ACCIDENTS—THE BIG KILLER

Accidents are the greatest killer of young people day cake and ice cream, to in the United States, far outranking any of the more generally feared childhood disease.

According to the 1948 edition of "Accident Facts," statistical yearbook of the National Safety Council, Hudson. accidents claimed five times as many lives in the 5-to-14 year age group in 1946 as heart disease, the second cause of death. And accidents killed six times as many children in that age group as pneumonia, the third place child-killer.

In fact, the yearbook points out that deaths from accidents numbered more than deaths from heart disease and pneumonia combined.
