
Senator Dorsey Hardeman Discusses Constitutional Amendments

A very amusing game of "Truth or Consequences" was played by the group after which delicious refreshments were served to the fourteen members and six children.







Mr. Allen called attention to the fact that even with this increased exemption which will only exempt from three to four thousand operators throughout the whole country, many telephone companies are going to be "hard hit" by extra operating costs resulting from this law. It must be remembered that telephone service is a round-the-clock business, with three shifts every 24 hours. This means that the new law will hit be glad to know she is doing the telephone companies three times as hard as the average line of business covered by the Act.

It must also be kept in mind that telephone companies have only one source for revenues from which to pay the costs of their operation - that is in the rates paid by the subscribing public.
