It was found that pastures which formerly He is due to enter there on could not be used for animal husbandry during winter months now will provide plenty of winter feed for goats and cows. That adds up to profit, as is pointed out so succinctly by Carey Owens in the news story in which Mr. Day announced "a most significant development in Mills County Agriculture."

We believe that Mills County ranchers, in gratifying cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service, have made ranching history. It is probable that other farmers and ranchers will come from far and near to see what has been done here—or they will be writing in to ask questions so as to learn about Mills County practices in harvesting, sowing and pasture deferment. Most important, it will be understood by those who undertake to produce from the land that our own Mills County ranchers and the Goldthwaite Work Unit of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service have pointed the way toward more production and consequently greater profits. It cannot be drummed home too often that wealth is not money. Money is merely a medium of exchange, a symbol. Real wealth is production and by providing a means of greater production, some of our ranchers have contributed materially to the greater well-being of everybody here because- as has been said before but which also cannot be repeated too often-every single one of us is dependent upon what is being done on the land to reap the maximum production from it. The philosophy of scarcity as preached by Henry A. Wallace and others of his ilk in the New Deal was found to have been not only all wrong but downright disastrous. It ought to be of profound relief to everybody that there is at least one federal agency-the Soil Conservation Service - that is out toiling with those who work the land in the interest of production. If the achievements of our ranchers and of the Goldthwaite Work Unit of the Soil Conservation Service do not receive the widespread recognition that they deserve we are going to start hollering about it and keep hollering until such recognition comes.
