Doggett was born on June 11, 1916, in Mills County in the Bethel Community. Except for five years in Mexia, his schooling was received in Goldthwaite High School in 1937. He was converted at an early age and was a member of the Goldthwaite Methodist Church.

When our government was calling young men into the service of our country, Elwain was one of the first of the two men to volunteer. He entered the service on Nov. 18, 1940, and took his basic training at San Antonio. From there he was transferred to Camp Bowie at Brownwood, Texas, where he served with the Quartermasters' Corps, and as an M. P. on the Santa Fe from Brownwood to Clovis, N. M. He asked for combat duty and after intensive training, he became a member of the 379th Infantry Regiment of the 95th Division. In August 1944, he was sent overseas where the 95th Division was attached to the 3rd Army. Exactly 4 years from the day he entered the service, he was killed in action in the Battle of Metz, Nov. 18, 1944.

A letter to his mother written by a member of Elwain's platoon, stated that "Tex" as he was called, was joking and laughing with his men, trying to keep up their courage to the very last when he was suddenly killed by machine-gun fire. Among other letters received, his chaplain spoke of Elwain's courage and his faith, and too, of the good soldier that he was.

He was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart and the Silver Star and Presidential Citation.

The active pallbearers were: J. D. Berry, J. M. Wrinkle, Edward Harris, Leroy Miller, Ernest Leonard, Herbert Faulkner. Honorary pallbearers were all of his friends.

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Senator Dorsey Hardeman Out-
lets Constitutional Amendments

Members of Texas are expected to vote on eight amendments to the Constitution. Intelligent, reasonable and studied action should be taken on these amendments. Once adopted it is exceedingly difficult to effect repeal of any of these measures should a mistake be made. Therefore, caution should characterize the vote of each person on each of these propositions. Too often has a mere handful, so to speak, brought about

drastic changes in our fundamental law. With literally hundreds of thousands of qualified voters in the State, many changes in the Constitution have been brought about with hardly more than fifteen to twenty percent thereof voting. This is rule by the minority and is not conducive to the strengthening of government "of the people, by the people and for the people." Be it said to the credit of Texans, however, that since the adoption of the Constitution in 1876 only ninety-four amendments have been adopted out of the more than one-hundred seventy-five submitted.

This article does not purport to provide a complete analysis of the proposals or their effect, if, as and when the same are adopted. The sole purpose hereof is to try to stimulate sufficient interest in these proposed changes to result in an intelligent expression by the people in November.

Subsequent articles may be prepared, as time and space permit, discussing, at some length, these proposed amendments.

In the order they will appear on the ballot, they provide substantially, as follows:

1. Authorizes counties to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees.

County employees are not now covered by insurance for injuries they may sustain while so employed as are employees in other State agencies and private industries.

If this proposal is adopted, the Legislature is authorized to enact appropriate legislation providing for the administration of such insurance and for the payments of the costs, the rates and premiums of said policies together with the benefits to be paid thereunder.

2. Creates a Legislative Redistricting Board to apportion the State into Senatorial and Representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment.

This proposal, if adopted, would become effective January 1, 1951. It provides for the reapportionment of the State into

such districts by the Legislature at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, and further, that if the Legislature does not so act, then the Board, comprised of the Lieutenant-Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney-General, Comptroller and Commissioner of the General Land Office is to make the reapportionment.

Its adoption may bring about a too-long-delayed reapportionment of the State. No reapportionment into Legislative Districts has occurred since 1921, although the present Constitution provides that it shall be done each ten years.

The population increase in certain areas of the State, notably in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and in West Texas, demands re-districting.

3. Provides for changes in the community property law authorizing partition of community property for the limited purpose of preventing both husband and wife being taxed for Federal Estate taxes.

This proposal came about as the result of an amendment to the United States Internal Revenue Code adopted in October, 1942. The Internal Revenue Code has since been changed in this particular by the Congress; hence, the apparent reason for this proposal no longer exists. Our present community property rights are well settled and are the envy of those states which do not have the community property law. No one knows that the effect of the adoption of this amendment would be on the settled property law of this State and since the United States Internal Revenue Code has been amended, it is not deemed either necessary or wise to disturb the settled law of Texas by the adoption of this proposed amendment.

4. Clarifies succession to the Office of Governor. Apparently, this proposal comes as a result of the situation which arose in Georgia after the death of the Governor-elect in the latter part of 1946. It does not appear to be of prime importance in this State, but will not harm anything if adopted, other than add to the length of the Constitution.

5 and 7. These proposals will be considered together since they are more or less interdependent. The first to appear on the ballot is known as HJR 35, designed to preserve the \$3,000.00 of the assessed taxable value of residence homestead exemption from all state taxation purposes. The other, known as HJR 24 provides for the abolition of the ad valorem tax for state purposes and authorizes counties to levy, not to exceed 30c on each \$100.00 valuation, for the construction and maintain-

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ance of farm-to-market roads or for flood control under certain conditions.

6. This proposed amendment provides for the mandatory compensation of sheriffs, deputy sheriffs and county law enforcement officers, including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessors and collectors of taxes, on a salary basis in counties of less than 20,000 population according to the last Federal census.

Whether these officers shall

be paid on a salary or fee basis is optional with the County Commissioners Court in such counties under the present provisions of the Constitution. This proposal, if adopted, simply means that henceforth sheriffs will be paid on a salary basis.

8. This proposal authorizes the Legislature to provide for the retirement of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and for the Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of

service, age or disability. The effect of this proposed change is readily apparent. If adopted, it will provide an umbrella, so to speak, for those attaining a certain age or who may be fortunate enough to get themselves returned to office long enough to come under its protection. We now have 179 Judges on the State payroll who might be affected by the proposed changes.

- 62. How can a Communist be identified? It is easy. Ask him to name ten things wrong with the United States. Then ask him to name two things wrong with Russia. His answer will show him up even to a child. Communists will denounce the President of the United States but they will never denounce Stalin.
- 63. How can a fellow traveler be identified? Apply the same test as above and watch him defend Communists and Communism.
- 64. How can a Communist front be identified? If you are ever in doubt, write, wire, or telephone the House Committee of Un-American Activities, Room 226, House Office Building, Washington 25, D. C. Telephone National 3120, Extension 1405.
- 65. What do Communists call those who criticize them? "Red baiters," "witch hunters," "Fascists." These are just three out of a tremendous stock of abusive labels Communists attempt to smear on anybody who challenges them.
- 66. How do they smear labor opposition? As "scabs," "finks," "company stooges," and "labor spies."
- 67. How do they smear public officials? As "reactionaries," "Wall Street tools," "Hitlerites," and "imperialists."
- 68. What is their favorite escape when challenged on a point of fact? To accuse you of "dragging in a red herring," a distortion of an old folk saying that originally described the way to throw hounds off the track of a hot trail.
- 69. What is the difference in fact between a Communist and a Fascist? None worth noticing.
- 70. How do Communists get control of organizations in which the majority are not Communists? They work. Others won't. They come early and stay late. Others don't. They know how to run a meeting. Others don't. They demand the floor. Others won't. They do not hesitate to use physical violence or ANY form of persecution. They stay organized and prepared in advance of each meeting. The thing to remember is that Communists are trained agents under rigid discipline, but they can always be defeated by the facts.

The Man for the Job
Lesson for September 12, 1948

HISTORY KNOWS some men only by their nicknames. Stalin is a nickname, so was Charlemagne. And so is Barnabas, one of the best of the early Christians. The apostles nicknamed him "Barnabas" and the name stuck, for it means "Son of Encouragement," and Barnabas' speciality was encouraging people who badly needed it.

Barnabas was not a brilliant man, perhaps not even a strong one, though he had an impressive "front." On a journey in the back districts the natives would take him for Zeus, king of all the gods. But it was not his looks that were important, it was his big heart.
When Saul was converted, there was an awkward situation when that young convert went back to Jerusalem. The little society of Christians there knew Saul for a tiger. They had suffered at his hands, they had seen their friends dragged off by his henchmen. So when Saul showed up among the very people he had terrified, when he not only showed up but claimed to be one of them, no wonder they were frightened.
All but Barnabas. Somehow or other (shall we say it was God's Spirit in him?) Barnabas was not afraid. He took Saul the Terrible by the hand, he introduced him to the church leaders, he told them his story, he sponsored Saul as we would say.

An Eye for God

AFTER THAT EXPERIENCE with Saul, Barnabas' friends came to think of him as a man who could probably see the good in any man or situation if there was any good to be seen. So when the headquarters church in old Jerusalem heard of a novel sort of church down in Antioch, they sent this "Son of Encouragement" down to see what went on. It was certainly no church on the Jerusalem pattern; was it a good one, or even a genuine church at all? Barnabas would know. And so he did.
Other men could see the large number of church members in Antioch; others could give you statistics about its rate of growth; others could tell you it was bi-racial, a daring experiment then as now. Some applauded, some raised their eyebrows.
But we read that Barnabas had eyes in his soul as well as in his head. What he saw, as he looked at that stirring new church with its new ways, was "the grace of God." All of us can see things on the surface, we can count noses, we can make reports for the papers. But seeing underneath, seeing the grace of God for the need of it—that is not so easy. Wanted for every church: A Barnabas!

Round Peg—Round Hole

WHEN BARNABAS had taken stock at Antioch he knew the place needed a man, and he knew the man for the place. Off he went across the Taurus mountains to Tarsus, where Saul was doing nothing particular, and he brought Saul to Tarsus and set him to work. Saul turned out to be, as Barnabas expected, the round peg for the round hole.
That team was a "natural"—but only Barnabas would have thought of it. Paul fitted in with the church, too. A tireless worker, he was just the man for that vital growing congregation. Getting the right people for the right jobs is still one of the big problems of the Christian church. Many a Sunday School class, for instance, now is withering on the stalk, only because the Sunday school superintendent has never found the right teacher.

The Hands of the Church

THE TIME came when Barnabas and Saul were sent out by that same Antioch church to be the first foreign missionaries ever deliberately sent out by any Christian church. The hands of the church were laid on them before they left.
To this day, when a man is set apart, by ordination, for a particular work in the Christian church, hands are laid upon his head. This is more than an antique ceremony, there is more than magic in it.
The laying on of hands may mean different things to different churches, but this at least it always means: The men so ordained are now the hands of the churches they represent.

Texas fertilizer sales for the fiscal year 1947-48 amounted to 451,132 tons. This compares with 139-37 sales of nearly 85,000 tons, 116,307 tons in 1939-40, and over 400,000 tons in '46 and '47.

She requested her druggist, Mr. Burnett, to prepare a flavoring similar to one used in her homeland for making custards, puddings, etc. The result was a delightful all-around flavoring which is still used today, to enhance almost every cake, dessert, and sauce made.

YEAR 'ROUND BARGAINS:

You can find bargains every day in the year. No fan-fare, or advertising. They've always been there, but have you taken advantage of them? When you buy 100 one cent stamps for a dollar, do you then purchase writing paper or perhaps have cards made up, or do you take advantage of Uncle Sam's offer: 100 pre-stamped postal cards for a dollar? When you send sealed parcel, do you pay 1st class fees or do you paste a printed sticker that states, "This parcel may be opened for postal inspection" and thus send it as fourth class mail which is much less expensive? When you send valuables through the mail, remember that insuring them means their value will be repaid in case of loss; while registering them means that they will not be lost and that they will receive special handling.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Mint Sauce for Lamb
1 cup vinegar
1 tablespoon sugar
1-8 teaspoon salt
1-2 cup of chopped mint or
1-4 cup of powdered dried mint leaves.
Put all of the ingredients in

a sauce pan and bring to a boil. Serve hot or cold on hot or cold roast lamb.

BEAUTY AIDS: When your hair is drooping limply and you have an unexpected date, set your curls with cologne, instead of water. The result is amazing—fluffy hair in no time at all because the cologne dries so fast. However, since the constant use of cologne in setting the hair may cause dryness, reserve it as a quickie for emergencies only.

GLAMOUR FOR THE EYES:

If the upper lashes are slightly curly, they will look longer. It's not necessary to curl them unless they are absolutely straight. Just brush a little mascara on them with an upward stroke to emphasize their tendency to curl. A speck of mascara can be removed easily and neatly from the face or eyelid by wiping with a wisp of moistened cotton wrapped on the tip of an orange stick. To make an eyebrow where practically none exists, use brown eyebrow pencil to make the line and then with a black pencil sketch in short hair strokes. The result is much more natural than using one shade of pencil only.

EGGSACTLY: Refrigerated eggs can be boiled without cracking by making a tiny hole in the large end of each one with the point of a needle. All eggs contain a certain amount of air, and it is this expanding air that causes the egg to crack when heated. The small needle hole allows the air to escape.

When putting foods in the refrigerator, avoid crowding them so closely together that the circulation of cold air is cut off.

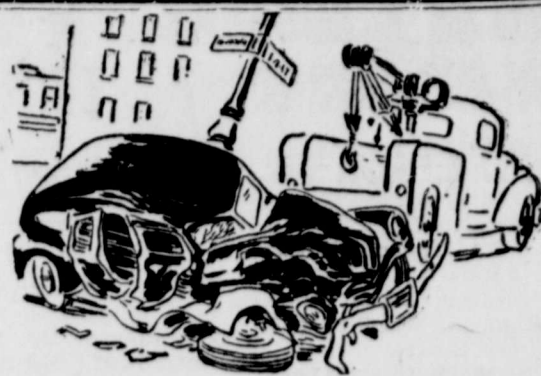
