Telephone Co-op Gets Assurance Of Early Action

Willis A. Hill, President of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, announced this week that despite unsettled economic conditions arising from the disturbed international situation, influential forces are at work to expedite the allocation of funds and materials for the project that is destined to give modern, dial telephone service to a vast rural area in Central Texas.

Mr. Hill said that only this week Representative Bob Poage of Waco sent assurance that copper necessary for the installation of lines and equipment for the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative has been definitely allocated. The copper that will be required has been set aside so that the Co-op will not find itself stranded for lack of material when the authorization of funds is received from the telephone division of the Rural Electrification Administration.

Ernest E. Wilson, Secretary of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, said that Weldon Groves, Hamilton County R.E.A. Manager who has given valuable aid in setting up the Co-op from the very start, as well as other R. E. A. officials, have given assurance that final details required for clearing the application in Washington are being expedited.

Further, in a letter replying to a communication from Mills County Judge Lewis B. Porter, Representative O. C. Fisher of the 21st Texas Congressional District gave his assurance that he is working actively in Washington in behalf of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative. Congressman Fisher has conferred in Washington with R. E. A. officials, he said in his letter to Judge Porter.

The Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, plans for which have been greatly extended due to an increasingly expanding area to be served and an unexpected high number of subscriber applications, has been in the process of organization for several months. The necessary maps, applications and engineering designs have been "in the works" in Washington for several weeks and assurances of early action have been described as most gratifying to the Co-op's officers and directors.

Plans provide that the central exchange of the Co-op will be in Goldthwaite, with lines extending over an area of at least nine counties.

Our Boys And Girls Make Record Entries In Big Fat Stock Shows

Mills County—the County of Champions—will show more stock in the Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio Shows next January and February than at any time in the past, it became evident this week as County Agent George Reese announced the lists of entries that have been made by 4-H Club members.

Plans Completed As Big Livestock Show Time Nears

Reminder of big doings next month—on January 15 and 16—came this week when the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association put the catalogue for the spring show at the Agriculture Building or "Barn" in Goldthwaite into the works. Robert L. Steen, President of the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association, said the Show will provide opportunity for everybody to see the results of many months of work by 4-H and F.F.A. members and to demonstrate the accomplishments of adult livestock raisers as well. "Remember the date, January 15 and 16," Mr. Steen said.

In preparation for the biggest County livestock Show in all Texas and probably in the United States, the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association met at the Barn last Tuesday night and re-elected Mr. Steen President. W. V. Horton was elected Vice President and Glenn Collier was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer.

At Tuesday night's meeting, some new regulations were agreed upon. They included a proviso that no one exhibiting at the Show will be permitted to sell more than two animals. It was agreed, also, that no one person will be permitted to show more than three animals in any one class and no one will be given more than two awards in any one class.

Other regulations provide that: All breeding stock must be pure bred. Any livestock considered not worthy of being exhibited at (Continued on Page 8.)

The Eagle Increases Subscription Prices Effective With New Year

Effective January 2, 1951, the cost of a subscription to the Goldthwaite Eagle-Mullin Enterprise will be \$2.50 per year in Texas and \$3.00 per year outside Texas, it was announced this week by H. R. Ekins, Publisher. Single copies of the Eagle, sold over the counter, will be ten cents, Mr. Ekins said.

"Much as we regret the necessity of increasing the subscription price, this announcement has been inevitable because of higher costs of production and the soaring price of newsprint," Mr. Ekins said.

"Even at \$2.50 per year, the subscription cost on an annual basis will be less than five cents a copy and we strive each week to produce a newspaper that is well worth the price," the Publisher added.

Mr. Ekins said that all subscriptions that may be renewed before January 2, 1951, will be at the former price of \$2.00 per year in Texas and \$2.50 per year outside Texas, but that all renewals after January 2, 1951, will be at the new rates of \$2.50 per year in Texas and \$3.00 per year outside Texas.

"Many other newspapers throughout the United States increased their subscription rates long ago," Mr. Ekins said. "We have resisted such an increase for so long as possible but it can be resisted no longer. Our obligation is to keep this newspaper going on as high a standard as we can attain. We shall continue the effort to meet that obligation. Our circulation is the highest in the history of the Eagle, and we are confident that it will remain high.

"In addition to covering the news and providing a splendid medium for our advertisers, we bring into this community considerable money that is spent in Goldthwaite and elsewhere in Mills County. We can continue to meet our standards and to serve the community that is 'the Free State of Mills County' only by recognizing that, along with all other worthwhile producers, we are 'worthy of our hire.'"

Mr. Ekins added that "after all, the increased price of the Eagle in Texas on an annual basis, payable in advance, is less than a penny per week."

Entries for all of the shows also were announced in behalf of the Future Farmers of America—the Eagle Chapter of the Goldthwaite High School—by Y. B. Johnson, teacher of vocational agriculture and advisor to the Chapter.

The first big Show that will follow the January 15 and 16 exhibition in Goldthwaite by the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association will be the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth from January 26 through February 4. Judging of Club stock at Fort Worth will be on January 27. Open stock will be judged on January 29 and the Fort Worth sale will be on February 2. Mr. Reese said that at all the Shows, Mills County entries will compete in both Club and Opening judging.

In the Fort Worth Show, John Howard Owens has entered an Aberdeen-Angus steer and three Hereford steers have been entered by Merion Reynolds.

As announced in the Eagle on November 17, the Eagle Chapter, Future Farmers of America, the Goldthwaite High School, has entered 19 lambs and one steer in the Fort Worth Show.

Since then, however, the Goldthwaite F.F.A. boys have entered two more steers. At Fort Worth, John Carothers will have an Angus-Aberdeen steer and Kenneth Wesson and Bill Parker each will enter a Hereford steer. Also at Fort Worth, four lambs each will be entered by Bobby Joe Davis, James Kemp, Bob Parker and Callie Sides, while three lambs will be entered by Charles and Aaron Batchelor.

Mr. Reese said that for the Houston Fat Stock Show and Livestock Exposition, January 31 through February 11, record entries have been made by Mills County 4-H Club boys and girls. The Club judging at Houston will be on January 31, the Open judging on February 1 and the sale will be on February 2.

News Of The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District



Farmers who did not get a winter cover crop planted this fall on account of the dry weather will probably want to sow Hubam clover or Madrid clover this spring. Both of the sweetclovers have been proven to be adapted to this area and both can be planted in February and March successfully.

Cooperators with the Brown-Mills Conservation District who have continued to try Hubam sweetclover are beginning to appreciate its value and it is gaining in popularity. Hubam sweetclover is an annual which is planted in the spring and makes an abundant seed crop in the late summer.

M. L. Ethridge, who lives 3 miles north of Mullin, sowed 10 pounds of Hubam clover and 100 pounds of 4-12-4 per acre on 19 acres of good land, March 8 of this year. Most of the clover did not come up until it rained a month later on April 14. After the clover had made a good growth, Mr. Ethridge opened the gate so that 240 sheep and 60 cows would have access to the field. The Hubam furnished an abundance of grazing until August when the livestock were excluded from the field so that the clover would make seed for a volunteer stand. A good seed crop did set before the land was plowed and sown to oats.

V. C. Segelquist, Payne Gap rancher, started something that looked so good that other farmers and ranchers are sure to

follow his example. On an old field that he did not care to cultivate, Mr. Segelquist drilled in 20 pounds of Johnson grass and 15 pounds of Hubam clover per acre with phosphate fertilizer. The planting date was March 20 this year. Both the Johnson grass and Hubam clover made a rapid growth until on June 15 they both were shoulder high to an average man. A clipping on that date showed a yield of 1 1/2 tons of green matter per acre. Two weeks later, Mr. Segelquist turned his cows in the field to graze the crop down.

Madrid sweetclover has been successfully grown from spring plantings in this area. It is possible to overseed fall sown small grain with sweetclover in February if the stand of small grain is thin. Better still would be the sowing of small grain and sweetclover together in the spring. The clover will do better if phosphate fertilizer is used.

Sudan and clover is another combination that can be sown together in the spring for grazing and soil improvement. In special cases, the Johnson grass, clover combination will be used. The District has a combination drill, two row planter, and grass seed drill that can be used by cooperators for spring planting of sweetclovers.

Hey Kids! Feed Them Calves, For Houston Sure Knows All About You

In addition to the news story of plans by Mills County youngsters to compete in various Fat Stock Shows that is published on page one of this week's Eagle, this newspaper presents herewith a release that was written by Leonard S. Patillo, press agent for the Houston Fat Stock Show. It demonstrates that the gentlemen who operate the Houston Fat Stock Show are keenly conscious of the extent to which Mills County boys and girls have won their spurs as calf feeders. Mr. Patillo's release from Houston, for the most part, follows:

"Mills County in Central Texas is out to make a clean sweep of the fat steer division of the 1951 Houston Fat Stock Show and Livestock Exposition.

"At least that's the indication conveyed by the stack of entry cards received from both 4-H Club and Future Farmers of America youth who live in the county.

"Mills County Agent George G. Reese entered 36 steers for his 4-H Club members and Y. B. Johnson, Goldthwaite vocational agriculture teacher, three Aberdeen - Angus steers for his F. F. A. members. All will be in the race for the grand champion steer award—and the multi - thousand dollars which the steer brings at auction.

"If the Mills County youth make a clean sweep, it won't be anything new, for the farm youth from Goldthwaite, Star and other Mills county communities have been showing the nation how to raise beef calves for the past several years.

"Since 1947, a Mills county farm youth has had either the grand champion steer of the Houston Fat Stock Show or the reserve champion. And one year they had both.

"President W. A. Lee reported that Bobby Zane Egger, 15-year-old Star youth, was leading the parade of 4-H Club entries from Mills County. Egger's, 890 - pound Hereford, "Flash", took the purple ribbon at the 1950 show. Glenn H. McCarthy, Houston hotel and oilman, paid \$15,400 for the steer, a world record for an individual

buyer. "Egger is entering three Hereford steers. "Merion Reynolds of Goldthwaite will be back with three Herefords. The 4-H Club youth exhibited the show's reserve champion steer in 1948 and 1949 and is still trying for the top award. Reynolds showed the reserve champion in 1948 when the Goldthwaite boys monopolized the top two awards, with Robert Henry Johnson exhibiting the grand champion, an Aberdeen-Angus. "The year before, in 1947, Jim

Bob Steen of Goldthwaite, showed the grand champion. The only break in the chain was in 1949 when Seth Turner of Purlina in Coryell county, which incidentally almost joins Mills, took top honors with a Shorthorn.

"Auction prices have been steadily in the five-digit class since the Mills county youth started winning. In 1947, Edgar Brown of Orange paid Steen \$15,000 and C. Rampy of Houston and Montgomery paid \$12,500 to Johnson. Mr. McCarthy in 1949 paid Turner \$13,500 for his Shorthorn."

QUESTIONS??

Editor's Note: Newspapers throughout the United States have received a booklet that was published by the Department of State in Washington. It carries a foreword by President Truman. The booklet is entitled: "Our Foreign Policy." Before asking some questions, we quote herewith, generously, from the Department of State's booklet. Here are the questions:

"A totalitarian nation is seeking to expand its power and to impose its system of communism over others by threats, by subversion, and even by force in the hands of a puppet. All aggressive and expanding powers have threatened the peace of the world and the Soviet Union is no exception.

"Since 1945 the Soviet Union has taken some 7 1/2 million square miles of territory and more than 500 million people under its control. It is now trying to extend its empire across Asia.

"Soviet expansion has wiped out three nations: Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania. It has reduced to servitude six nations which were independent before 1939: Poland, Hungary, Rumania, Bulgaria, Albania, and Czechoslovakia. Soviet leaders have marked Communist China for the same fate.

"The people who have come under Soviet rule have lost not only their national independence but their individual liberties. Each satellite is a police state on the Soviet model. Its government is controlled — and often actually run — by Soviet agents. Its economy is exploited for the benefit of the Soviet Union. Its people live in terror under the eyes of the secret police. They have no freedom to speak, to vote, or to worship as they please. They can — and often do — disappear in the night to prison, concentration camp or death, and no one dares to ask what has become of them. The Soviet Union and its satellites deliberately obstruct the work of the United Nations and other international organizations. Their people are forbidden to mingle or communicate with Americans and all other free peoples.

"The deepening division between the Soviet-dominated bloc and the free world is not, as some people wrongly think, a conflict between capitalism and communism. Among the nations of the free world, in fact, you will find some that are not capitalist at all, but have freely chosen a Socialist system. The conflict is really between a power-hungry Government that is bent on spreading its power by force, terror, and every other means, and the community of

free nations which refuses to be conquered or dominated, or to stand by and see its members swallowed up.

"It is true that most Americans have an innate dislike of communist ideas and methods. But they concede the right of any nation to live under a communist system if the majority of its people freely choose that system. THERE IS NO CASE ON RECORD WHERE THIS HAS HAPPENED, for communism, itself, denies the right of free choice. No communist government has ever put such a choice to its people in a free election or a free referendum.

"From the Soviet point of view, the idea of free choice is both dangerous and illogical. Communist leaders and their followers say that there is only one "truth" in the world, and that is the doctrine of communism. We believe there is room in the world for many truths and many doctrines, and that diversity is the key to growth and progress. The Russians claim that there is only one authority, the state, which is above and separate from the people. We believe that the only authority rests in the people, and that the state is their servant, not their master.

"This is a very old cleavage. It goes back to the beginnings of human society. What makes today's version of the conflict so serious is that the old, reactionary ideas of a single doctrine and a single authority are weapons in the hands of an aggressive and expanding power which already controls the lives of more than 700 million people. Moreover, this great power expects eventually to impose its doctrine and its authority on all people. To accomplish this purpose, the Soviet Government and its agents are using methods of terror, of propaganda, and of secret undermining of other systems from within. These methods are most likely to succeed where there are 'situations of weakness.'

With no delusions, the above quotations are from the latest publication of the Department of State in Washington — "Our Foreign Policy. It took a long time to prepare the document and it has been available for several weeks to newspapers and to those among the public generally who know about it. It was recommended by President Truman over his own signature. In the face of the facts as known to and published by the Department of State, why did the Administration drag its feet on rearmament? Why did it fail to mobilize? Why did it not use every means at its command to impress the truth of the international situation on the American people instead of lulling them into a sense of

One of the many letters coming to the editor and which press concern over American survival has been received from W.M.B. Carrington of Brownwood — a "Promoter of Texas Missions and Inter-Racial Religious Good Will." He writes in part, as follows:

"While I have my personal fear over use of the atom bomb, we all know that self-preservation is the only right law of nature. There comes a time in the course of every when every man must decide for himself the best course of action to follow. The United States now is in the position of having to make such a decision.

"However opposed I may be to wholesale destruction of such destructive, death-dealing tactics, yet I do believe that this nation should stand itself at any cost. . . . the aggressor nations are determined to destroy us, must be as equally determined that they shall not do so. The Gospel and praying will penetrate their hearts, though the A-bomb might get a hearing."

The letter was signed: "W. B. Carrington, colored missionary." The editor is grateful to him for having taken the time to write so thoughtful a letter and for the generous contribution on the editor's work — modestly forbids us to print, of us will be able to see, of course more clearly as end of us decide whether the last survival is to be recognized the face of threatened destruction by forces that are evil.

Ike And Mike Do Not Look Alike Because Mike Had Balanced Ration

Not long ago the Eagle published a story by Fred Smart, Reporter for the Future Farmers of America at the Goldthwaite High School, in which the author told of two pigs, Ike and Mike. The pigs are being fed different rations and Mr. Smart now has come up with a 63-day diary of Ike and Mike, covering the period from October 10 to December 12 of this year.

Ike is a hog that has been fed an unbalanced ration of corn and wheat shorts. When the F.F.A. boys started their experiment, he weighed 34 pounds. Now he weighs 79 pounds after having gained only seven tenths of a pound per day.

Mike is the hog that has been fed a balanced ration. He weighed 31 pounds when the F.F.A. boys started their experiment, but now he weighs 129 pounds, having gained at the rate of one and a half pounds per day.

Here are the diaries of Mike and Ike and the essential statistics covering the experiment:
