Grass Seed Plantings Made Thursday Church Postponed To November 27th LLANO YELLOW JACKETS TODAY

The Mullin Vocational Training School sponsored a conservation field day for the class on BOY SCOUT TROOP James Aldridge's farm near Democrat on Wednesday afternoon. Biggs Tractor Company from Comanche, Texas, demonstrated the use of farm equipment for doing conservation jobs. Ben R. Day, Work Unit Conservationist of Goldthwaite, laid out the jobs to be done and outlined the methods of con-James Aldridge is a member

of the Mullin Training School and a cooperator with the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. On this farm Aldridge has constructed all the terraces needed and sown 6 acres to wheat and vetch. He has given a 300 acre pasture a complete rest this summer which allowed the desirable grasses to reseed this fall. Wednesday afternoon, by using the equipment on hand, the following jobs were completed: four cuts in the terrace channel were made; three terrace outlets were shaped; a natural drain was shaped for seeding; a gully was plowed in; a waterway was shaped; a terrace was laid off for construction; and various tools for doing stubble mulch farming were used on a field of sorghum

Graves and Luther Soules made a tour of grass seed plantings under the direction of Ben R. Day and Paul Koshi of the Soil Conservation Service of Goldthwaite. - 1. A change in commitment laws of the mentally ill to state institutions. (A constitutional amendment on the November 8 ballot, HJR No. 32.)
- 2. State supported preventive treatment clinics to cure mild mental illness before it develops to a stage requiring hospitalization. Such preventive service Brownwood Wednesday to be Miss Lizzie Head were married would cost a fraction of what it now costs to hospitalize a patient. It would thus not only save the patient, but would also save the state thousands of dollars annually. This proposal is supported by documented proof from other states which installed this service.
- 3. Out-patient treatment clinics for those who now have to be hospitalized for treatment. Other states report that this service is beneficial to patients here for a few days. and a great saving to the state financially.
- 4. A centralized state psychiatric research center for a study of the best methods of treatment.
- 5. Post-detention rehabilitation and social welfare service to help the discharged patient to adjust himself to society and restore his wage-earning capacity, thereby preventing a possible return to an institution.
- 6. A higher pay scale for personnel in order to attract better trained people to staff the eleemosynary
- 7. A thorough survey and complete overhaul of existing laws governing eleemosynary institutions and institutional operation.



> Dr. Cox points out there are several types of colds.

"One comes from sudden chilling, going without a hat, or sitting on the cold ground. It causes congestion of the nasal passage, larynx and lungs. A good hot bath will usually clear up this type," he says.

"Another is caused by sinus trouble. People so afflicted have their nasal passage obstructed on the slightest provocation. In many of these cases, surgical attention is indicated. "Still another type is caused

by bacteria that inhabit the isn't very infectious. Its severity depends entirely on the type bacteria and the extent of their attack."

"The true common cold," Dr. Cox explains, "is caused by a tiny virus or germ. This type is very infectious and may afflict the whole family in a short time. It causes temperature, a headache, and general feeling of indisposition. The treatment is bed rest, good elimination, warmth and a light diet."

How to avoid taking a cold? "Proper nutrition, plenty of sleep, rest and good hygiene are the best way to avoid a long siege of colds," says Dr. Cox.

"Medical advice when trouble develops is sensible," he adds. "Home remedies cause more troubles and complications than they are worth."



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
