Although title to it is held by the City of Goldthwaite, it is intended to serve all of Mills County and to that end, the City and County have entered into a formal agreement regarding a portion of its support.

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C. F. "STUB" STUBBLEFIELD

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Joe A. Palmer, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mills County Democratic Committee, announced that in Mills County, Mr. Ramsey polled 1,162 votes while his opponent, Pierce Brooks, had only 676 votes.

John C. White, running for nomination as Commissioner of Agriculture, won 999 votes, as against 807 votes for the incumbent Commissioner, J. E. McDonald.

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In the race for Lieutenant Governor Mr. Ramsey carried all of the boxes in Mills County except in Priddy, Rattler and Ridge. He will, of course, be the next Lieutenant Governor of Texas. The other candidates to whom Mills County gave majorities also carried the State, including Will Wilson, Meade Griffin, W. A. Morrison and John C. White.

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Patrons of the Goldthwaite Post Office had a long wait for their mail on Thursday. As the Eagle went to press, the morning mail train, normally due at 7:55 o'clock, was scheduled to arrive at two o'clock in the afternoon, due to a derailment about six miles north of Lampasas.

## Livestock Raisers Set January Dates For Show; Steen President

Big news was announced this week with the setting of the Spring Show of the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association for next January 15 and 16 at the Agriculture Building in Goldthwaite. It was announced also that the Preview Show will be held on September 16.

The dates for the Spring Show and for next month's Preview were set last Friday night at a meeting of the Association at the Agriculture Building.

At the meeting, Robert L. Steen was elected President. W. V. Horton was elected Vice President, with Glynn Collier as Secretary-Treasurer.

The following committees were appointed:

Mr. Stubblefield polled a total of 1059 votes as against 1040 votes for Mr. Fox. Commissioner Henry's vote in Precinct 3 was 353 as against 331 ballots that were cast for Mr. Schuman.

The official returns, as announced by Chairman Joe A. Palmer of the Mills County Democratic Executive Committee show that Mr. Fox carried both boxes in Goldthwaite but that Mr. Stubblefield won in Mullin and Priddy. They were tied in Star, with 41 votes each. They were close to a tie in Center City, where Mr. Fox polled 44 votes as against 42 votes for Mr. Stubblefield. In Goldthwaite, both boxes, Mr. Fox won 501 votes as against 379 votes for Mr. Stubblefield.

In other voting precincts in the County, the count in the race for Sheriff was as follows:

Scallorn, Stubblefield 6, Fox 30; Payne Gap, Stubblefield 12, Fox 33; Caradan, Stubblefield 32, Fox 62; Mullin, Stubblefield 205, Fox 163; Fisher, Stubblefield 49, Fox 19; Priddy, Stubblefield 166, Fox 40; Big Valley, Stubblefield 24, Fox 21; Rock Springs, Stubblefield 12, Fox 22; Jones Valley (Rattler) Stubblefield 15, Fox 6; Regency, Stubblefield 10, Fox 8; Ebony, Stubblefield 23, Fox 10; Ridge, Stubblefield 11, Fox 4; Mt. Olive, Stubblefield 7, Fox 26; Pompey, Stubblefield 25, Fox 10.

In the race for County Commissioner, Precinct 3, Mr. Henry carried Mullin, his home town, by 281 votes against 88 votes for Mr. Schuman, who makes his home in Priddy. Priddy gave Mr. Schuman 209 votes as against three votes for Mr. Henry. In Fisher, Mr. Henry polled 43 votes as against 25 votes for Mr. Schuman. Pompey gave nine votes to Mr. Schuman and 26 votes to Mr. Henry.

The races for Sheriff and County Commissioner, Precinct 3, were the only local contests in last Saturday's Runoff or Second Democratic Primary.

Following his election, Mr. Stubblefield expressed his thanks to the voters for his victory.

"I look forward to taking office, with the knowledge that during the campaign I made no commitments," Mr. Stubblefield said. "There are no strings attached to my victory. I made no promises except to the people. I

LAST SATURDAY'S ELECTION

We extend hearty congratulations to C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield and to Precinct 3 Commissioner K. B. Henry on their victories in last Saturday's election. We believe that Mr. Stubblefield will be diligent in the office of Sheriff. Mr. Henry's record shows that he has worked in the best interests of the citizens of his Precinct; he is able to point to results.

The close vote of last Saturday showed the high esteem in which W. W. "Bill" Fox and Albert Schuman are held. The fact that they came so close to winning the offices they sought showed that both of them have hosts of friends who have confidence in them. Somebody had to lose, but neither Bill Fox nor Albert Schuman took a drubbing. They gave their opponents a close race and demonstrated their abilities as vote-getters.

As for the chief State-wide contest, we would be less than human if we did not go on record with an expression of satisfaction that in his campaign for Lieutenant Governor of Texas, Ben Ramsey found so many supporters in Mills County. Our faith in Mr. Ramsey, as written before the First Primary, and repeated between the First Primary and the Runoff, increased steadily as the campaign wore on. We believe that with the passing of time, still higher honors will go to Mr. Ramsey as a public servant. Mills County will keep an eye on him, not only because of his capacities and the increasingly larger place he is bound to fill in public life, but also because he has a warm spot in his heart for this County.

PARENTS AND OUR SCHOOLS

The re-opening of our schools next week imposes obligations on parents as well as pupils, teachers and the school administrators. For the sake of everybody concerned, the parents of children who are of school age can make an important contribution to everybody by seeing to it that their children attend their classes every school day except when illness might, unfortunately, be a cause of absence.

State aid is important to our public education system. It is important to local taxpayers and it goes without saying that it is of vast importance to the pupils and to those devoted men and women who are charged with the responsibility of giving our youngsters the best education possible in preparation for life and in preparation for going on to higher education.

The County School Board, the Boards of the respective school districts, and Superintendents H. E. Patton of Goldthwaite, Wray B. Williams of Mullin, T. M. Cash of Priddy and Leroy Beard of Star, have joined with County School Superintendent Lewis B. Porter and Assistant Superintendent Lois Hudson in emphasizing the importance of regular attendance by all pupils at school.

Regular attendance, of course, enables a pupil to keep up with his work—to keep a class going as a unit. But there is another factor that is full of meaning to everybody. It is that the number of teachers allowed to each school is based on the average daily attendance of pupils and not on the total enrollment. Every time that a pupil misses a day at school when he or she could have been present, harm is done to all of the pupils and to the high standards for which teachers and administrators aim.

The schools in Mills County obviously are doing a good job, as acquaintance with the pupils shows. The schools could do with much more than they have. They certainly are entitled to all they can get and parents, especially, can help to make sure that the fullest possible measure of State aid comes to Mills County by keeping high the average daily attendance at the schools throughout the County. If parents will remember at all times that State aid is based not on total enrollment but on average daily attendance, we can hang up a good record for the academic year 1950-1951.

ELECTION FOOTNOTE

The voting last Saturday showed that in Mills County a contest has to be home-grown to be worthy of the ballots of some of the citizens. For example, between them, "Stub" Stubblefield and "Bill" Fox polled 2,099 votes. In the race for Lieutenant Governor, however, only 1,838 votes were divided between Ben Ramsey and Pierce Brooks, thereby showing that 261 persons who cast their ballots for Sheriff did not vote for Lieutenant Governor. There were 293 persons who did not vote for Commissioner of Agriculture. More than 300 persons did not vote for candidates who were in the Runoff for high judicial posts. The figures tell a story all by themselves.

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The Eagle's Aery

By The Editor

(Editor's Note: Our usual weekly Washington letter from Congressman O. C. Fisher did not arrive in time to fill this space this week. In its place, the reprint herewith a most important article by Henry J. Taylor which, we believe, ought to be read and pondered by all of the American people. We also believe that Mr. Taylor is one of the soundest, most accurate and most careful writers on the American scene. The charges that he makes in the following article require the most thorough and objective investigation possible.)

BY HENRY J. TAYLOR

A military plan to be followed in the event of Red aggression against South Korea did exist. But we're not seeing it executed. For, by this plan, our men would not be in South Korea at all.

When President Truman retired on the night of the third day of the aggression and suddenly made up his mind to order American ground forces into South Korea, this order scrapped the plan.

Our forces are not improvising in Korea. Actually, they are called on to perform a contradiction of the original plan.

Korean Intervention

Now when the news of the flagrant Stalin aggression first struck, the original problem was not whether the United States must intercede. That was an elementary decision.

America had to take action against the North Korean aggressor. If we did not intercede, we would lose any hope of stabilizing anti-Communist interests throughout the Far East.

No, the real problem was how to intercede, how to punish the aggressor, how best to employ our facilities to our best advantage. It was a question of what method would be the wisest fundamental policy for overcoming Stalin's advantage in waging war by using satellite barbarian troops on the ground against us.

Just to take action would contain great peril. The decision would set a pattern. In short, we were entitled to choose what poison we would hand the other fellow to drink.

In many distant mountains and jungles Stalin could push us forward, using Soviet stooges and retaining the strategic initiative. Our military leaders had known this for a long time. By getting a savage ground patrol, sending us natives to fight, Russia could bleed us as she wants, and at no loss to herself. For historically, Russia's trump card, in most her wars, has been to draw the enemy into nature's punishment—distance, or climate, or manpower.

The plan realized that no draft calls out of our homes and factories can ever be big enough to supply American inductees to fight with guns and bayonets wherever Stalin dictates—throughout the vast, tangled land-mass of Asia. We can have a surface military victory, of course—if we spend enough. But there can be no decisive return to long-term world peace—or American security—with Stalin sitting in the Kremlin saying "Now let me see. Where will I trap their soldiers next?"

Exploit Our Advantage

The planners, to avoid these traps, had taken a cold, hard look at the potential populations of peoples and races at the disposal of Stalin's stooges for fanatical and savage warfare against our outnumbered inductees on the ground.

The plan insisted we should use a method of intervention against the Korean aggressor that would exploit our American advantage, not the enemy's Asiatic population advantage.

Why Mr. Truman ordered our ground troops into South Korea and thus scrapped the plan, I year.

do not know. Neither do many of our military leaders. But here are the facts.

The fundamental of the plan was to keep our intervention in Korea, our chastisement of the North Koreans by our forces, up off the ground—and especially off the ground in South Korea, the homeland of our friends.

Military's Proposal

It was proposed by important military planners that:

1. We serve an ultimatum on the North Korean Red aggressors, through the United Nations, directing them to withdraw their aggressor troops north of the 38th parallel within 24 hours.

2. That the North Koreans submit to the United Nations for judgment the issues with South Korea which they say caused them to resort to military force.

3. That on North Korea's failure to comply in accord with the charter of the United Nations, the air and sea forces of the United States and the United Nations would instantly declare a naval blockade around Korea and, at the same time, bomb all communications and industry in North Korea—and only North Korea.

The plan would have left South Korea, the homeland of our friends, untouched by our forces in the intervention. For not a bomb would drop there nor a foot soldier be landed.

4. That we would keep up this bombing of North Korea—and only North Korea—definitely, if necessary. But we would never—never—put an American foot soldier in South Korea.

The Scuttled Plan

This plan limited Stalin's ability to support stooge fighters against us in Korea and elsewhere. The only way Stalin could retaliate would be to engage his own Russian Red air force against our bombers out in the open and thus, risk general war.

Now, certainly, the achievement of our objective in Korea could not take longer, by this plan which was scuttled, than fighting our way on the ground all the way up the peninsula, mountain by mountain, town by town.

In short, we would have made aggression miserable for the Korean satellites in their own territory—North Korea—and only North Korea. We would not have been party to the destruction of the South Korean homeland.

It's difficult today for a South Korean native to see how he is being protected, when his own countryside is made a battlefield by Americans from far away. Actually our bombers have bombed more targets in South Korea than in North Korea.

Rebuilt Korea

Now what this can eventually mean to us is not hard to imagine. When we get all through, it appears that we Americans will have to rebuild South Korea all over again.

Further, by the plan which fell by the wayside we would have been exploiting airplanes, our technical advantage over our North Korean opponent, instead of fighting the enemy on their own terms, namely, unlimited ground troops. Instead, all our ground forces would remain intact and secure for other possible missions. They would not be trapped with savages in Korea, and other places, at a nod of Stalin's head.

But when President Truman ordered our ground forces into South Korea, and they were on the front on the die was cast. The plan.

alfalfa is a new sheep may have a place on this area if the conditions that were made continue to produce in the future.

Center City, has alfalfa last October the combination drill of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. He planted alfalfa Austrian alfalfa and 200 pounds of fertilizer. The peas during the winter and weeds took the field.

It is a soil-improving legume and its extensive root system will have a beneficial effect on the land where it is grown.

Interest in a new dry land alfalfa called Plica Butta is growing among conservation farmers who keep up with the latest developments in soil-improving plants. Trial plantings will be made this fall to determine its usefulness here.

Plans for sowing alfalfa should be made now in order to have a firm smooth seedbed by October 1st at least. The farmer should arrange for his seed ahead of planting time. It is recommended that phosphate fertilizer be used with the alfalfa and on land where legumes have not been grown before, mixed fertilizer should be used. A nurse crop of oats would probably be worthwhile.

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sheep were excluded from the field, the alfalfa and oats made a quick growth and the crop was harvested for hay. Another crop of pure alfalfa hay was cut from three acres about 30 days later which produced 20 bales to the acre.

A. J. Smith, Blanket Springs used the combination grain drill to sow 6 pounds of alfalfa seed per acre in a 5 acre field last fall. The alfalfa made a good growth and produced 20 bales of hay to the acre from the first cutting. A seed crop will be harvested soon.

It appears that dry land alfalfa will grow on selected sites and especially where the land has been treated previously for several years with vetch or clover. It is a soil-improving legume and its extensive root system will have a beneficial effect on the land where it is grown.

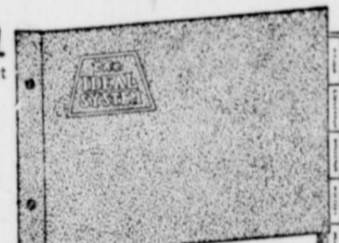

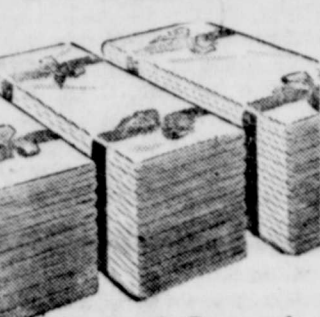

analysis of where we stand in the Far East to be printed and broadcast throughout the country anyway. In effect, President Truman tried to make amends to General MacArthur for the attempted suppression, but some questions that were raised by the incident remain unanswered. They include:

To what extent do pro-Communists continue to exert an influence on the Department of State, and consequently on the White House? How long are Americans going to permit our diplomatic officials to keep on talking about agreement with the Kremlin when the record shows that Moscow makes agreements only to break them—that there can be negotiation with Russia only on Russian terms?

The answers to such questions lie with the President. We have become so accustomed to having the Secretary of State sound off that at times we are prone to forget that responsibility for the conduct of America's foreign relations rests with the President; the State Department was intended to be merely the instrument for carrying out White House instructions. The President, of course, has to look to his diplomats for advice, but it is difficult to see how he can continue to look for advice to men whose past procedures have been repudiated and reversed.

The Man in the White House carries a heavy burden and an awful responsibility. He ought to have the sympathy of those who do not have to make the decisions that the President is called upon to make. I believe he would have much more sympathy and support if the people could believe that he was being advised wisely and that he and those around him knew where they were going in these critical times. The President's broadcast tonight, Friday, may provide answers to insistent questions. It is to be hoped that it will. The country needs to have understanding both of our danger and confidence in the means being taken to cope with it.
