## Rural Telephone Cooperative Set To Serve Soon

A big boost to Goldthwaite as a trading center was promised this week with announcement of the organization of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative to serve rural areas in Mills County as well as in adjacent counties.

Willis Hill, President of the projected Cooperative and the sparkplug of the effort that is bringing it into being, said that the rural telephone service will be set up along the lines of the Rural Electrification Administration and that, with its central exchange in Goldthwaite, it will serve to channel trade from outlying districts into this city.

In addition to President Hill, the officers of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative are Warren P. Duren, Vice President; Ernest E. Wilson, Secretary; and Walter Marwitz, Delton Barnett, Mr. Duren, Mr. Hill and Mr. Wilson, Directors.

A definite starting date for the rural service of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative has not yet been set, but the necessary papers are "in the works" in Washington, where comparatively recent legislation made possible federal aid to such undertakings.

Before the announcement of the organization of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, there was an extensive survey which resulted in so sympathetic a response that the Cooperative is able to forecast an ultimate list of subscribers of 1,500—possibly 2,000.

Under its organization setup, the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative will not, by any means, be confined in its operations to Mills County, Mr. Hill said in his announcement. It will be able to extend its lines into adjoining counties. They will, however, all clear through the central exchange that is to be established in Goldthwaite.

## Famous Newsmen Here For Visit With Old Eagle

Distinguished visitors came to Goldthwaite this week with the arrival of Dwight S. Perrin, America's best newspaperman, and Mrs. Perrin, who served during the war as a Major in the Women's Army Corps.

For a portion of her wartime service, Mrs. Perrin was stationed at Camp Hood, where she was Troop Movements Officer in charge of overseas embarkations.

En route to California from Syracuse, N. Y., Mr. and Mrs. Perrin came to Goldthwaite to visit the Eagle's editor who, many years ago, worked under Mr. Perrin when he was the city editor of the New York Herald.

Mr. Perrin's long experience has included also the city editorship of the New York Herald-Tribune and the assistant managing editorship of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch. From 1939 to 1948 he was managing editor of the Philadelphia Bulletin, which he built up to the largest circulation of any afternoon newspaper in the United States.

For the past two years, Mr. Perrin was executive editor of the Syracuse Herald-Journal and Herald-American. He resigned those posts early this month for a period of recuperation from a serious illness.

## Goldthwaite Post Office Ahead Of Gun In Rural Box Improvement

May 1 to 7 has been designated officially as Rural Mail Box Improvement Week, but Mills County already is far ahead of the rest of the country. Patrons of the Post Office here have been fixing their mail boxes on the rural and star routes served out of the Goldthwaite Post Office, and Acting Postmaster Lucile Fairman, as well as the carriers, are highly pleased about it all.

For the March 17 issue of the Eagle, the editor went out to see for himself what was wrong with rural mail boxes. He found out first how Uncle Sam wanted them to be. Reprints of the article entitled, "Now The Editor Knows How Uncle Sam Wants Mail Boxes," were distributed by order of Postmaster Fairman to all boxes served from Goldthwaite. There were some official notices, too, but the carriers have their reports in on the results, and the reports generally are

good. The carriers who operate out of the Goldthwaite Post Office are Col. M. Y. Stokes, Jr., Rt. 1; Julian Evans, Rt. 2; A. L. Whittaker, Rt. 3; Clem Howard, Moline Route; and Otis Howard, Caradan Route.

They have reported to Postmaster Fairman that there has been cooperation by rural box holders as well as wonderful cooperation from the Texas Highway Department, which has pitched in to move mail boxes from one side of the road to the other. The Highway Department has prepared the right of way for mail boxes and it has put up supports for them. In several cases, traffic dangers have been eliminated.

In one case, a box holder moved his box so that the carrier would not have to cross to the wrong side of the road in a "no passing" zone. The only complaint, and it was a good natured one, came from his

## KEMP, WESSON AND TIPPEN SCORE FIRST AT TARLETON

James Kemp, Kenneth Wesson and James Tippen have turned tonight's Goldthwaite Future Farmers of America banquet into a victory celebration by winning first place, against teams from 112 other schools, in the livestock judging contest at Tarleton State College at Stephenville last Monday. Among all of the contestants, James Kemp, 15, was high point man, and Kenneth Wesson, 16, was fourth.

The local boys, whose F. F. A. activity is an integral part of the Goldthwaite High School program under the direction of Y. B. Johnson, Vocational Agricultural Instructor, judged ten classes of breeding and fat hogs, sheep and cattle in the competition at Stephenville. They were up against the toughest sort of competition against teams from areas 4, 8, and 12, which embraces that vast portion of Texas stretching from north of Fort Worth to below San Antonio. Yet, James Tippen, Kenneth Wesson and James Kemp scored as the high team for all three areas.

They now have qualified to enter the State-wide contest at A. and M. College on May 6.

Because of the victory at Stephenville, there will be added significance to the F. F. A. banquet at the Goldthwaite High School lunchroom at 7:30 o'clock tonight, Friday. At the banquet, the big blue and gold banner won by Tippen, Wesson and Kemp at Stephenville will be displayed.

Jimmy Hays will be banquet master of ceremonies. High School Principal J. N. Faith will be called upon for the invocation, and the F. F. A. queen will be crowned by George Cline and John Miller. The guests will be introduced by President Jimmy Hays, and Grady Carothers will deliver

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## The Eagle Won't Put Money Value On The Good Rain

The rains came and went, leaving everybody happy. From the night of Wednesday, April 12, until this week's Eagle went to press, Harry Allen's gauge in Goldthwaite had recorded a total rainfall of 3.35 inches.

Out in the County, it must have rained harder or longer or heavier, or something, because the precipitation was registered at Mullin as 3.71 inches.

In the other direction, on the D. D. Henry farm, 2 1/2 miles southeast of Star, the rainfall was registered as 4.7 inches. At Herman Ford's place, three miles southwest of Star, the total rainfall for the period was 4.5 inches, four inches of it since Thursday morning, April 13.

This report is written primarily for the Eagle subscribers who do not live in Mills County. Those subscribers who do live here know all about the rain and, until the next rains come, they will be arguing about the accuracy of the gauge measurements.

For example, more rain than fell anywhere else dropped plumb on Loy Long's grocery store, and Mr. Long had himself quite a time mopping up a lot of rain that got inside the store—mostly through the roof. Mr. Long has taken steps to see to it that no such thing ever happens again.

The Eagle has noted that many of its contemporaries called it "the million dollar rain." From all we hear, it was worth more than that, but we don't know just how much.

## Why Phone Co. Wants Rate Hike In Goldthwaite

An explanation as to why the Southwestern States Telephone Company is seeking to increase its rates was made this week in a public statement to the citizens of Goldthwaite by John D. Allen, Division Manager for the Company, with headquarters in Brownwood.

Mr. Allen said that under existing charges for telephone service in Goldthwaite, the Southwestern States Telephone Company is not earning a fair return upon a fair value of its property or investment. He said the company aims to obtain at least a 4.8 per cent return on its investment.

The present earnings are the lowest in the history of his company's operation in Goldthwaite, Mr. Allen said, although there has been an increase in the number of telephone stations, the present earnings of the company are not adequate for meeting its public service obligations.

"They must be increased if the company is to expand the system and improve the service to meet the needs of the people of this city," according to Mr. Allen's statement. He said that expenses have increased at a greater rate than revenues, that his company's payroll in Goldthwaite last year was more than four times higher than before the war, thereby contributing to a decline in earnings despite the increase in the number of subscribers.

"The telephone company's operations in Goldthwaite in 1948 resulted in a deficit of \$1,204.17," Mr. Allen said. "The deficit was even greater in 1949. Operators' wages have increased, due to new labor union contracts.

"New rates, for which the Southwestern States Telephone Company is applying, will increase costs to Goldthwaite subscribers a total of \$4,880.00—the amount necessary to offset the deficit at Goldthwaite and other operating costs over which the Company has no control."

Continuing his statement, Mr. Allen said: "Each telephone added to the system today requires a much larger investment than before the war. Each telephone added in the City of Goldthwaite requires materials purchased at higher prices, higher labor cost and, in the case of reaching

Today, Friday, is the day the free chest X-ray examinations start at the Smith Equipment Company on the east side of the Square in Goldthwaite. The examinations will be available also Saturday and next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

At a meeting held last Tuesday in the office of County Judge L. B. Porter, it was voted to allocate separate days to the various Mills County Schools.

Today, Friday, has been set aside for the Goldthwaite School. Next Tuesday has been reserved for the Mullin School, Wednesday for the Priddy School, and Thursday for the Star School.

Any person over the age of 15 may take advantage of the free chest X-rays on any day most convenient to them, but on the days listed above, transportation is provided.

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## Weather Brings Immediate Need For Anthrax War

Vaccination of cattle against anthrax is urgently required now because of the effects of the rainy spell, Dr. O. A. Danford said this week.

"Now is the time," Dr. Danford said. He explained that normally, anthrax germs hibernate in the ground and are dormant until damp, warm weather causes them to germinate. The recent weather, plus the presence of stagnant water, is certain to cause germination of anthrax, thereby requiring prompt inoculation to protect cattle against the destructive and costly disease, Dr. Danford said.

While he was at it, Dr. Danford also emphasized the necessity for protection against rabies among dogs. He said that with the possibility of compulsory vaccination just around the corner, dog owners should have their dog collar tags and vaccination certificates from veterinarians ready for inspection.

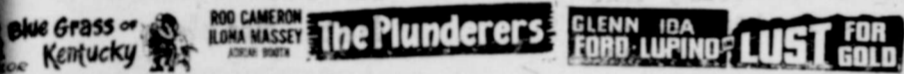

### Rev. James Newman To Speak At Mullin Church Sunday, April 23

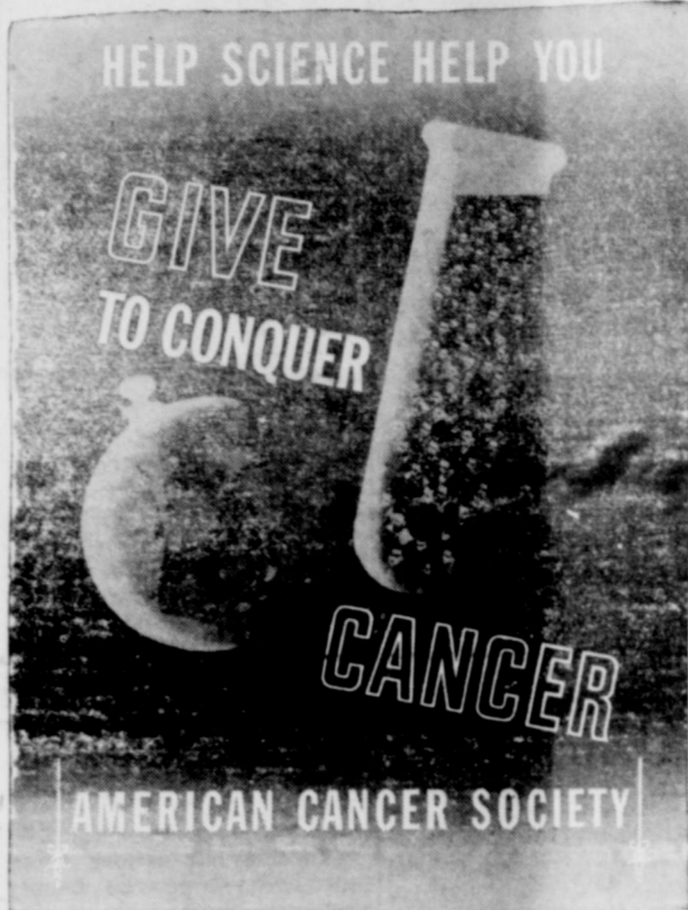

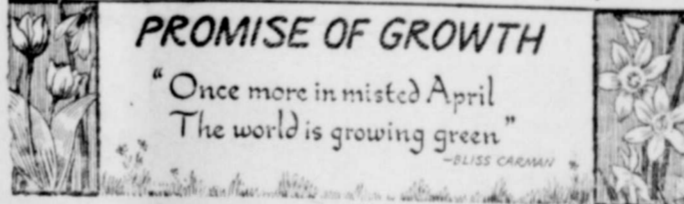

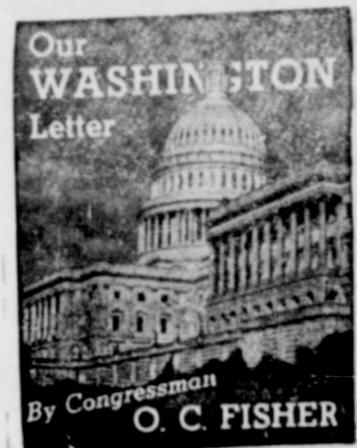

Thousands of visitors thronged the streets of Washington last week during the annual Cherry Blossom Festival which coincided with Easter this year. The corridors of the capitol were crowded with parties of school children and other sight-seers from nearby states who took advantage of the holiday to visit Washington. It is too bad that Texas is so far away that our school children cannot readily visit their nation's capitol to view the many historic sights that should be a part of every youngster's education.
The House is in the midst of its annual ten day Easter recess which enables members to visit constituents at home or catch up on back work. The Senate is back in session after a four day layoff in an effort to catch up with the House since its rules of procedure make progress somewhat slower than in the lower chamber.
Last year the Department of Agriculture and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association undertook a project to promote the use of mohair. The Department furnished \$20,000 and \$10,000 was raised by contributions from members of the Association to hire a private contractor to carry out the research and service work of the project.
The contractor has conducted extensive interviews among manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers to determine the changes in style, technological processes, and alternative raw materials which has resulted in the decrease demand for mohair. Textile engineering laboratories are being employed to develop fabrics made of mohair or mohair combined with other fibers such as cotton and synthetic staples. Prospective or improved uses of mohair are being investigated for such products as knitting yarns, furniture coverings, clothing, draperies, carpets, auto seat upholstery, and many others.
This project represents a splendid effort on the part of their industry to develop their industry to meet the ever-changing demands of the public. A committee composed of various Agriculture Department officials supervises the project and meets every few weeks to review the progress being made by the contractor. I sit in on the meetings informally on behalf of the mohair producers. When the project is completed the committee hopes to have accumulated much valuable information that will provide many additional uses for mohair products.

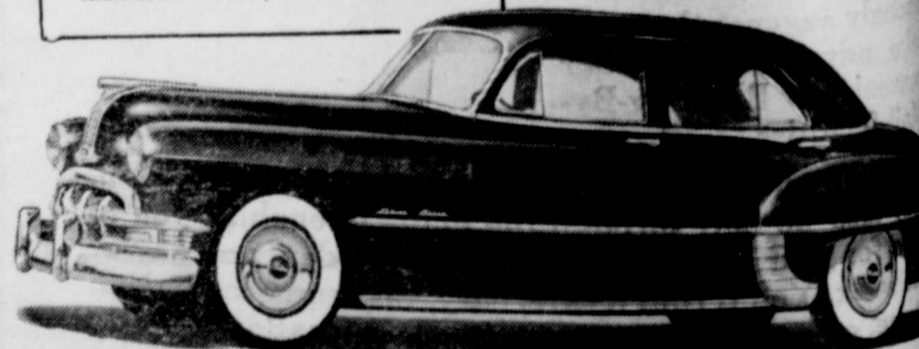

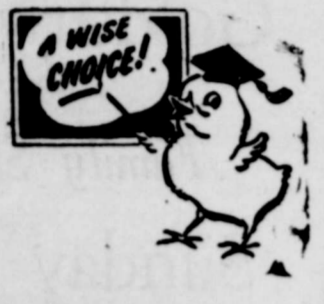

### Here Is Timely News For Those Now In Politics

The Texas law on political advertising is Article 211 of Vernon's Penal Code. The law states "Anything published in newspapers, pamphlet or printed journal in favor of or in opposition to any candidate for any public office or in favor of or in opposition to the success of any political party, or any proposition submitted to a vote of the people, when the same is published in consideration of the receipt or promise of money or thing of value, shall be known as political advertising. And no such advertisement shall be accepted for publication or printing unless it is signed by the responsible chairman of any candidate's committee, or any candidate himself, political committee, or by the chairman or representative of any commercial or other organization, or by the individual responsible for its publication, and such signature shall appear in the advertisement as printed. All advertisements of marked ballots, advising or suggesting how voters should mark their ballots shall be included in the meaning of this Article; and any editor, publisher, manager or agent of any newspaper,

pamphlet or printed journal who shall publish political advertising other than as advertising matter, which shall be labeled at the beginning or end thereof with the word 'advertisement', or who shall wilfully demand or receive for the publication of such political advertising money or other thing of value in excess of the sum due for such service at the regular advertising rates of such newspaper, pamphlet or printed journal, or any person who shall pay, or offer to pay the editor, publisher, manager or agent of any newspaper, pamphlet or printed journal any money or thing of value for the publication of political advertising, except as advertising matter, shall be fined not less than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) nor more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000), or be imprisoned in jail not less than ten (10) days nor more than thirty (30) days. Nothing herein shall be construed as applying to announcements of candidates for office." Acts 1905, p. 560, para. 617; Acts 1935, 44th Leg., p. 709, ch. 304, para. 1.

The Federal Law pertaining to political advertising is HR No. 2673, now known as Public Law No. 544. The act reads: "Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That no person, association, organization, committee or corporation shall publish or distribute, or cause to be published or distributed, any printed, multi-graphed, photographed, type-written, or written pamphlet, circular, card, dodger, poster, advertisement, or any other statement, relating to or concerning any candidate for election as President or Vice-President of the United States, or as Senator or Representative in, or Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, the Congress of the United States, unless such pamphlet, circular, card, dodger, poster, advertisement, or statement contain the name or names of the person or persons, association, committee, or corporation responsible for the publication or distribution of the same, and if an association, committee or corporation is responsible for the publication or distribution of the same, there shall be attached the names of the officers of such association, committee, or corporation.

SECTION 2. Any person who willfully violates the provisions of section 1 of this Act, or aids and abets in a violation thereof, shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than \$1000, or imprisoned for not more than one year, or both.

SECTION 3. When used in the Act, the term 'election' shall include a general or special election, and shall also include a primary election or convention of a political party. The term 'candidate' means any person who has publicly declared his intention to seek election to any of the offices named in section 1 of this Act or who has caused or permitted his intention to do so to be publicly declared."

The official announcement from Washington on Rural Mail Box Improvement Week says:

"Rural mail boxes which are not properly erected or which are not in good, serviceable condition retard the delivery of mail and expose it to damage from the elements. It is the desire of the Post Office Department to encourage patrons of the rural delivery service to provide suitable mail receptacles and to erect them in such a manner that they will be readily accessible to the carrier and present a neat appearance."

They have been doing just that in Mills County. Mr. Postmaster General. Here in Goldthwaite, Postmaster Fairman says "thank you" to those who have complied with her requests and she hopes that before May 1, all rural boxes here will conform with official regulations.

new additions to the city, cash outlay for the purchase of cable, poles, etc. All materials are purchased at much higher cost than before the war. The earnings in the telephone business are not large enough to provide adequate funds for this expansion.

"Additions and improvements must be financed by earnings and investors dollars. While the telephone company's huge plant expansion program is under way (by this we mean the conversion of various towns from common battery to dial and magneto offices to common battery offices) industry in general is also enlarging its capacity and many companies are seeking to attract new capital for this purpose.

"In consequence: there is active competition for the investors dollar. The telephone company can enter this competition successfully only if the level and stability of its earnings compare favorably with the earnings of others seeking capital funds."

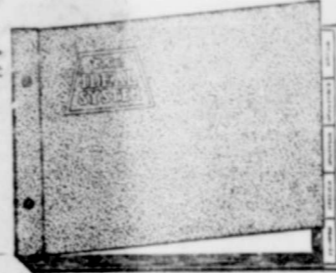
