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YOU AND YOUR VOTE NEXT TUESDAY

Under a one-party system of government, it is understandable that in a non-Presidential year there would be much more interest in primary elections and run-offs than in general elections. Since there is a general election next Tuesday, we have some thoughts that we would like to express about the predictions that the general election will bring about one-third as many voters as turned out for the Primary of last July 22 and the Runoff of last August 26.

First, we have a strong hunch that Texas will not always have a one-party system of government. The issues between States' Rights and the strong concentration of power in the centralized bureaucracy are too great and too important to make it likely that Texans will continue to wear the Brass Collar indefinitely. It is dawning upon more and more people that the rights of Texas as a State will be trampled upon by the Washington bureaucrats just so long as Texas can be counted upon to roll up huge, overwhelming majorities for the Democratic Party. The story will be different, however, if Texas ever reaches the point at which between 40 and 50 per cent of its votes might be cast in the Republican column. Against the day when Texas will have a two-party system of government, voters should, we think, get in the habit of voting in general elections — even when the highest office of the Presidency is not at stake.

Second, and we have said this before, we believe that an election offers opportunity to register gratitude and appreciation to public servants who do their jobs well. We said that about the city election in Goldthwaite last Spring, but only a handful of voters bothered to express their thanks at the ballot box to Mayor Loy Long and to the members of the City Council. We said at the time and we continue to think that the Goldthwaite city election last Spring represented a sorry lack of appreciation of men who give of themselves and their time in the public interest.

As for next Tuesday, be it remembered that the candidates will not be elected until after the votes have been counted. They were merely nominated in the July Primary or in the August Runoff.

State-wide, there are Republican opponents running against Governor Allan Shivers and against Ben Ramsey, the Democratic candidate for Lieutenant Governor. We are for Governor Shivers and Mr. Ramsey and we think there is no doubt that they will win, as will the other candidates for State office on the Democratic ticket. However, we are for such men as Governor Shivers and Ben Ramsey on their merits, and not because they are Democrats.

In Mills County, the candidates on the ballot next Tuesday will have no opposition. That probably accounts for the prediction that in Mills County there will be little public interest in the election. We hope that the predictions will turn out to be all wrong and that there will be a heavy vote in Mills County next Tuesday—in appreciation of jobs well done.

As a matter of duty, we go in and out of the Mills County Court House several times a day, every working day of the week. We have watched our public servants at their work and we believe that such persons as County Judge Lewis B. Porter, County Clerk Earl Summy, Precinct Commissioners Jess Tullos, Fred V. Wall, K. B. Henry and J. Frank Davis, County Treasurer Bertha Weathers, County Attorney A. M. Pribble, Justice of the Peace E. A. Obenhaus and County Surveyor J. C. Long, are conscientious public servants who deserve votes of confidence at election time as well as at nomination time. From all that we have been able to learn, Arthur E. Gromatzky is a fine representative of the 104th District in the Legislature at Austin and from first-hand experience we know that Congressman O. C. Fisher, State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman and District Attorney James K. Evetts serve all of us well.

Sheriff Wiley L. Mahan, who is one of the finest public officials ever to be encountered by us in a long career of dealing with such officials, is not up for election, but C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield, who was nominated after a close Primary and Runoff, will be standing next Tuesday for actual election for the first time. We think that "Stub" Stubblefield should go into office next January with a whacking big general election vote behind him.

Finally, whenever Americans show themselves apathetic about the free, secret ballot that they enjoy, the enemies of freedom make capital of that apathy. This is no time for apathy on the part of any citizen who cherishes his or her freedom.

A vote of 2,000 or better in Mills County next Tuesday will show that we are not apathetic.

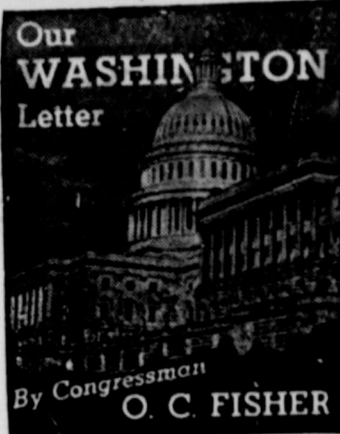

Editor's Note: The latest report from Representative O. C. Fisher, who has been touring Europe as a member of the House Armed Services Committee, comes from Vienna, in Austria. In the following informative article, Congressman Fisher writes from a point behind the Iron Curtain

Austria, with its seven million people, is of far more importance in the world than its population and size would indicate. It is the size of Alabama.

Vienna, the capital, is 95 miles behind the Iron Curtain. It is governed by a joint Council composed of United States, Soviet, French and English. It is surrounded by Russian occupation, while the areas occupied by the other three powers are a hundred miles or so away. The situation is similar to that of Berlin and Germany, except that Austria is Vienna; whereas Germany is not necessarily Berlin. Vienna has a third of the population of all Austria, is its industrial, political and economic heart.

But unlike the situation in Berlin, the Russians cooperate (after a fashion) in the joint control of Vienna. While the city is split into zones, traffic moves freely over the city and Austrian police operate without much interference from occupying forces.

An exception was noted, however, when the Soviet military ordered Austrian police to keep their hands off the Communist general strike effort, going on while we were there. But the strike fizzled out.

The Russians are treacherous, tricky and take advantage of every chance to embarrass and hamper the Western powers. The Reds have been able through pressure to have short Communist propaganda film included in all newsreel showings in Vienna and elsewhere. Not long ago Russian troops got rather friendly with other occupying soldiers. Some would attend American dances, socials, etc.

Then suddenly those troops were yanked out and replaced with younger soldiers who do not fraternize with our forces at all. That is typical of the Communist technique of keeping their men away from exposure to western ideas and understanding. They must be kept in abject ignorance if their false teachings are to be fully effective.

The U. S. has about 9,000 troops in Austria. Russia has 40,000 Britain and France have fewer than we. If Russia wanted to take Vienna and Austria, it would, of course, be a push-over. But thus far, Russia's ideological war has been a dismal failure.

In the last election 96% of the people voted and only 5% voted Communist. It can be said that not more than 3% of the rank and file in Austria are Communist.

Reasons for this include the presence of Russian troops, who are arrogant and haughty; the economic chains imposed by the Russians to pay for occupation costs; and the Russian unwillingness to negotiate in good faith, a peace treaty for Austria which would lead to withdrawal of occupying soldiers.

A treaty was first proposed by the U. S. in 1946, and negotiations were begun in 1947. Already there have been 258 sessions held. Many agreements have been reached and obviously liberal concessions have been made by the Western powers in an attempt to turn Austria back to the Austrians. But the Reds have haggled for months over details and small matters.

One concession of importance that has been made, and agreed to, by Britain, France and the U. S. is an agreement to give Russia most of Austria's oil production for a period of 30 years, including any new discoveries. At present, the Austrian fields (located inside the Russian Zone) produce 10 million barrels per year. This is an extension of the Ploesti fields in Rumania.

Russia doesn't want to pull out of Austria. First, her troops keep them west with its influence away from the borders of Hungary, Rumania and other satellite. Secondly, the Reds hope to make inroads into anti-communist Austria, by its imposed youth movements and on-the-spot propaganda programs. And, third, the Russians instead of their occupation costing money, are actually making a profit on the deal. They take what they need to pay their costs, and force the shipment of exports into Russia or the satellites.

And so it goes. The Russians, ruthless and cantankerous, never get impatient. They wait and take advantage of every chance to cash-in on Western impatience and thereby drive a better bargain.

### Edgar "Shorty" Caraway Strives Hard To Settle Down To City Life

Allen Edgar "Shorty" Caraway, better known to his friends in Mills County as Edgar, recently was the subject of feature articles that were published in the Oklahoma City Times and in the Lawton Constitution of

Lawton, Oklahoma.

Mr. Caraway, a brother of Mrs. R. L. "Bob" Cockrum of Rt. 1, Goldthwaite, is a son of the late Sam and Lou James Caraway. Now 65, he is described by the Oklahoma newspapers that wrote about him as trying to become accustomed to city

life in Lawton "after 45 years of busting wild broncos in Arizona."

"There's nothing wrong with Lawton," he was quoted as saying. "It's just me. I can't get used to living right smack in the middle of town, for one thing. And, too, it's hard to get used to people calling me Mr. Caraway. I've been called 'Shorty' so long that it's the only name that seems right."

The Oklahoma City Times and the Lawton Constitution went on to write about "Shorty" Caraway as follows:

Shorty had quite a career—one filled with excitement and some disappointments—since the little country school burned down around 1900.

After that he left home to shift for himself, to live the life he liked best.

One of the several sons of a Goldthwaite, Texas, cowman, Shorty grew up believing that he had been born too late to enjoy the life he liked most.

He wanted to ride over the old Chisholm trail, as his dad had most of his life. But by the time Shorty was 15, the Chisholm trail had been replaced by trains. That took all the thrill out of getting cattle to market, as far as he was concerned.

Shorty then decided to go farther west.

At the age of 16, he set out to earn a stake sufficient to allow him to marry Effie Doggett, his boyhood sweetheart. His dad equipped him with a Choctaw pony and a few dollars.

With his best friend, Tom Nichols, he rode west looking for a job. Tom, who was two years older, balked at going farther west than the Texas line and tried to coax Shorty into returning home.

But the younger lad was determined to find work, and Tom went back home, Shorty recalled.

"The next time I heard from him was over a year later. He had gone back and married

Effie. I haven't seen either since." Shorty blinked.

In the years that followed, the 115-pound cowhand worked his way around the New Mexico and Arizona country working when he could.

He started out following the "chuck line" from ranch to ranch, sweating out a job opening and living off western hospitality.

As a matter of fact, Shorty declared, the only shooting irons he heard about in his cowboy career was in the movies as he did a hitch before the cameras in California.

"They'd have me shooting blanks and doing things no sensible cowboy would ever do. Darned near got myself killed, too," he drawled.

Shorty once slept in the same bunk with a bank robber and that was about his only actual contact with a real "bad-man."

On a trip west he spotted a cowpuncher asleep in the moonlight on a make-shift bed. So he hobbled his horse next to the stranger's and crawled in bed with him.

Next morning, he found he had been sleeping with the last of a band of gunmen who had robbed the Tucson, Ariz., bank.

Caraway landed his first job as a chore boy at \$15.00 on a horse ranch near Globe, Arizona. Now it is the San Carlos Indian Reservation.

It was on this same reservation that 15 years later he foremaned the job of moving thousands of cattle and white settlers when the government set it aside as an Indian reservation.

All this is behind Shorty now

## News Of The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District



With a sack of fertilizer on his back, 10 pounds of vetch seed in his hand, and a tablespoonful of inoculant in his pocket, a farmer has all the equipment necessary to tap a gold mine that lies above his farm. Yes Sir, in the air above each acre of land, every farmer and rancher can claim 35,000 tons of gaseous nitrogen valued at \$5,000,000 as commercial fertilizer. But the only way he can WORK his gold mine is by using legumes properly.

In the mad rush for this wealth, some farmers forget the small key that unlocks this storehouse of fertilizer. That is where the tablespoonful of inoculant comes in because it contains the bacteria that attach themselves to the roots of the legumes. By working with the plant, they have the ability to take the nitrogen out of the air and make it available to the plant itself. The residue from the legume plant and the bacterial growth add to the nitrogen content of the soil. The commercial value of the nitrogen thus added to the soil is \$10 to \$20 per acre.

In order for the legumes to do their best, phosphate fertilizer is essential. It stimulates root development and increases the amount of organic matter that is added to the soil.

If the legume bacteria are so important in working the gold mine in the sky, the farmer should handle them carefully. They are alive in the can and

must be alive when the legume seeds sprout. Keep the can of inoculant in a cool place until it is used. Do not let the sunlight kill the bacteria. Attach a little of the inoculant on each seed by dampening the seed with sweetmilk or syrupy water and stirring well. Plant the seeds immediately in moist soil with a band of phosphate in the same drill.

The inoculated legumes serve as a tonic to the land. Farmers are finding that after one year of soil improving legumes, the land plows easier. They have found that the soil breaks up into small clods and has a springy feel when they walk across the field. The greatest value of the legumes lies in the response of the crops that follow. The nitrogen that was taken from the air increases the production of the next crop.

and goodwill, and until the international conspiracy of evil has been crushed once and for all, none of us can live at peace.

Once it was established that President Truman was safe and that he was taking a nap while Puerto Rican dissidents tried to shoot their way through the guard at Blair House in Washington, Secretary of State Dean Acheson had some highly interesting things to say.

Without waiting for the outcome of the voting next Tuesday, the Secretary of State finally broke down last Wednesday and admitted that he was worried—as well he might be—by the Chinese Communist intervention in the war in Korea.

The Secretary of State seems to feel that the Chinese Reds are afraid not to fight for Russia and at the same time they are fearful of fighting the American and token United Nations forces under the supreme command of General Douglas MacArthur. If, at long last, the Secretary of State is worried about the place of the Communists in Asia, then the rest of us ought to be worried too.

As for the attempt to assassinate President Truman, none of us can take any comfort from the fact that the President's guards, rather than Mr. Truman himself, were the victims of all the shooting in Washington last Wednesday afternoon. Puerto Rico, an integral part of the United States, has been the scene of bloody rioting bordering on warfare for the past two weeks. On our own doorstep, the Reds are stronger than we would like to believe in the Caribbean, in Central America, and in South America.
