New Land Erosion Hazard Is Found And Coped With By The Soil Service

A new erosion hazard that threatens to hinder the establishment of other conservation measures has been discovered by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service and is being studied here by Charles Haenisch, Soil Conservationist with the Goldthwaite Work Unit. Some farmers are having difficulty in getting cover crops of vetch and clover established. Crops suffer for moisture soon after a rain, and the excessive runoff from some fields indicates that something is causing the soil to shed much-needed water during a rain.

Another factor which prevents the free flow of water through the soil is the compaction which results from the travel of rubber tired tractors and imple-

ments over the soil, especially when the soil is moist. When livestock are allowed to graze on wet fields, compaction and puddling result. It is this water-proofed condition of the soil that causes high runoff rates, that shuts out the air in the soil, and causes crops to suffer because no water is stored up. How can the conservation

New Land Erosion Hazard Is Found And Coped With By The Soil Service

THE MULLIN ENTERPRISE

A new erosion hazard that threatens to hinder the establishment of other conservation measures has been discovered by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service and is being studied here by Charles Haenisch, Soil Conservationist with the Goldthwaite Work Unit, Some farmers are having difficulty in getting cover crops of vetch and clover established. Crops suffer for moisture soon after a rain, and the excessive runoff from some fields indicates that something is causing the soil to shed much-needed water during a rain.

Another factor which prevents the soil is the compaction which

(Continued From First Page.) the water in-take to 2.75 inches per hour, but after the soil had been wet for 17 hours, the rate of intake was reduced to 1 inch per hour.

Mr. Haenisch says that a farmer can probably find a restrictive layer in his field if it does not produce crops as it should. Vetch and Sweetclovers will not grow in fields where the soil is compacted and void of air space. Proper plowing and a good growth of hairy vetch, Austrian winter peas and sweetclovers seem to be the solution to eliminating the inhibiting layer to erop production Heavy applications of organic matter, Mr. Haenisch believes will soon make the soil absorbtive and it will hold the rain where it falls.

Deep-rooted perennial grasses on range land allows water to enter the soil at a faster rate than do inferior grasses on an overgrazed range.

"The rainwater that gets in he soil is what makes the crops grow," Mr. Haenisch says "Every farmer and rancher should have a blotter on his land instead of a raincoat, so that it will soak up the rain when it

Mr. Haenisch said that if a field will absorb 4 inches of water per hour, not many rains will wash it away.
