## F Steinman Killed In Car Snake Accident

The appearance of a snake on the highway late last Tuesday caused the death of Charlie Fritz Steinman, 66, who made his home at the residence of Raymond Horton of Caradan. Funeral services for Mr. Steinman were conducted at Priddy Thursday afternoon, with the Rev. Mr. Weisner of Temple officiating. Arrangements were by the Fairman-Wilkins Funeral Home. Interment was in the Priddy Cemetery.

Last Tuesday, Mr. Steinman was returning to Caradan by automobile from Goldthwaite with Mrs. Lester Kerby. They were about one mile west of Caradan when they believed their car had run over a rattlesnake.

Wishing to be certain that the snake had been killed, Mr. Steinman and Mrs. Kerby decided to back the car to the point at which the snake had been seen. That involved backing up a grade toward a curve in the road. At the spot where the snake had been sighted, and despite a warning by Mrs. Kerby, Mr. Steinman opened the door of the car, and, as the automobile continued moving, he fell onto the road.

Mrs. Kerby called for help, and her cries were heard at some distance by Mr. and Mrs. Raymond H. Williams. Mr. and Mrs. Williams who had just killed a snake, themselves, responded to Mrs. Kerby's cries. Mr. Williams, who is an instructor in the Mills County Vocational School, applied artificial respiration to Mr. Steinman, but in vain. Apparently Mr. Steinman had been killed when his head struck the ground as he fell from the automobile.

Mr. Steinman was born at Independence, in Washington County. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Emil J. Steinman. His mother was the former Louise Stegemoller. Mr. Steinman was 66 years of age.

## Fuller's Trial Date Tentatively Set For June 8

The date for trial of Tom Fuller on two charges of assault with intent to commit murder has been set tentatively for Thursday, June 8, at the Mills County Court House, with District Judge Wesley Dice presiding.

Fuller, who inflicted shotgun wounds on R. L. "Bob" Cockrum and Luther Booker on May 2, has been under observation by mental experts in Austin for some time. It was expected that he would be returned to Goldthwaite from Austin by Sheriff Wiley L. Mahan in time for the tentative trial date on June 8.

Whether a jury panel would be called for next week was in doubt since it was not certain whether Fuller's Attorney, H. W. Allen of Hamilton, would be ready for trial or whether he might make motions that would

## Commissioners Complete 1950 Tax Roll Review

Judge Lewis B. Porter said that last week, the Commissioners completed their review of the tax rolls on schedule. There was, of course, no announcement on whose taxes got raised, whose taxes remained the same and what taxes were lowered, if any.

The Commissioners labored last Thursday, Friday and well into Saturday in their equalization session at the Mills County Court House. All of them seemed relieved when the chore was over.

## June 5 Deadline For Rural Phone Service Papers

Work on the final tabulation of applications for rural dial telephone service by the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative now is being completed and the applications and other necessary papers will be forwarded to Washington during the next few days, it was announced late this week by Secretary Ernest Wilson of the Co-op.

Mr. Wilson said that on the heels of applications filed during the past few weeks the service of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative will extend into Hamilton, Brown, San Saba and Lampasas Counties, with Goldthwaite as the hub of the telephone network. He added that the service will, of course, cover all sections of Mills County from which applications have been received.

June 5 has been set as the deadline for completing maps of the projected network. Accordingly, Mr. Wilson said, any person who still would like to have a modern telephone and to participate in the Cooperative may communicate immediately with him, with President Willis A. Hill, Vice President Warren P. Duren or County Judge L. B. Porter.

In a statement, Mr. Wilson said:

"Dozens of public spirited citizens throughout the county have wholeheartedly helped in this enterprise, and the committee is grateful to them, and assures them that every effort will be made to get the applications processed and approved by the Government at the earliest possible moment. Loans approved under this law require that the telephone system be of the most modern design. This portion of the law has been interpreted by REA officials as meaning dial type telephones with automatic switchboards. This arrangement will give rural people in this section telephone service in the class with big cities.

"National REA officials emphasize that, once the telephone system has been 'engineered out,' additional subscribers cannot be received. The cost of installing surplus equipment to take care of prospective subscribers would increase the load on these first receiving the service and work an undue hardship on them. For that reason the system will be 'tailored to fit' the applicants, whose applications will be forwarded June 5th."

and ranchers co- one of his pastures that he has rested. The steep slopes are well protected and there is very little loss of soil and water, even in a heavy rainstorm. On other pastures, he is gradually getting the choice native grasses back by deferring. One pasture in particular was severely over-used in the past. Last year he rested it during the growing season and it is beginning to look like a different pasture with bunches of Little bluestem and Sideoats grama coming back without having to reseed it.

Paul Koshi, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service of Goldthwaite says: "It is necessary to start resting a pasture from about May 1st to June 15th in order to increase the vigour of grasses and develop a deeper root system. These choice native grasses are extremely palatable during the summer months, therefore it is necessary to remove all the livestock from a pasture in order to allow the grasses to grow. Even the pet riding pony can graze off most of the available seed heads. Since the Indian-grass, Little bluestem and Sideoats grama seeds mature in the fall, the livestock should be kept off until first killing frost."

Paul Koshi points out that after frost the grasses will furnish winter grazing, but he recommends that half of the total year's growth of grasses be left on the land as litter. This ground cover breaks the force of the beating raindrops and acts as a sponge in holding the water. The soil will not

### THOSE CENSUS RETURNS AGAIN

This is the last call to notify the Eagle or the District Office of the Bureau of Census in San Angelo if you were not enumerated in the 1950 Census that was taken last April. Many places in Texas, especially cities that are engaged in rivalry with other cities, are not only screaming about the Census returns but, in some cases, they are making their own counts, using Chambers of Commerce and other organizations for the job. In our own case, there appears no reason to doubt the accuracy of a population count of 5,973 for Mills County, 1,559 for Goldthwaite and 324 for Mullin. After having asked, in two issues, for complaints against failure to have been enumerated, the Eagle has received only three complaints—which do not affect the overall Census returns to any consequential degree. But the Bureau of the Census continues to be ready and willing to receive notifications about anybody who was not counted last April so, if you think you were not enumerated, please let us know promptly so that whatever goes into the record as final and official will give us no less than we really deserve.

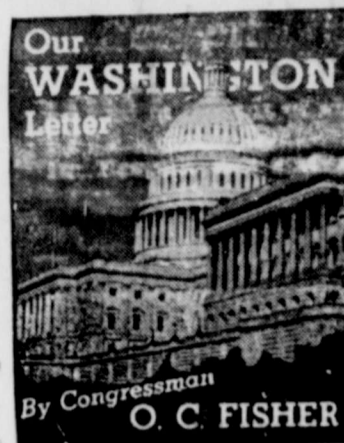

Surplus material being removed from the White House will be disposed of over the Nation, mainly to museums, schools and other organizations, according to the Commission on Renovation of the Executive Mansion.

Senators and Congressmen have been asked to invite such groups in their states and districts to apply. In processing all applications, the Commission will be guided by these factors:

1—An equitable, nationwide, non-partisan, non-sectarian, and non-commercial distribution, based upon population quotas.

2—Major items of high historical importance should be allocated to the larger museums or similar institutions of a public character.

3—The costs of distribution should be self-liquidating.

4—No charge will be made for the material, but the recipients should pay the costs of packing, shipping, and transportation.

Other than the museum pieces, the material comprises the usual defective lumber, bricks, etc. which would result from the reconstruction of any building. There will be stone, brick, pine timbers, floor boards, old-fashioned nails, wrought-iron bands, hand-hewn lath, and small plaster ornaments.

The handling costs, which will include classifying, selecting, cutting, wrapping, etc., will vary with the demand and with the size of the articles. They may run from 50c for a small article to as much as \$100 for enough stone to face a fireplace or a shrine.

All applications must be filed with the Commission before June 15. If eligible applicants in our district should be interested in being considered, they may so indicate to me and the Commission will be advised.

Sixteen of the 21 Reorganization Plans which President Truman submitted to Congress two months ago became effective on Wednesday of last week.

The other five were vetoed by the Senate and do not go into operation.

The President may, if he desires, revamp the five defeated plans and then resubmit them for approval. The fact is most of these included features never included in the Hoover reports and can easily be amended to remove the objectionable parts.

### TAXES

The Brookings Institute in Washington is out with another of its painstaking and accurate studies. This time it says that high income taxes on business and individuals are a breeder of price increases and represent the biggest obstacle to industrial growth.

"A tax policy that will promote economic expansion and high level income is imperative," Economist Lewis H. Kimmel says in the newest Brookings Institute study.

Top bracket income taxes now run as high as 82 per cent. The Brookings study urges immediate reductions "so that no taxpayer would give the Government more than 60 per cent of his income. Ultimately, a limit of 50 per cent should be reached because when taxes take more than one-half of income, there is often a strong psychological reaction."

The Eagle publishes this portion of the Brookings Institute report because we believe that too many people have surrendered too many rights to unlimited Government. Many rights have passed into the hands of those who know that taxation is a weapon that can be used for destruction—and they are using it to destroy.

# The Eagle's Aerial

By The Editor

The editor is worried. He believes that time is running out in the "cold war" and that a decision involving the fate of much of mankind is not very far away. He would like, this week, to use this space to chat—not about Mills County and the readers of the Eagle, but rather about the events in the world that cause him to be worried. In so doing, he would also like to personalize and to use the first person singular.

I spent some 20 years of my life living and working abroad as a newspaperman. Most of that experience was in combat areas. I worked for the United Press, the New York Times, the Scripps - Howard Newspapers and the Christian Science Monitor on islands of the Pacific, in China, Japan and Korea, in Southeast Asia and India, in Europe, Africa and the Middle East. My assignments included Washington, New York, London, Paris and Rome. My reporting in the past also has originated from Shanghai, Peiping, Tokyo, Manila, Honolulu, Calcutta and such less well-known places as Balikpapan in Borneo, Mongolia, Mukden, Nanking, Hongkong and Hankow—and such places as Singapore, Cairo, Addis Ababa, Port Said, Jerusalem and Baghdad.

I covered the internecine wars in China that followed Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's attempts to unify that tragic land. I covered China's war against Japan and I reported China's struggle against Communism. On the scene, I reported the war between Italy and Ethiopia, and I was a correspondent accredited to General Eisenhower's Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Forces, in World War II.

I bring up this personal history, not to recall even to myself my work of yesteryears but, because, having been on the scene of so many of mankind's most recent tragedies, it is inevitable that I am able to see parallels between the past and the present. Somebody has said that all we learn from history is that mankind learns nothing from history. Yet, history has followed a pattern, and the pattern of the present is so much like the pattern of the very recent past that men who follow events and whose memories are vivid can be only fearful.

What makes me fearful now is that Trygve Lie, the Secretary General of the United Nations, is back from his talks with Marshal Stalin in Moscow. It is abundantly clear that the "cold war" can be ended only on Russian terms and that Mr. Lie recognizes the very life of the United Nations itself is in danger. Actually, the United Nations never had a chance to make human dreams of peace come true. It has been morally and politically bankrupt from the start because Russia and the Russian satellite states have been in it only for the purpose of rendering it impotent.

I am fearful, also, because in the Whitsuntide demonstrations staged by the Russians in Berlin last weekend, so many on-lookers were able to watch German youth march and mutter to themselves, "just like Hitler." Yes, the regimentation everywhere behind the Iron Curtain is the regimentation imposed by all Dictators—whether Nazi, Fascist or Communist. The pattern for world conquest that was tried in the past is being used again in preparation for the immediate future: when catastrophe again we shall know with every passing day, warning still goes out to so many people who are grossed in their own minds that they do not look for a horizon.

I am fearful, again, because so many Russians, and revolution, treaty, and in both political and military organizations have been extended into areas. The vast areas of Americans do not know the truth about what is going on in Asia because our officials, down through the years, have blundered, being responsible for the loss of China to Red Russia. We have lost our grip on Asia not only because the line now controls the greatest reservoir of oil but because by our own can no longer reach our Chinese friends. It is to be told the truth about the catastrophic setback to freedom in Asia except those who are making foreign affairs are made cause among us there is the understanding of the forces at work and tend our doom. written.) Mr. McCullough, it appears, has some reservations. Ladies, he said, can qualify for mink coats IF treasure is found on his ranch ONLY IF they live beyond the city limits of Goldthwaite. That was okay for Miss Nix. She lives OUTSIDE, just outside, the Goldthwaite city limits. The editor's wife lives in Goldthwaite, and when she heard Mr. McCullough, she began screaming. Mr. McCullough heard the editor's wife screaming, and he promptly amended all and aforesaid to say that IF treasure were to be found on his ranch, the editor's wife would qualify for diamonds. End of screaming. (She's out there digging too.)

Miss Ervin, who lives in Goldthwaite, did not scream. The chance is that she will not have a mink coat—ever.

Before leaving the treasure trove-mink coat-diamonds story smack in the lap of the editor, Mr. McCullough further amended all prior commitments by proclaiming that any woman attempting to qualify for mink coats (or diamonds) would have to submit to him first her specifications. Stubborn inquiry disclosed that by "specifications" Mr. McCullough really meant "measurements." Tut, tut, Mr. McCullough—who do you think you are, Billy Rose?

Mr. McCullough said they have been digging for "Spanish Treasure" hereabouts for some 100 years. He admitted, reluctantly, that some folks in Mills County take the treasure trove story very, very seriously. (So did The Saturday Evening Post, a while back.) Mr. McCullough then departed, keeping a wary eye on the editor's wife, Miss Nix and Miss Ervin. So far, he has delivered neither mink coats, diamonds or a hospital.

For the record, the Eagle reports, as a supplement to the above, that the following was printed in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram this week. We quote: "Two Del Rio men will use scientific equipment in a quest for a fabulous fortune in silver and gold that has eluded treasure hunters since 1901.

"J. W. Fisher and J. R. Latham have started sinking a shaft at Dry Pond on the W. P. McCullough ranch, three miles northeast of Goldthwaite. Three Tarleton College students, Charlie Harris of San Antonio, Randy Evans of Texas City, Earl Fisher and his son of Mullin and Bill Dosier of Waco will help.

"Legend has it that the Spaniards left approximately \$13,000,000 worth of silver in the San Saba (or Bowie) mine in 1762, when they were forced to return to Mexico after an Indian uprising.

"Dry Pond was spotted in 1901 as the site of the treasure when a foreigner came to Mullin with a map said to have been taken by a Mexican off the body of James Bowie after he fell at the Alamo.

"The foreigner was looking for a copper spike driven into one three post oak trees which formed a triangle. Later, Dr. Jim Kirkpatrick of Mullin found a copper spike at Mullin after one of the trees had been cut down. Two copper plates with legible engravings, a hand-hammered copper box containing a crucifix, a set of pearls and a rosary were found near the two remaining trees.

"Tunnels 20 feet down and running in three directions from Dry Pond were discovered in 1935 by D. W. Stephens of San Saba and T. H. Oglesby of Eastland County.

"The contract between McCullough, owner of the land, and the treasure hunters calls for one-third to the landowner and two-thirds to the diggers.

"McCullough, owner of three lumber yards and appliance stores and 10 sections of ranch land in Mills County, says if and when the treasure is found he will build a \$200,000 hospital for Mills County and has promised nearly every woman in Goldthwaite a new fur coat."

That was what was printed in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram this week. They are digging at the McCullough ranch. They are importing doodlebugs that have been especially educated for locating troves of silver and
