









### You Deliver Your Christmas For A Hospitalized Veteran?

Mr. Smith, Executive Secretary of the Mills County Chapter of the American Red Cross, announced this week that Wednesday is the deadline for delivery to his office at the hospital on the west side of the county of Christmas packages for hospitalized men in the Administration Hospital in Waco.

By Mr. Smith who, in turn, will deliver the gifts to Red Cross officials at the Waco Hospital. Mr. Smith repeated his request that donors leave their names with their gifts but that they do not use Christmas wrapping paper. Ordinary wrapping paper will be sufficient, Mr. Smith said.

There are approximately 2,500 patients at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Waco. Accordingly, it is hoped that the appeal for Christmas gifts will find a generous response in Mills County.

### Social Security Questions Can Be Asked Wednesday

Next Wednesday afternoon at four o'clock a representative of the Federal Security Agency will sit in the District Court Room at the Mills County Court House to take claims of retired workers, dependents and survivors, to issue social security cards and to distribute information on the amended social security law.

In announcing that his Deputy will make his regular monthly visit to Goldthwaite next Wednesday afternoon, James B. Marley, Manager of the Federal Security Agency in Austin, said:

"The 1950 Amendments to the Social Security Law permit greater earnings to retired insured workers. Under the new social security law, a retired worker may have cash wages in social security covered work up to \$50 a month and still accept his benefit payment check for that month. Heretofore he was restricted to \$14.99 a month cash wages from such work. If wages are over \$50, the retired worker should report this fact to the Social Security Administration and not accept his benefit payment for that month. If the beneficiary is over 75, there are no restrictions on the amount of his earnings in any kind of employment."

To promote international good will, the Future Homemakers of America sponsor the adoption of home economic classes in foreign countries. These members, through their organization, have resolved together with youth of all freedom-loving nations to celebrate the World Christmas Festival by sending gifts and friendship packages throughout the year to needy children in other countries.

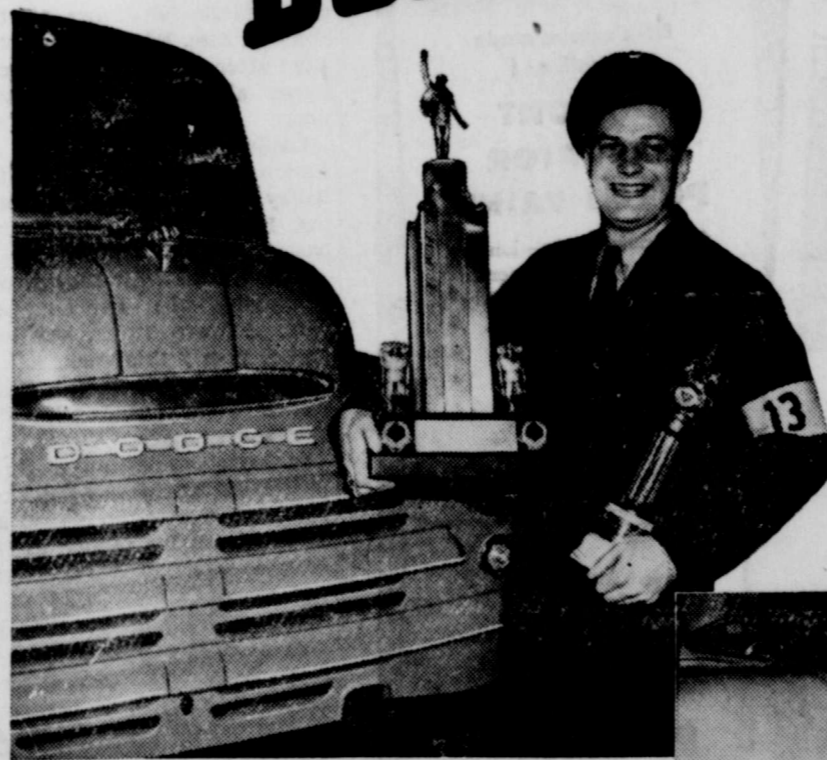

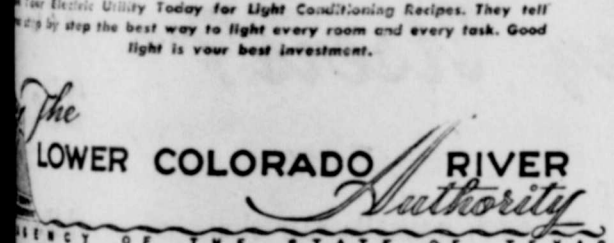

(Continued From First Page.) every queen's delight plant and every woody bush. The Indian-grass crept out from under the rocks and gained enough vigor to seed this year. The needle grass and weeds are on the way out. By holding this pasture in reserve, Mr. Segelquist was able to keep his goats through the winter and save considerable money. His pasture now is producing good grass that will in turn produce beef and mohair."

As for the actual harvesting, Mr. Day said:

"W. A. Hill simply put a big sheet iron pan behind his tractor mower and he had a grass seed harvester for getting native grass seeds. P. R. Jordan had a deferred pasture which produced a good seed crop, and Mr. Hill moved in and clipped the seed heads with his mower and caught them in the pan. He will scatter the seed hay in old cultivated fields on his Pecan Bayou Ranch. When confronted with the theory that cows do not like little bluestem, Mr. Hill pointed out that little bluestem cannot be found where cows can get to it continuously."
