Mills County 4-H Club youngsters are hard at work these days feeding and caring for calves that will be shown in competition for top prizes and championship awards at big shows only a few months from now.

County Agent George Reese late last week went off to a vacation in Nebraska feeling highly confident that Mills County 4-H Club boys and girls are feeding some calves that in the forthcoming shows will uphold the magnificent records made in fat stock shows by Mills County contestants during the past few years.

About 25 4-H Club members, most of them boys but a few of them girls, have some 65 calves on feed in the County. Other calves on feed are part of the Future Farmers of America program under the direction of vocational agriculture teachers in the various schools of the County.

A few days ago this reporter went on tour with County Agent Reese to see for himself the progress that is being made by 4-H Club members. He found improved, air-conditioned sheds in which scientifically-fed calves were being cared for by boys and girls with an intelligence and devotion that seemed to justify fully the County Agent's confidence.

The first stop on the tour was in Goldthwaite where Dana and Shirley Saylor are feeding Hereford calves under conditions of such cleanliness and comfort that it was difficult to brush away the thought that the calves were doing better than a lot of people in many parts of the world.

The next stop on the tour was in Durenville, where Johnny and Jimmy Wigley also are devoting many hours of each day to the care of their fattening calves under a shed that,

Council Votes To Extend Sewer Line

The Goldthwaite Municipal Council voted at a meeting last Tuesday night to extend the sewer line on the east side of Goldthwaite for one-half a block on Fifth Street, for two blocks on Reilly Street and for necessary distance between Lynch and Reilly Streets, after an easement has been obtained for the latter. The decision was made with the provision that property owners pay one-half of the sewer line extension. The cost to property owners has been estimated at about \$165.00 per 100 feet.

Fire Insurance Reduction Looms For Goldthwaite

The possibility—even the probability—of lowered fire insurance premiums in Goldthwaite developed this week as the result of long conferences among City Utilities Manager W. C. Barnett, Fire Chief Jack Reid, and a representative of the Texas State Fire Insurance Commission.

Last Tuesday the representative of the Fire Insurance Commission spent the day going over the entire key-rate fire insurance set-up in Goldthwaite. It had taken a long time to get such a representative here because the Fire Insurance Commission does not have enough field men. But once he arrived the following conclusions were evident:

1—The water supply in Goldthwaite now is considered adequate from the point of view of the State Fire Insurance Commission. That conclusion was reached after a careful check of the water supply, fire hydrants and other facilities. The fact of an adequate water supply is likely to bring about, in due time, the elimination of the seven-cent penalty that was imposed in the key-rate when the water supply was not considered adequate.

2—The plans of the City of Goldthwaite for augmented fire-fighting equipment are under consideration and such equipment, plus what is regarded as an adequate water supply, may in the final determination give Goldthwaite a reduction in the key-rate for fire insurance premiums of somewhere between 10 and 12 cents.

A factor that also has to be considered, however, is the increase in population in Goldthwaite during the past decade. With an official population of 1,559 as against 1,414 ten years ago, Goldthwaite, with more than 1,500 people living in it, enters a new classification that will to some extent lower the anticipated fire insurance key-rate reduction.

Much hard work has gone into the activity that promises to result in somewhat lower fire insurance premiums. Last month, Fire Chief Reid and Mr. Barnett conferred with the State Fire Insurance Commission in Austin. That was only one of several other conferences.

Further, a new fire-truck soon will be an accomplished fact, augmenting the present equipment, as soon as a pump, tank and other necessary accessories have been installed on it.

SELECTIVE SERVICE BOARD SUMMONS MILLS COUNTY MEN FOR EXAMINATIONS AS NATION'S WAR REQUIREMENTS MOUNT

Although a definite Selective Service quota has not yet been set for Mills County, 15 young men have been or will be called for examinations during this month with a view toward possible military service, it was announced this week by Charles Frizzelle, who is the Mills County representative on Selective Service Board number 84, with headquarters in Lampasas.

Mr. Frizzelle met last Monday night with Selective Service Board number 84 in Lampasas for the purpose of designating those who will be among the first called for examination for military service and for the purpose of reclassifying men whose status under selective service may have changed because of marriage, or for other reasons.

Soil Conservationists Meet On J. H. Priddy Farm With Guests

The Supervisors of the Brown Mills Soil Conservation District met in regular session last Tuesday in the shade of an elm grove on the farm of Chairman J. H. Priddy. Visiting farmers from Rising Star and Priddy attended the meeting, which included a dinner gathering and an afternoon tour.

Besides the routine business of approving applications for assistance and conservation plans, the Supervisors voted to pay for two windrows to be located at Goldthwaite and Brownwood. They also accepted a check from V. C. Segelquist for the combination drill which was donated to the Mills County Agricultural Building.

Mr. Priddy led the group on a tour of his farm to observe his King Ranch bluestem plantings, a deferred pasture, diversion terraces, terrace maintenance,

and first year Madrid clover. After lunch, Rep. Bill Chambers from May, and Rep. Arthur Gromatzky made short talks outlining the progress of the District movement in Texas.

Dr. R. Day, Work Unit Conservationist from Goldthwaite conducted the afternoon tour, which included stops to observe conservation practices on the following farms: Wilfred Schuster, Emil Schuster, J. W. King, Layart Swartz, Jay Partin, Bert Eppner and Charlie Swindle. The time was too short to visit Roy Weidner's farm where a soil study was made to determine the value of Madrid clover on clay soils. On the land where Madrid clover has grown for the past two years, the soil was loose and crumbly and would take up water at the rate of 5.25 inches per hour. Only thirty

Additional men of military age will be summoned later for Selective Service examinations. Men who already have been designated for examinations will be or have been notified as to where and when to report. In some cases, Mills County men were instructed to report for Selective Service examinations only to be informed later that signals were all off because their status had changed.

At last Monday night's meeting in Lampasas about a dozen Mills County men were reclassified, largely because of comparatively recent marriages. Under existing regulations, marriage automatically changes a man's classification under Selective Service from 1-A to 3-A.

Mr. Frizzelle this week issued reminder that when a man who is registered with Selective Service marries he must notify Board number 84 at Lampasas in writing in order to obtain reclassification.

So far, Mr. Frizzelle continues to be the sole Mills County representative on the Selective Service Board at Lampasas. Ed Rost of Priddy has been designated for membership on the Board but as yet, his membership has not been certified. Another member is to be named from Mills County but his appointment has not yet been made.

Texas held its own in 1950 as sixth in population among the States, according to official returns from the census takers over the Nation. It was that way following the 1940 count. The State as a whole gained a total of 1,262,000, however. This increase may give Texas an additional congressman next year. At present we have 21.

It is interesting to note the population trends over the State. As expected, the heavy gains were in the big city and coastal areas at the expense of the rural sections. Harris County jumped from 528,961 to 801,169, to become the most densely populated county in the State. Next is Dallas County which upped its count from 398,564 in 1940 to 612,318 this year. Bexar County now has 496,000—a gain of 158,000.

In Congressional Districts, the trend varied. Six of the 21 lost population in the 10 year span, mostly in East Texas. In our Congressional district, the Census gives us a net increase of 7,719, the total now being 266,144. Nine of our counties gained population, the other 18 lost.

Several people have asked me how our district will fare in the event Texas gains another representative in the Congress. That will be determined by the State legislature, whose duty it is to redistrict following the decennial census reports—where the total number of representatives is changed.

It often happens that the State legislatures hesitate to give any one county more than one Congressman, regardless of its size except when big metropolitan centers are involved. If that should be the case in Texas and if Dallas, Harris and Bexar counties are allowed only one representative each, then outside of those three, the other districts would have an average of 203,562 people.

In that event, the 21st congressional district would fall short of the average by 37,418. The most a state legislature can do is to divide the districts about equal with some variations being inevitable. But if the legislature should equalize the population into districts—outside Bexar, Harris and Dallas counties—and divide the counties on that basis among the 19 congressional districts, our district if it should remain intact would be entitled to add enough counties to total 374,18 people.

On the other hand, the district to the west—the El Paso district—which includes everything from the New Mexico border to the western boundary of the 21st district, if it should be given the average would lose 50,326.

And, to the northwest, the Lubbock district which joins ours would stand to lose a total of 54,476 in order to bring its average down to state average outside the three big counties. But the Abilene district which joins us, having lost population, would be entitled to have its population increased by 78,221 to be average population-wise.

So, unless there should be a complete reshuffling of districts over the entire State, our district instead of losing should gain perhaps two or three additional counties when the redistricting is acted upon at Austin.

By The Editor

Brian Smith the other day appeared to be displaying the signs of the times when he walked through the Square and for a long length on North Fisher Street carrying a small barrel or nail keg. A number of citizens, thinking that Mr. Smith was hoarding the clothing of the future in view of what the tax collectors will do to everybody, hailed him to inquire: "What are you doing with the barrel, Brian?" The editor finally caught up with Mr. Smith to ask the same question. "It's for my lunch," Brian replied, and kept on going. With an answer like that, you can understand why Brian Smith and his barrel continue to cause speculation in Goldthwaite.

The editor does not want to throw any scares into County Commissioner K. B. Henry of Precinct 3, but it must be noted that Liss "Old Friday" Walker has been heard from again from Austin, and he threatens to come back to Mills County to vote for Albert Schuman. After blowing the Washington and Texas Administrations right out of the water in a rip-snorting letter of indignation, old Friday went on this way:

Say! That makes me want to come back to Mills County so I can vote for Albert Schuman of Precinct 3. It was in that Precinct that I held the high office of Constable for 7 1/2 years, but when the high-ups got to telling me I must take 'Bill' and let 'Joe' go, that's when I got ready to go and I went—even without the permission of the Commissioner's Court!

After he had let fly with that one, Old Friday took a lot of the sting out of it by telling the editor that he is in the hands of "the best people in the world"—the people of Mills County. It was when he got to shooting outside the County that Liss Walker really got hot up. "After I read your article in the Eagle's Eye last week, I just felt like getting my gun and going after the enemy—but I could not decide which place to go, Washington or Korea." Old Friday wrote.

Indignation that just about matched that of the explosive Old Friday Walker also came again in this week's mail from Dr. Paul Herschel Power of Waco, formerly of Goldthwaite. Dr. Power is fully aware of the errors of the Department of State and its policies that go straight back to the Franklin D. We are sending the back copies that you missed and we are sending a missive to somebody in the postal service that in effect will say: "Rude letter follows."

M. F. Horton Receives Patent On Under-Bench Saw Invention

Letters patent for an under-bench saw for cutting various sections of wood have been issued by the United States Patent Office in Washington to Contractor M. F. Horton of Goldthwaite.



The patent to Mr. Horton, an imposing document with blue ribbon and red seal, gives him the exclusive right to make, use and vend his invention for 17 years.

As stated in the letters patent, Mr. Horton's invention relates

to improvements in bench saws, "and more particularly to an underbench saw in which a power saw is mounted and operates under a bench so as to travel back and forth for cross-cutting with sufficient travel to cut various sections of wood, to tilt to any angle from 90 degrees through 45 degrees, and at the same time, may be rotated in an angle of 360 degrees for cross-cutting long boards at any angle and for ripping long boards."

That all sounds very complicated, but it means that Mr. Horton has contributed a most important invention that takes the guessing out of cutting lumber. Numerous advantages are recognized in the letters patent for Mr. Horton's machine, including the saving of both labor and material. Mr. Horton applied for his patent some time ago. His application was approved last February, but the letters patent themselves were not issued until last July 4.

The unit for which an inventor's patent was issued to Mr. Horton is light and compact. More than four years elapsed between the time of his first application for a patent and the granting of the patent itself.

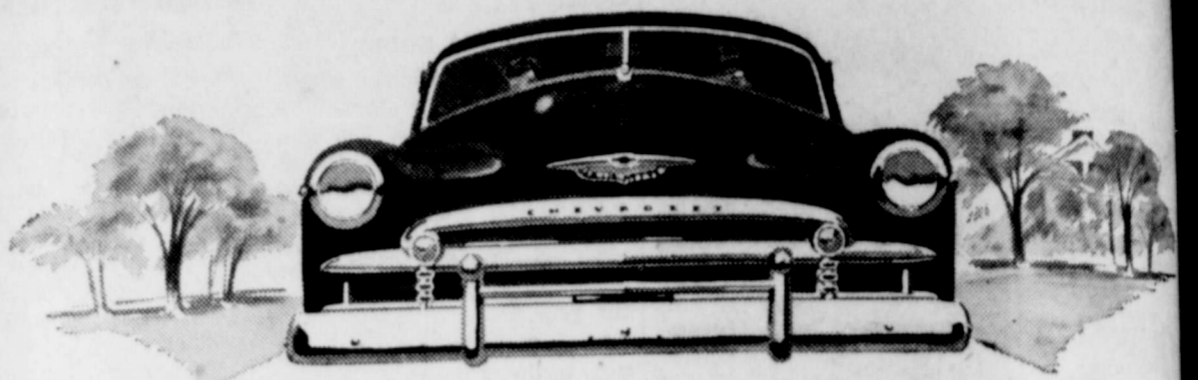

News Of The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District



The clover harvest for 1950 is history now for the cooperators of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. Nineteen farmers harvested 158 acres of sweet-clover which yielded 22,277 pounds of re-cleaned seed that is ready for sale. C. L. Evans was the champion Madrid clover seed producer with a yield of 356 pounds per acre on 9 acres. It took a lot of neighborliness, hard work, cooperation and ingenuity to get this record harvest for the Goldthwaite Work Unit area in the sack. First the clover was cut with the District-owned windrower, but the windrower had to be mounted on a tractor. The District leased a tractor from Dr. T. C. Graves. The Soil Conservation Service technicians, Ben Day, Roger Powell, Carl Casbeer and Charles Haensch, furnished the "know how" on the operation of the windrower. They also determined when the clover was ready to be harvested.

After the clover lay in the windrow about four days, the combines with the special pick-up reels gathered the clover in and separated the seed. By swapping and borrowing reels and by one man helping his neighbors, the harvest went smoothly.

Since the closest clover cleaning plant is located in Mexico...

Gregor, the farmers decided to clean the seed themselves. By running the seed through their combines again, J. H. Priddy, Ernest Kohler and Edwin Drueckhammer did a fair job of hulling and cleaning their seed. For the others, Ben Day rigged up the grass seed scalper so that it would separate the hull and unhulled seed and take out the trash. Then J. H. Priddy, Charlie Swindle, Paul Swartz, Roy Dellis and Willis Hill lined up their tractors to their hammermills and knocked the hulls off the clover seed for themselves and their neighbors. The hammermilled clover seed went through the combines again in order to blow the hulls out of the way. The golden yellow clover seed was then ready for the final cleaning. It was run through a small cleaner owned by Dr. T. C. Graves. As the re-cleaned seed came out of the spout into a new sack, it was weighed, sampled, and sewed. Samples of seed were sent off to get the germination and purity.

Each cooperator is selling his own seed at his home place. A large lot from the Priddy community will be free of Johnson grass. With an adequate supply of both Madrid sweet-clover and Hubam clover on hand, a large acreage is expected to be seeded to clovers this fall and spring.

It weighs 240 pounds and sheared 26 pounds of wool. Robert Henry will use the championship ram on the Johnson ranch in the Neighbors Creek community, where he has just added 44 registered Rambouillet ewes to his original flock of 12.

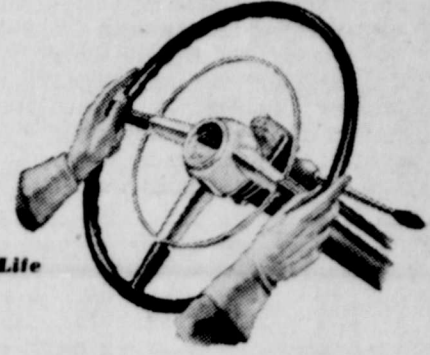

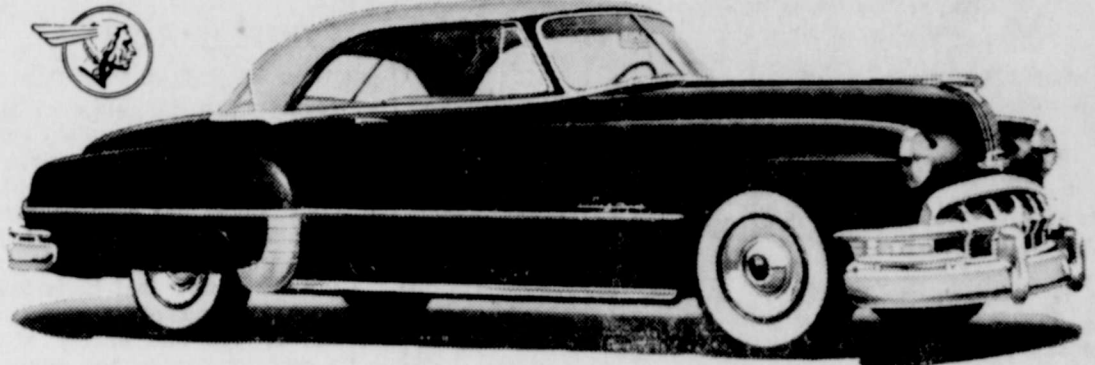
