





He was both drunk and mean one day at high noon. He staggered down Main Street in his hometown, shouting and shooting a pistol into the air. He was arrested and charged with unlawfully carrying a pis-

The reason for this action was that the word "and" should have been used instead of the word "or" in the sentence about "did then and there on or about his person carry a pistol." Joe couldn't be convicted of the charge because the court ruled this should have read "did then and there on AND about his person carry a pistol."

Technicalities like that one often defeat justice. The State Bar is working for the elimination of such technicalities by seeking to bring about revision of Texas' Criminal statutes.

### COST OF FIRE

Inflation has now inflated the cost of a fire, reports Ruth Ervin, and is doing nice- and family. Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner.

In June the number of insured fires in Texas hit an all-year low, but dollar losses amounted to the Norman, Okla., Thursday. They Mrs. Jesse Lowe returned third greatest figure of 1948. Last month 431 fires will be met at Wichita Falls by Monday morning from a visit caused a loss of \$1,050,000, as compiled from reports Mrs. Fred Martin and Miss Jea- to relatives and friends in of fire marshals over the state.

May records showed that 440 fires caused a loss of \$823,000, and in April it took 672 fires to cause a loss of \$1,152,000.

However, Hall was encouraged by the fact that June figures did not represent a step in a trend and has hopes that dollar loss figures will also go down next month.

He did add, "actually fire costs today are inflated over those of a number of years ago because the things such as houses, clothes, food and automobiles, that we burn up now, cost much more than they did

The greatest dollar loss in June was caused by defective electricity and was \$315,000 from 51 fires. Second, was electric fans, ventilators and air conditioners with a loss of \$103,000 in 4 blazes, followed by matches and cigarettes with \$61,000 lost in 84 fires.

Sparks from combustion and machinery caused the fourth greatest loss of \$36,000 in 6 alarms; hot water heaters, \$24,000, 13 fires; gas stoves, \$20,000, 17 fires; electric refrigerators, \$19,000, 15 blazes.

Causes of fires which were high in number but low in dollar loss were 30 fires from exposure; 18 from kerosene; 17, trash and rubbish; 15 each from lightning and smoking in bed. Each of these classifications caused a dollar loss of less than \$15,500.



Their service is imperfect, their love is far from perfect, and no man is without sin. But if you can say with Peter, "Lord, thou knowest that I love thee," then you have a right to trust in God. the broken-hearted can safely trust in him. Whoever else may break your heart. God will not. He is the great Mender of hearts. For the little sorrows there may be lesser comforters; but the real heartbreaks only God can cure.

Why Trust God?

PSALM 37 gives one answer: The opposite of trust is worry, and worry never did any good at all. Worry eats into the mind, casts no light, gives no strength, solves no problems, worry makes any trouble worse. Then the writer of Psalm 34 gives another reason for trust: he had tried it. If trust in God were simply a doctrine of theology or a theory of preachers, not many people would take it seriously.

Trust is really passed on by a kind of contagion from heart to heart. If there are not more people who know what trust have known have kept it too much to themselves.

It would be a wonderful stimulus to most churches to have a little "cell" of people who would really agree to trust God every day.

When to Trust in God

NE of Dicken's famous characters used to make a great point of being cheerful under the most un-cheerful circumstances. Anybody can be jolly when everything is lovely, he said. There's no credit in not worrying when there's nothing to worry about. Although the writers of the Bible, one and all, trusted in God, not one had an easy life. Read Psalm 46, for example: it gives a picture of a world much like ours of today, shaken to its foundations, torn by wars, a desolate, discouraged world. If it made sense to trust only under bright skies, religion would have perished long ago.

For What Shall We Trust God?

NO ONE PSALM puts the whole truth in one nutshell. If you read Psalm 91, for example, by itself, it would seem to prove that if you trust in God you will never die violent death, nor an early one; out too many saints (and indeed our Lord himself) had died early and violent deaths, for us to take Psalm 91 in that way. Trusting in God does not mean he will give us long life. It means he will give us

strength to match our days.

It does mean he will give us all we need. It does not mean we shall be shielded from troubles. It does mean he will save us from troubles greater than we can bear. It does not mean that in this life we shall be wholly free from burdens or rom pain; It does mean we have strength in souls (Ps. 138:3).

Which is the greater thing-to be a weakling wearied by a straw's weight, or to be one of God's athletes, able to bear the worst the world can pile on?
