



A letter to his mother written by a member of Elwain's platoon, stated that "Tex" as he was called, was joking and laughing with his men, trying to keep up their courage to the very last when he was suddenly killed by machine-gun fire. Among other letters received. his chaplain spoke of Elwain's courage and his faith, and too, of the good soldier that he was.

He was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart and the Silver Star and Presidential Citation



GOODFELLOW FIELD AIR FORCE DAY PROGRAM SEPT. 18

The pilot officer who will "g through the book" of aerial acrobatics in a North American T-6 trainer at Goodfellow Field's Air Force Day program, September 18, at San Angelo, learned his lessons in fancy flying at an early age. He is Captain Franklin C. Snyder, who at 19 ran up 62 combat missions as a fighter pilot in the ninth Air Force. Flying the 2000 horsepower P-47 Thunderbolt, armed with eight machine guns, his wartime speciality was low altitude fighter sweeps against German held positions.

On Air Force Day, as a flight instructor, at Goodfellow, he will demonstrate the acrobatic maneuvers to be mastered by basic cadets, plus some in the

advanced category. Asked what his Air Force Day repetoire would include, Captain Snyder explained, "Right now I'm set to do loops, slow rolls, a half roll and a reverse, and barrel rolls. These are the maneuvers we teach the cadets." Among the more advanced acrobatics he added that he will put his plane through eight point slow rolls, cubic eights, clover leaves, inverted rolls and a snap roll at the top of a loop.

With four years experience as a fighter pilot, Captain Snyder saw service with the 57th fighter group in Alaska where he flew P-51's and F-38's. He wears the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal for heroism in combat. His home is in Allentown, Pennsylvania.


The Hands of the Church
