DALLAS, December 1-About 58,000,000 acres of Texas land, nearly one-third the state's area, has been leased for oil and gas exploration and production, a report published by the Texas-Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association indicated this week. Land has been leased from

landowners in each of the 254 counties, the report showed, and there is oil and gas production in 175 countles at the first of 1948. Ten more counties have had production but are not producing now. During 1947, Kenedy, San Augustine, and Sterling counties produced oil for the first time.

HANGING OUT THE WASH

Here are some hints from Gladys Darden, assistant home management specialist of the Extension Service at Texas A. & M. College, for making the wash day job a little easier. Hank the clothes on lines loated near the laundry area to save steps and time . . . and save your energy by placing the clothes basket on a laundry cart or the youngster's wagon. An apron with large pockets or a bag hanging on the line will keep the clothespins in easy reach.

Hang the cup towels, pillow cases, and towels one-third over the line so you won't get dogeared corners. The same goes for sheets and table cloths, except they should be doubled with the hems together.

By grouping the napkins and handkerchiefs together and hanging them over the line like other flat pieces, quite a bit of space can be saved. But don't hang them by one corner. They'll get dog-eared that way. Pin the shirts up by the tails, and hang the dresses, gowns, and pajama tops by their shoulder seams. Trousers, shorts, and pajama bottoms should be hung by the waist. . and to make ironing easier, try using pants stretchers.

Hang the slips by the underarm section. . . and fold all the flat clothes as they are taken from the line to reduce the wrinkles as they are put in the child's wagon. or the laundry cart, says Miss Darden.

Salt, the universal need, supplies sodium and chlorine. Steamed bone meal supplies calcium and phosphorus, and other



#### **First Calves Forecast Production** by Marvin Koger, Animal Husbandman



New Mexico A. & M. Experiment Station Want to estimate efficiency of calf pro-

duction in your cow herd? The cow's first calf tells more than her good looks. In a New Mexico study, we took the weaning weights of first calves weaned by three-yearold cows. These weights were compared with the weaning weights of calves raised by these same cows in the next four years. Cows and calves were placed in five groups (according to the weaning weight of first calves). Here's the 5-year record:

Groups	Average First Calf Weight From 3-Year-Old Cows	Average Calf Weights From Same Cows for Next 4 Years
Group 1	321 pounds	404 pounds
Group 2	349 pounds	417 pounds
Group 3	383 pounds	430 pounds
Group 4	409 pounds	443 pounds
Group 5	441 pounds	456 pounds

Considering only the two extremes, Group One and Group Five, it was shown that breeding stock picked. from Group One could be expected to produce, for the next four years, calves that had a yearly average weaning weight of only 404 pounds. But those picked from Group Five should produce calves with a yearly average weaning

weight of 456 pounds, 52 pounds more than Group One. These figures show that later calves are apt to be a m-peat performance of the cow's first calf. Cows doing poorly their first calving year continued to produce the lightest group of calves. They were poor risks. Culling cows with light, scrubby first calves would be well repaid


