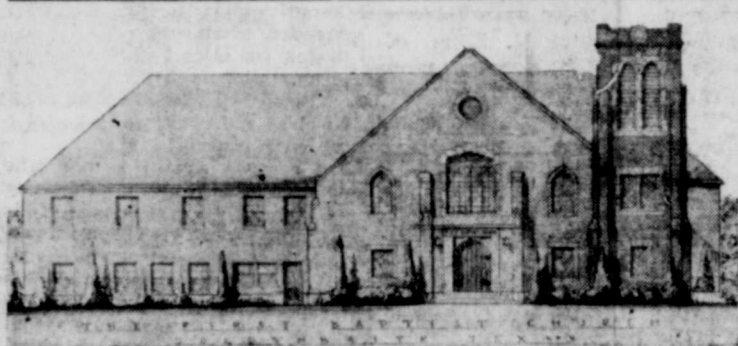
A MODERN HOSPITAL FOR MILLS COUNTY

New Baptist Church To Be Opened Sunday

NEW FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH TO BE OPENED SUNDAY, NOV. 27

The new First Baptist Church will be opened for the first services on next Sunday, November 27, 1949. The congregation has been meeting in the Grammar School Auditorium for the past year and one month since the fire that destroyed the old Building on October 26, 1948.

The beautiful new edifice is of red brick construction with a slate blend asphalt roof. The trim is of cast stone which frames the windows and doors and tower. The building has a total of 13,000 square feet of floor space and is modern in every detail.

As one enters the front foyer there is seen a bronze plaque with a short history of the church with a scripture verse characteristic of the sentiment of the congregation: "Whatever you do, do all to the glory of God"—I Cor. 10:31. Also in the front foyer there are pictures of many of the former pastors of the church. Several of the former pastors have promised to send pictures soon which will ultimately complete the collection.

The auditorium is carpeted from wall to wall with a rose-beige rug which blends with the art glass windows. The emblems in the windows signify a Biblical theme mainly instances out of the life of Christ. These memorial windows are dedicated to the glory of God in memory of the valiant soldiers of the Cross most of whom have already passed on.

At the front of the auditorium the baptistry scene is

the likeness of John the Baptist baptizing Christ in the river Jordan. The stained glass window is illuminated by fluorescent lights from behind. The most beautiful window in the entire building is the gigantic window portraying Jesus Christ in the Garden of Gethsemane. The window is more than eight feet in width and is a life size portrait of Christ.

The pipe organ in the auditorium is a gift of Walter Fairman in memory of his wife, Mrs. Stella Prater Fairman, who was a member of the furnishings committee for the new building until her death on May 25, of this year. The Fairman Memorial Pipe Organ was built by Dr. Robert Markham and his associates from Waco, Texas. Dr. Markham has done a magnificent piece of work in producing for the church one of the finest two-manual pipe organs in this part of the country. The organ consists of ten ranks of pipes which is more than 700 pipes to produce the genuine tones of excellent music. The organ is complete with chimes which can be heard on the inside and in a few weeks are to be amplified so that they can be heard over our little city.

The remaining part of the church is complete in every detail. There are departments for every age group from the tiniest baby to the oldest adult. Spacious, pastel colored assembly rooms and class-rooms add to the comfort of the worshippers. The nursery department is composed of three sections; one for the babes in arms, another for the toddlers and lastly one for those who are old enough to be taught about Jesus. A paid nurse is to be on hand for every service to care for the babies while the parents attend the worship services. The building is equipped with a public address system which will broad-

The Goldthwaite Junior Chamber of Commerce at regular fourth Tuesday night meeting at The Hangar discussed methods of bringing Christmas cheer to underprivileged children of Mills County this season.

President Jesse J. Saegert and Secretary Glenn Collier presided. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. A committee from the Jaycees is to contact other service clubs in Central Texas to work for a mobile post office in this section. The secretary reported that Jaycee pins had been ordered and would be available at next meeting at a cost of 90 cents.

President Saegert read a letter from the manager of the Golden Gloves boxing tournament at Brownwood, and called attention to the elimination tournament to be held at Legion Hall here on Saturday night, December 10.

He said the National Jaycees were backing the Hoover Commission Report on government reorganization 100 per cent, and called attention to Cong. GOVERNMENT—MORE OR LESS?

"The government," says U. S. News & World Report, "has become the biggest source of income in the country. In the single year to end next June 30, the Treasury will spend an estimated \$46,000,000,000 in cold cash. This means that \$1 out of every \$6 spent in the United States will be spent by the government." The magazine then goes into considerable detail as to how all this money is to be divided.

The biggest item in the budget — \$17,300,000 — is accounted for by benefits and subsidies of many diverse kinds. Nearly half of that amount — \$8,300,000,000 — will go to veterans and is one of the payments we are making because of past wars. Then farmers will come in for something over \$2,000,000,000 in direct payments and government crop loans and price supports. Large sums will be paid to the old, the blind, and the unemployed. Finally, \$5,600,000,000 will be paid out to foreign governments and for foreign-aid purchasing.

Item number two — \$10,200,000,000 — will go for salaries. It will go to 3,700,000 people, the number of civilians and military personnel now on the federal payroll. As the U. S. News points out, this does not include those who work indirectly for the government, such as the men and women employed in plants producing materials for federal agencies.

Third is a \$10,000,000,000 item for goods. This includes an enormous number of items, running all the way from airplanes and tanks to paper and ink.

Interest on the public debt will require the sum of \$4,100,000,000. That will be a cash payment, and does not include the interest accruing on war bonds and saving bonds.

Services, such as printing, rent and utility bills, will cost the taxpayers \$2,400,000,000. And something like \$2,000,000,000 will be used for loans and investments.

The above items cover the major expenses of the government. Perhaps the most striking fact is the great increase in the number of individuals who now live off the Federal Treasury. To quote U. S. News again, "Ten years ago, when the New Deal was pouring out billions for direct and work relief, fewer than 20,000,000 persons were getting checks from public agencies. In the period that has followed, the make-work programs of government have disappeared. Prosperity has taken over. Personal incomes trebled. Yet... persons living on public dollars, in whole or in part, jumped 29 per cent."

The implications of this can be argued indefinitely. But it indicates the reasons for the uneasiness of those who wonder how much more government the country can stand.

Spokesman of God

Lesson for November 27, 1949

GOD MAKES USE of strange characters. What shall we think of a preacher who tried to beg off from being a preacher? What can we make of a man who actually reproached God for forcing him into the ministry? How shall we rate a man who in time of war urged his own nation to surrender, who was believed by almost nobody, who was repudiated by his own class and even his own family?

What can we say of a man who was often in hot water with the city authorities, who spent months of his time in jail, who was called subversive, and who never got along with the established religion of his time?

The prophet Jeremiah was that man; yet posterity honored him. His own generation thought him a liar. But some then knew, as we know today, that he was a teller of God's truth, a spokesman of God.

Was he a pessimist? WE KNOW (Jer. 1) that Jeremiah did not wish to be a prophet in the first place, though unlike Isaiah he shrank back not from a sense of sin but because he thought of himself as a mere child.

We know (chap. 20) that at times he was thoroughly discouraged about himself, and even cursed the day he was born. It is also true that in the last war waged by his little country of Judah before it was smashed, his advice from beginning to end was "Surrender."

No wonder people thought him a pessimist, a calamity-howler. But before we call him such names we must remember two things. First is, that his unwillingness to be a prophet, and the fact that so to speak he hated the job, marks a vital fact; he, perhaps even more than other prophets, sensed the difference between his own ideas and what God was saying through him.

Even when what the Lord said was not what they themselves would have wished to say, they spoke for the Lord nevertheless. The other thing to remember is that when everybody wants to believe a pleasant lie, and a man comes along telling the unpleasant truth, he is not a pessimist, he is simply stating facts.

Jeremiah stood by the facts as God gave him insight to see them. If they jailed him for it, he could not help that; but they could not shut his mouth nor close his eyes.

Was he a patriot? JEREMIAH was constantly accused of acts and attitudes which today might be called "subversive," though he dearly loved his country. This was because he dared to rebuke the ambitions of his country's leaders.

They said: Our country shall be free! But Jeremiah knew it would not be free. They said: Our king will conquer! Jeremiah knew he would end his days a prisoner. Jeremiah was unpopular, to put it mildly, because he advised his country to take the only place among the nations it could take—an humble one.

Then, as now, many persons think that patriotism means believing yours is the perfect country. If anyone points to injustice in our land, some one may yell, "Deport him!" But Jeremiah showed what is a true patriot. He is not necessarily the man who approves all the foreign policies of his nation (Jeremiah approved not one), nor the man who speaks only good of his country and his people.

The best patriot is the person who, seeing his country as God sees it, will dare to speak out against evil wherever he finds it.

A Way to Know God JEREMIAH knew God well, and the trouble with his contemporaries was that they did not know God. But Jeremiah did not say: "Know God by becoming a prophet like me," for he knew that only a few are called to be prophets. Neither did he say, "Go to church oftener," for you can see in chap. 7 what he thought of the Temple of his time.

He pointed to the good king Josiah (chap. 13). That king had found God, not in a mystic vision like Jeremiah's, not in burnt offerings and sacrifices, but in the doing of justice, looking out for the exploited, caring for the helpless, seeing that justice was done.

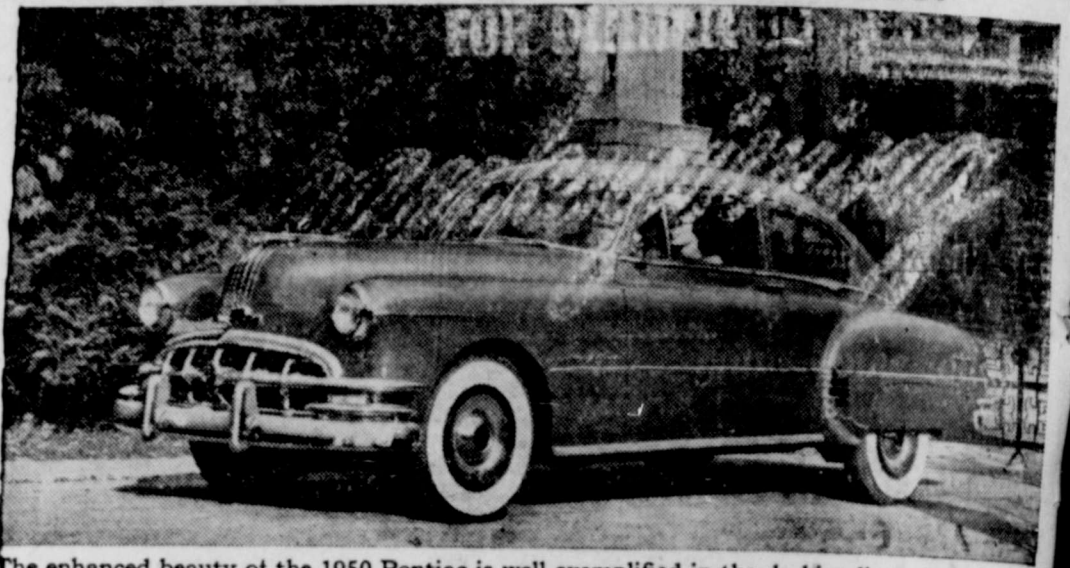

Wildlife Restoration of the Game Fish and Oyster Commission was present to give detail working plans of the refuge.

Contracts for a five year close season on only deer and turkey will be taken by the Game Department. This will mean that landowners of the area may hunt doves, quail, squirrels, fur bearing animals, ducks, etc or may allow others to hunt them on the area. But landowners must help in the protection of both deer and turkey. Both deer and turkey will be stocked on the area by the Game Department in cooperation with the Federal Government who will aid with the project. A solid block of land is necessary for the establishment of the refuge. The landowners themselves will get the contracts signed of the area and then turn them over to the Game Department. It is planned to stock the area with turkey in January and then over a three year period; other releases of deer and turkey will be made on central located ranches and no attempt will be made to make releases on every land owners place. Mr. Glazener said that the area will be very suitable to deer and turkey and should be ready for controlled hunting on both species at the end of five years. No opposition to the project was voiced at the meeting and all landowners in the area voted to start signing up the area immediately. These ranchmen at the meeting represented about 30,000 acres of land of the area and were ready to complete the project.

Signs will be furnished by the Game Department to go up around the area to mark it in a way that everyone will have knowledge of the Camp Bowie Game Refuge.

BIG GAME HUNTING LICENSES

Who has to buy the Big Game Hunting License?

Every person who hunts deer and turkey anywhere (even in your own home county) has to have a Big Game Hunting License.

If you are under the age of 17 years (that means that if you have not reached your 17th birthday) you can get an exempt Big Game License free.

If you are over the age of 17 and hunt deer or turkey on land on which you live then you too will be eligible to get a free Big Game License. That free license will not entitle you to hunt any other place except on the land which you live. Otherwise you must buy a Big Game Hunting License costing \$2.15.

THOSE DEER TAGS

Two tags will be attached to your license. These are for deer only. No tags are necessary for turkey. Just be sure that those tags will be wrapped on the horn in such a manner that they will not be lost off. Lap them around the horn and then make a number of wraps with a 12 or 15 inch piece of string and tie a good knot. This is not a very good tag, but no doubt the Game Department will have a good tag for your deer next year. That tag must remain on the deer till it is disposed of and then the tag must be destroyed.

LOST LICENSES

If you lose your license, secure the number from the agent that sold you the license and with all the information required on your license, send 50 cents to the Game Department, Austin, Texas, on a form furnished you by your game warden or license agent and a duplicate license may be secured.




